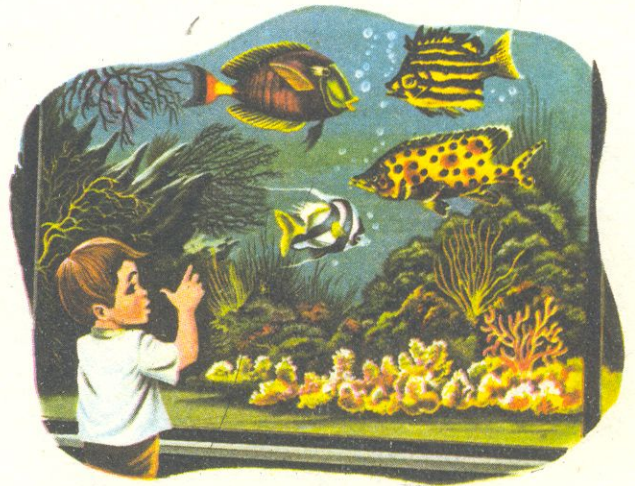




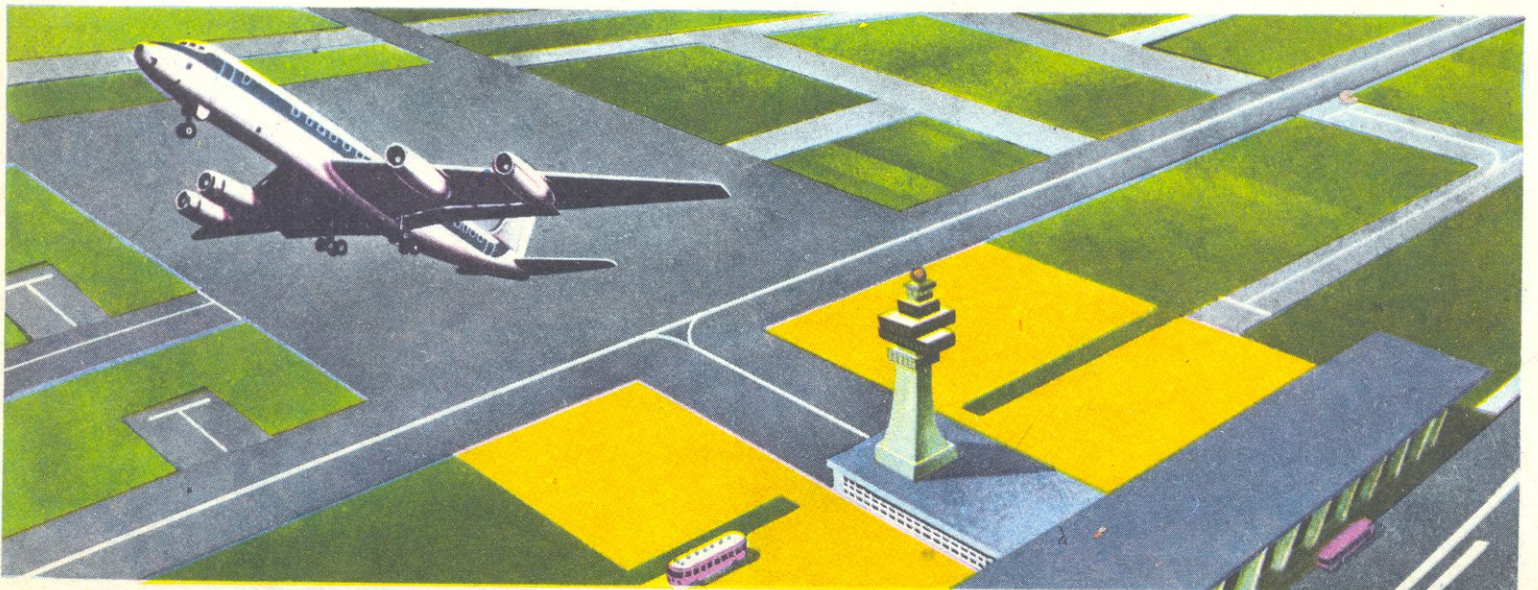
AXE A sharp edged tool used for cutting down trees.



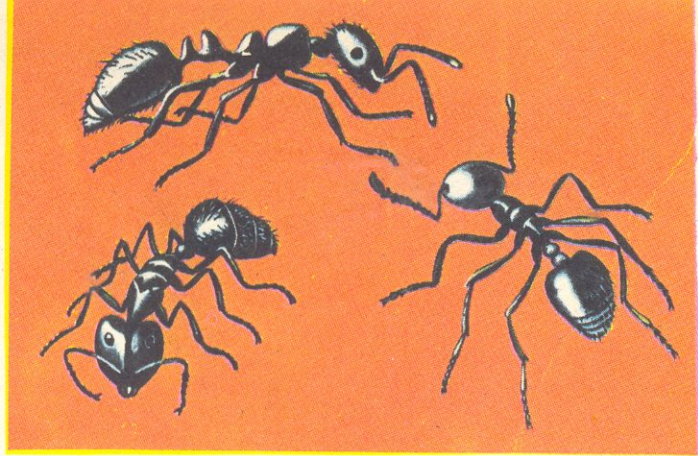
APPLE A delicious fresh fruit grown in many parts of the world.



AQUARIUM A place to keep and view fish and underwater plants.



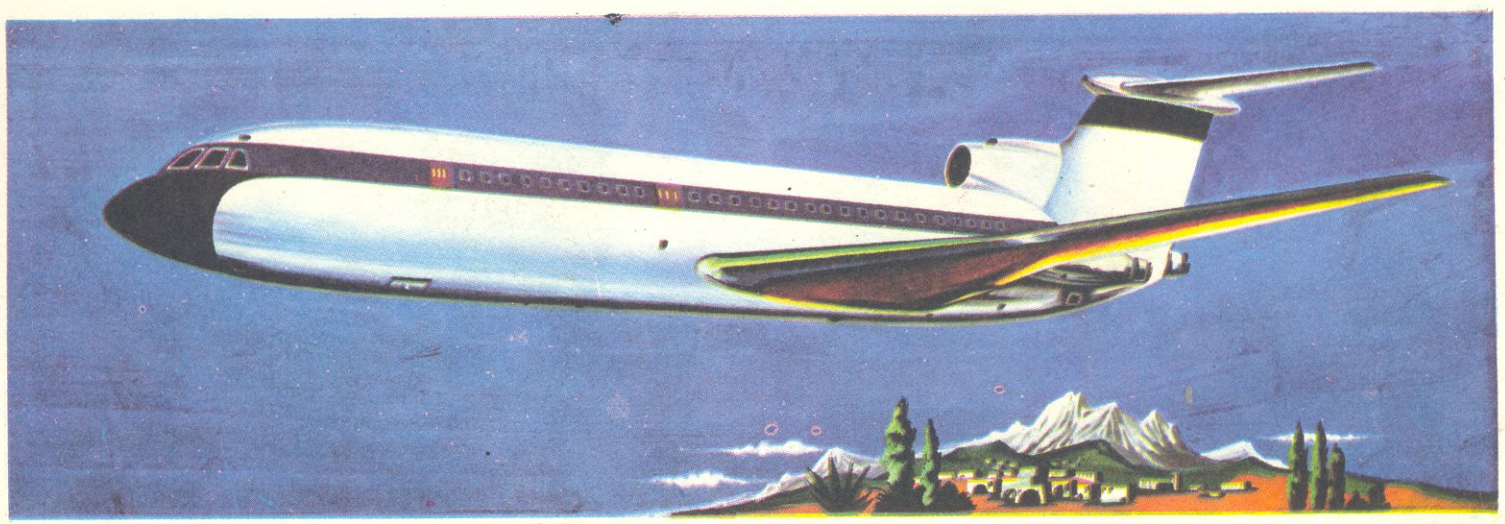
AIRPORT This is a terminus for aeroplanes to land and take off from.



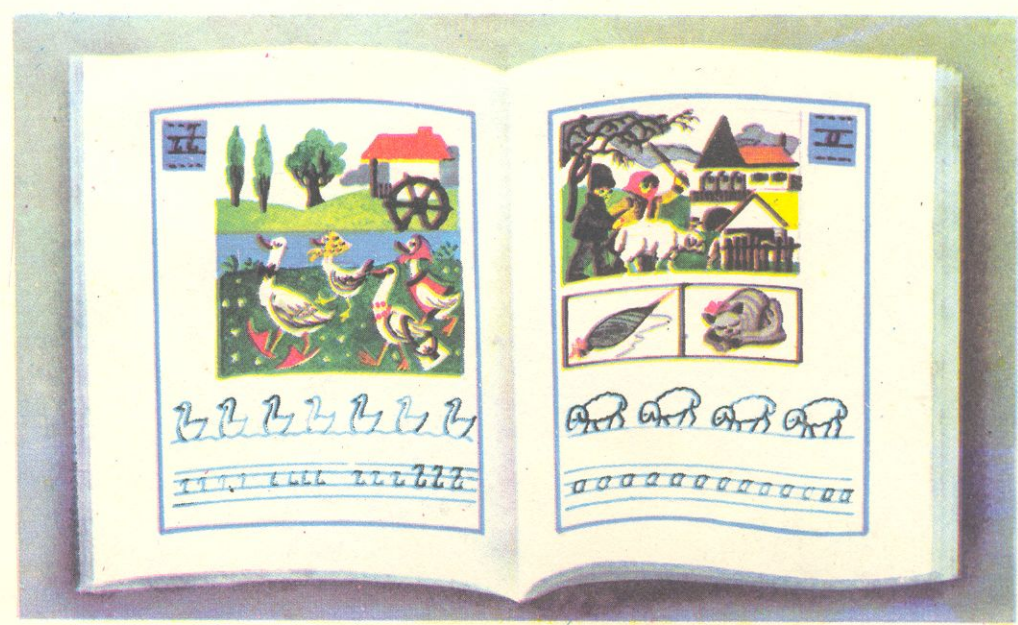
ANTS Small insects particularly noted for their industrious and workmanlike ways.



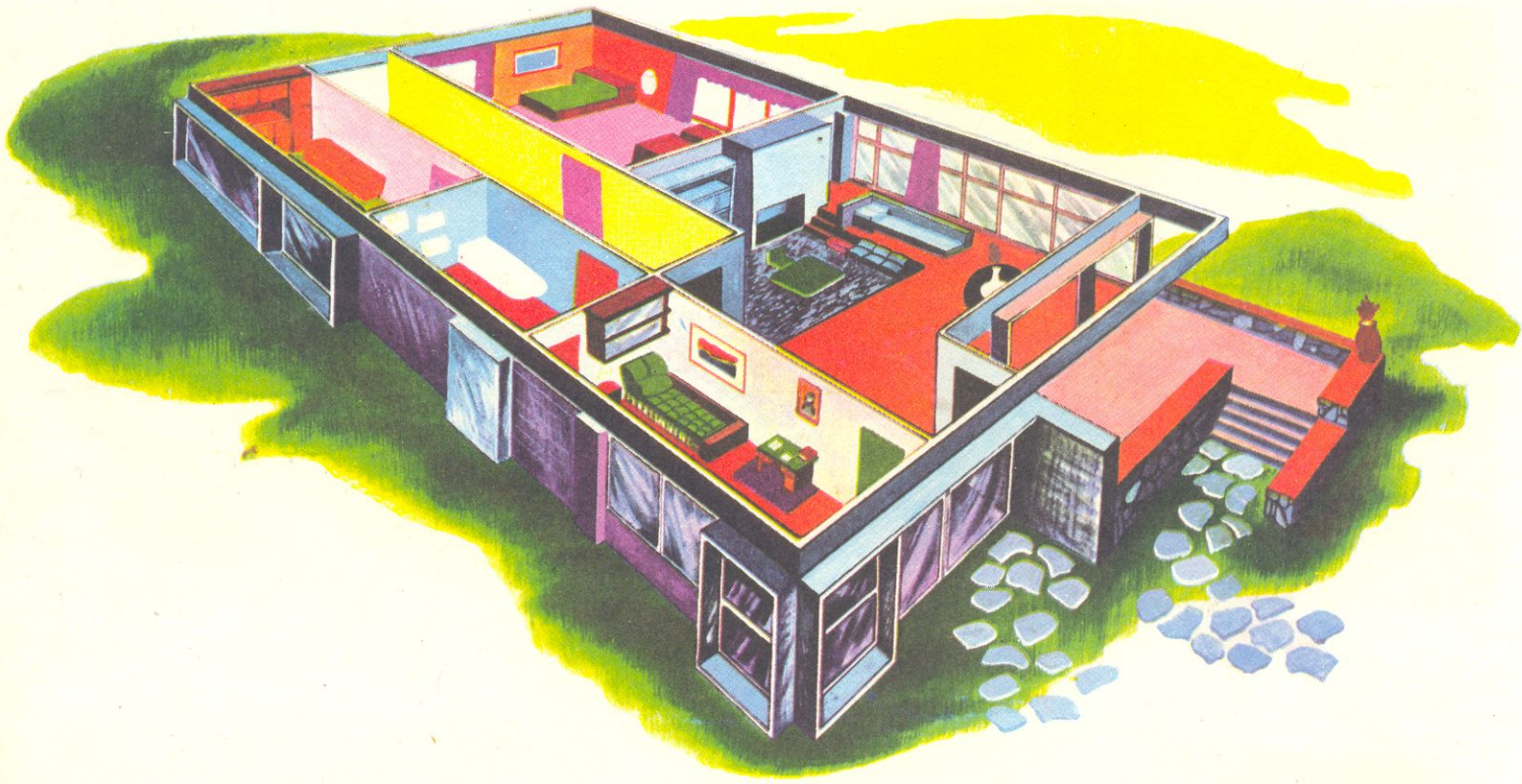
APRON A pretty piece of material worn over the front of the body to keep your other clothes clean.



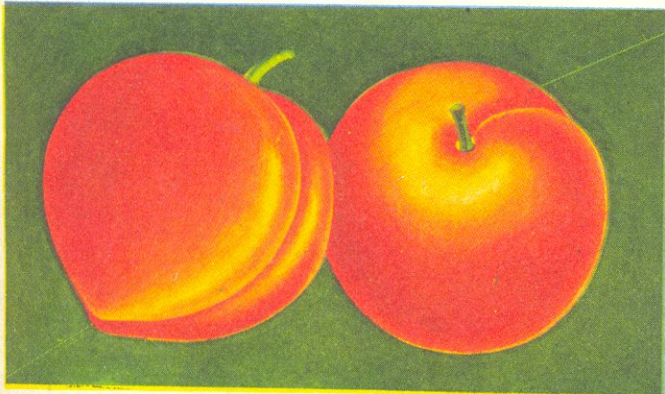
AEROPLANE These can fly very high and take people to many parts of the world.



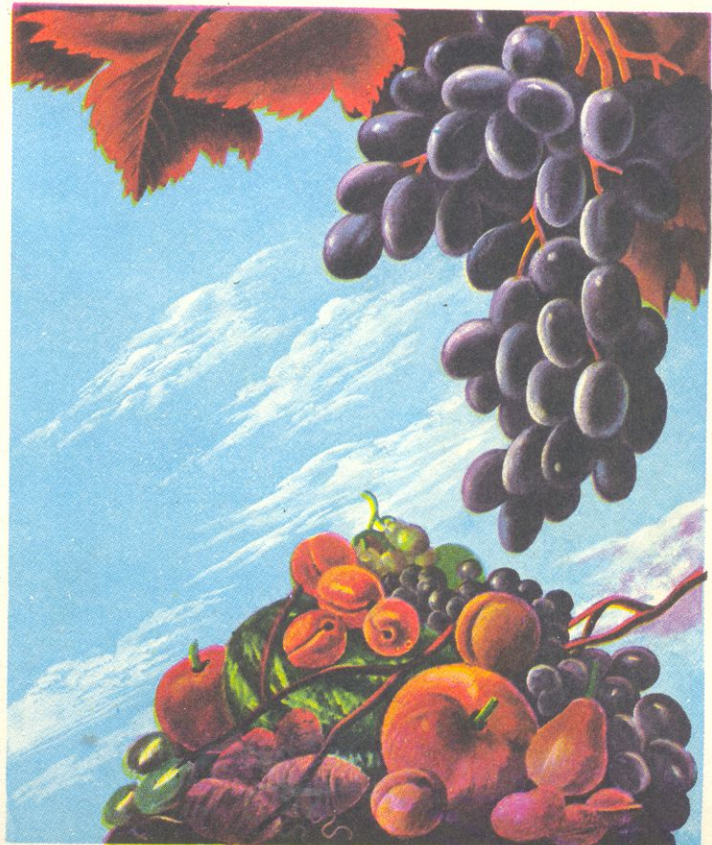
A.B.C. A simple beginners' book for children learning to read.

APRICOT An orange-coloured, soft, hard-stoned fruit.



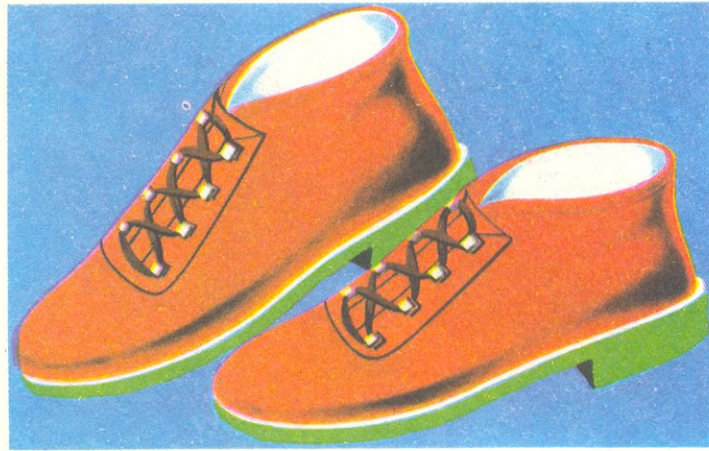
AUTUMN The season between summer and winter when the harvest is gathered.

BILBERRY A plant that yields a sweet tasting, purple berry.



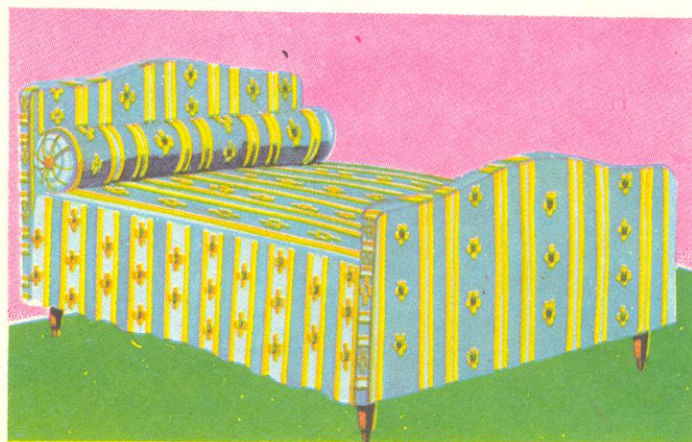
BEE Bees collect pollen from the flowers and then take it back to their hives to make honey.



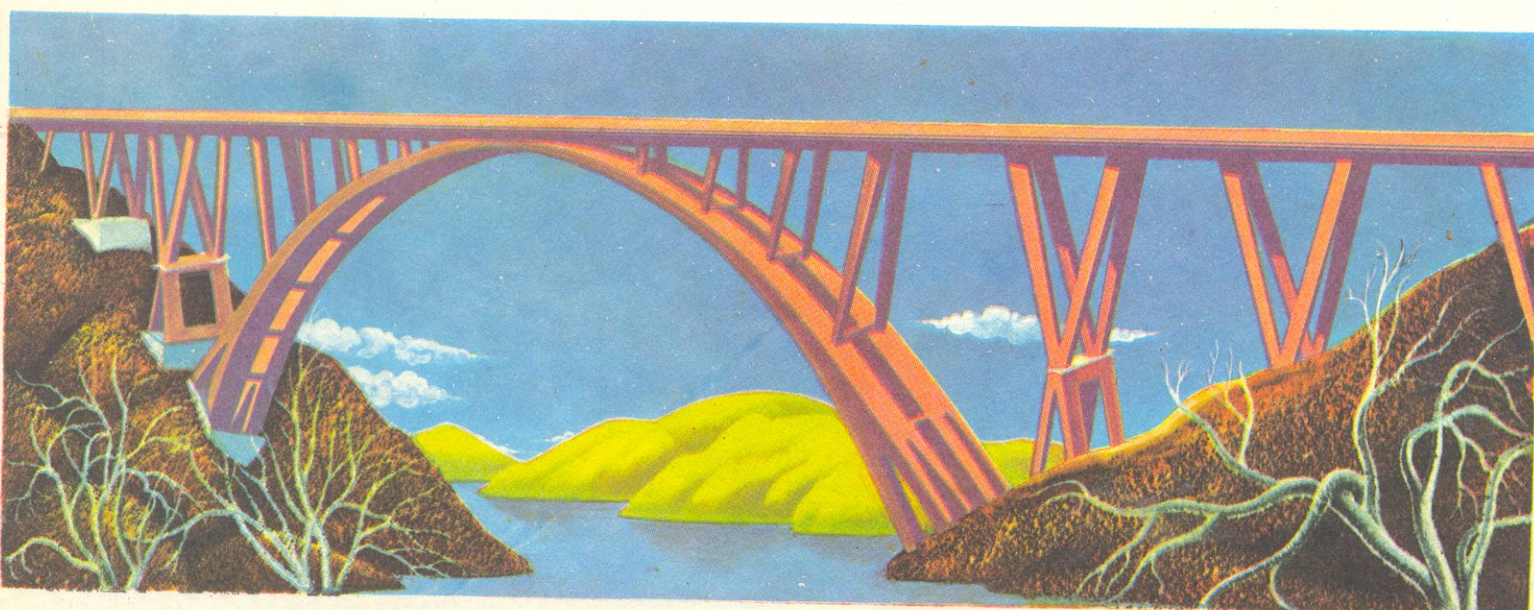
BEECH TREE This tree has a very smooth bark and its leaves are oval-shaped.



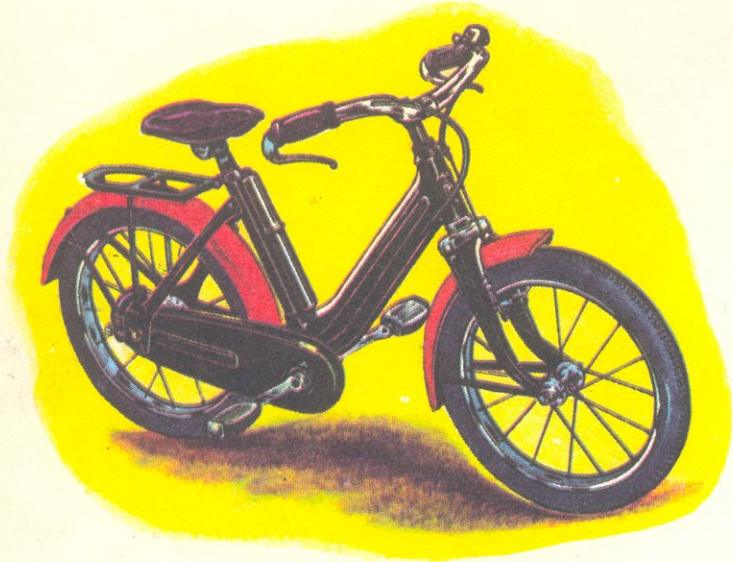
BRICKLAYER This man's skill with bricks helps to build houses.



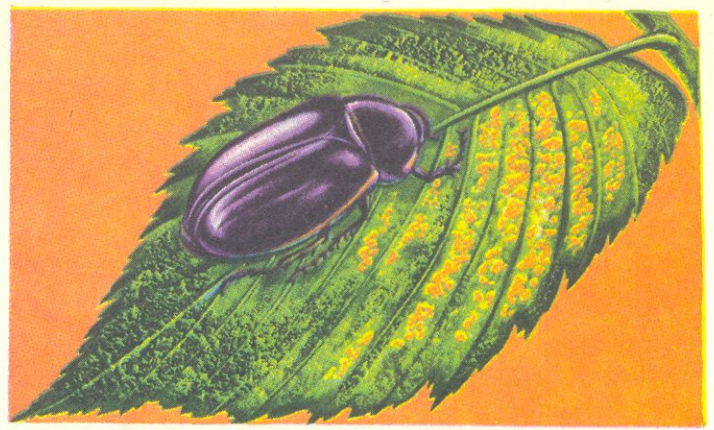
BED At night time, when you are tired, you go to bed to sleep.

BEETLE The beetle is an insect that destroys leaves and plants by slowly eating away at them.



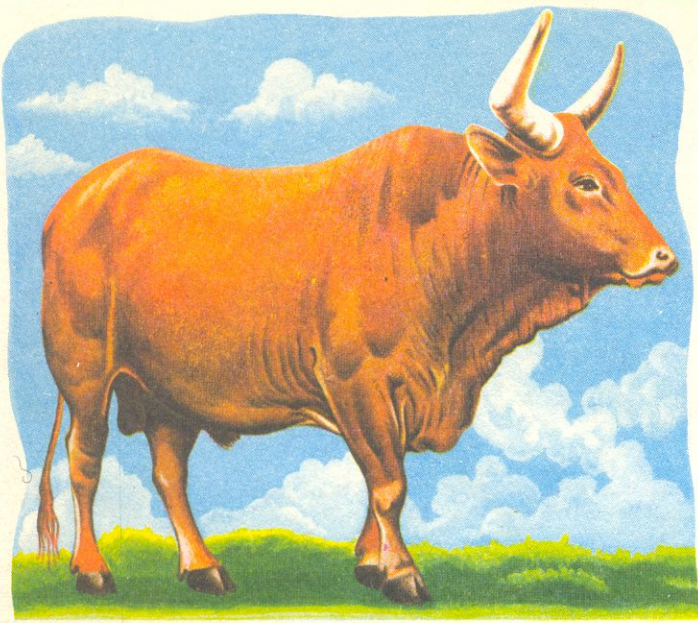
BOTANICAL GARDENS These are beautiful gardens that house all the many kinds of plant life that grow throughout the world.

BOOK SHELF You use this to keep your collection of books nice and tidy. Your Picture Dictionary should be kept there, too.



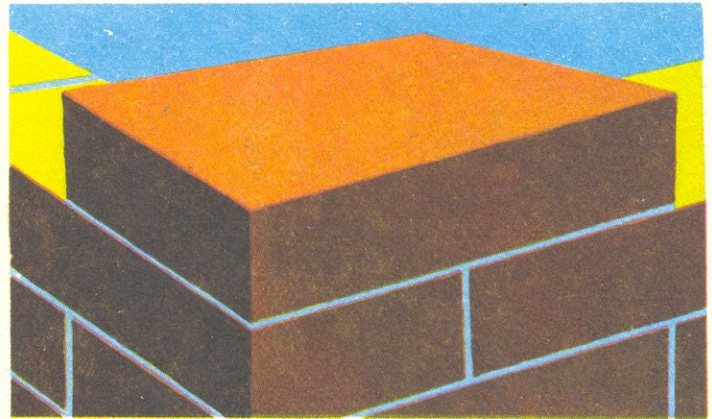
BULL The bull is the mate to a cow and the father of calves.



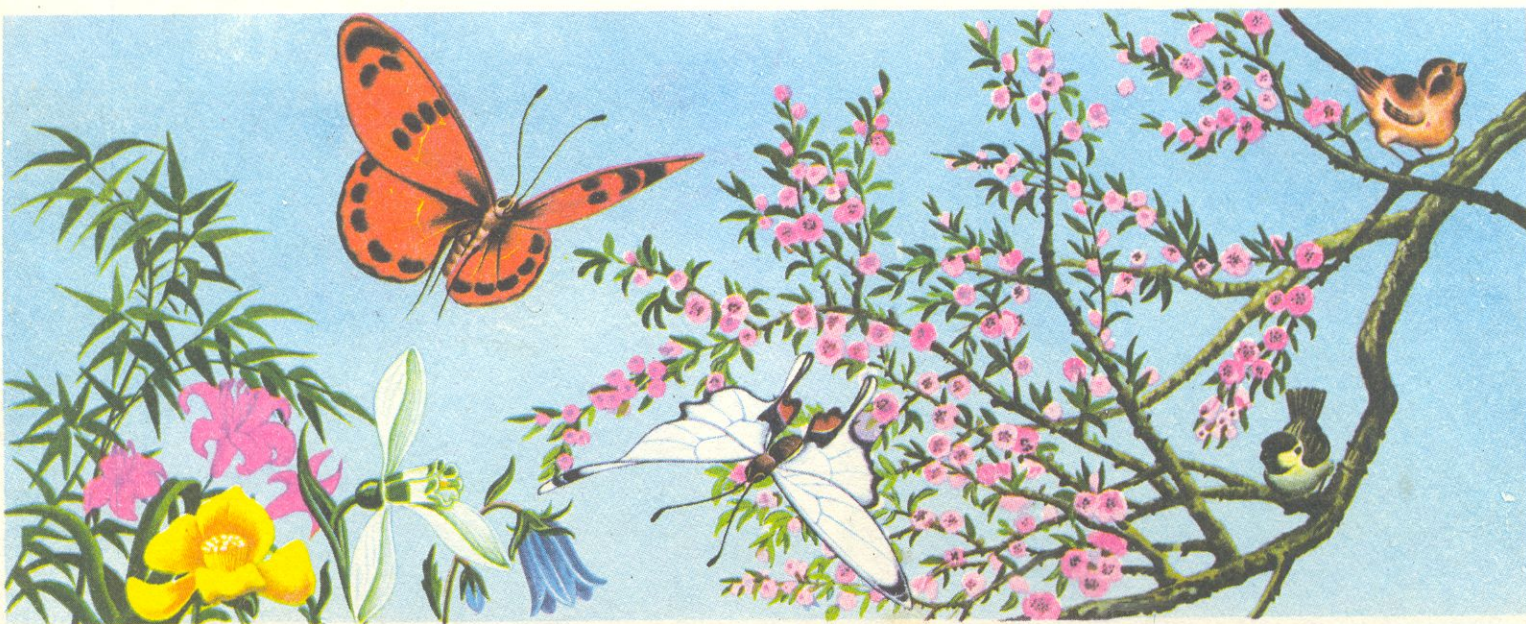
BALLOONS Balloons are brightly coloured and when they are filled with air, they float.



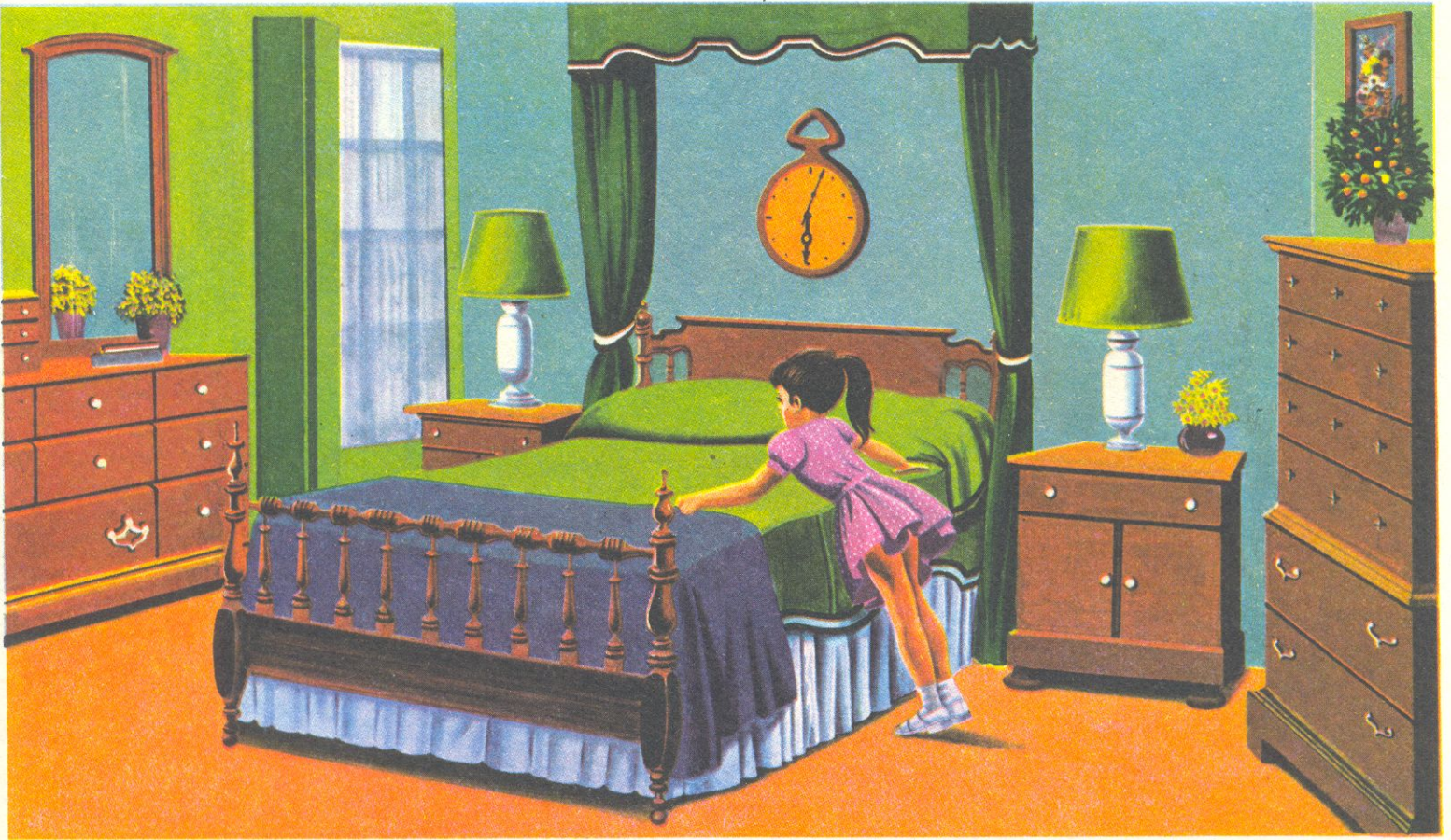
BLACKBERRY This is a small berry that grows on the bramble and can be eaten as a fruit.



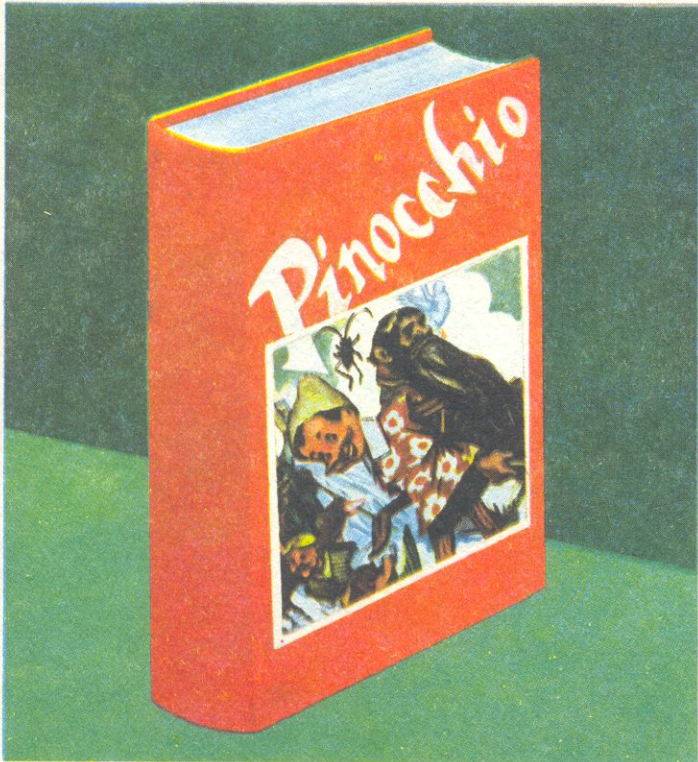
BRICKS These are blocks of clay baked hard and used as a building stone.



BUTTERFLY These are beautifully coloured insects that start life as caterpillars.



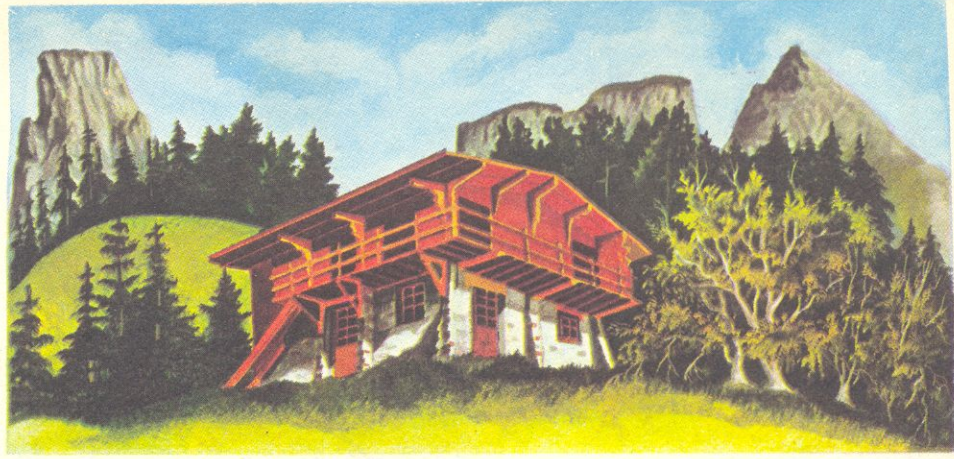
BEDROOM Your bed is kept in this room. You should also have cupboards and a wardrobe to keep your clothes in.



BOOK Some books, like your Picture Dictionary, are full of information. Others, like the one in the picture, have fairy tales for you to read.



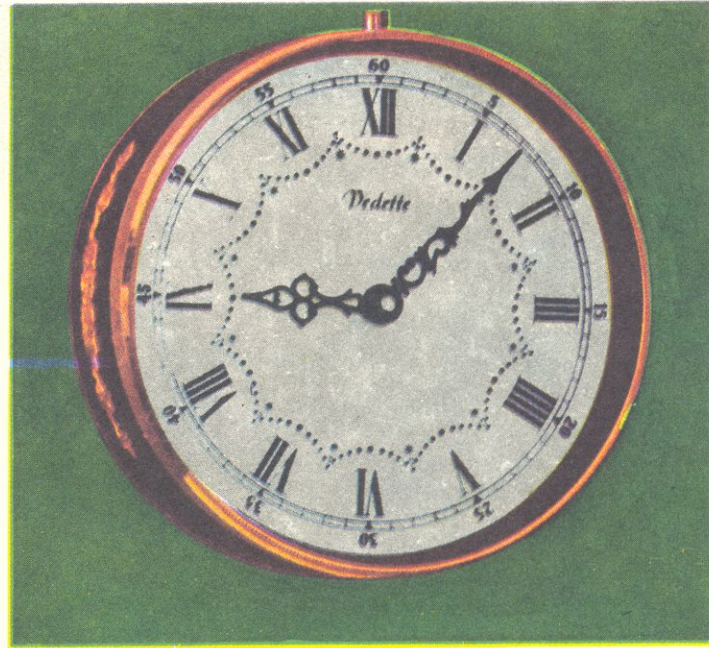
BOAT There are many different kinds of boats. The one in the picture is called a rowing boat.



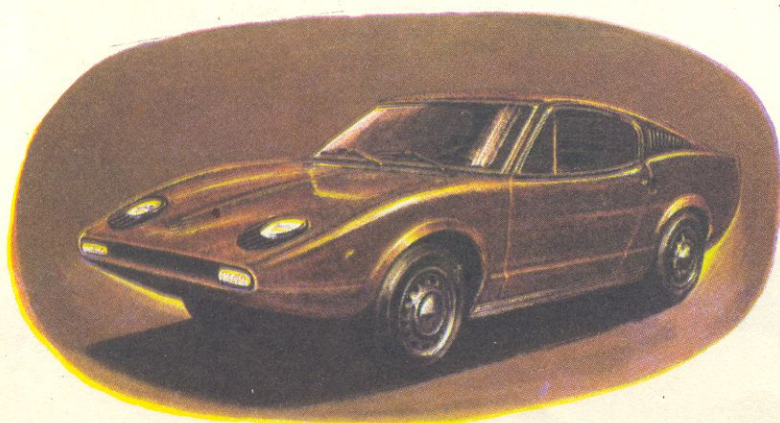
CABIN People who go to stay in the mountains live in houses called cabins.



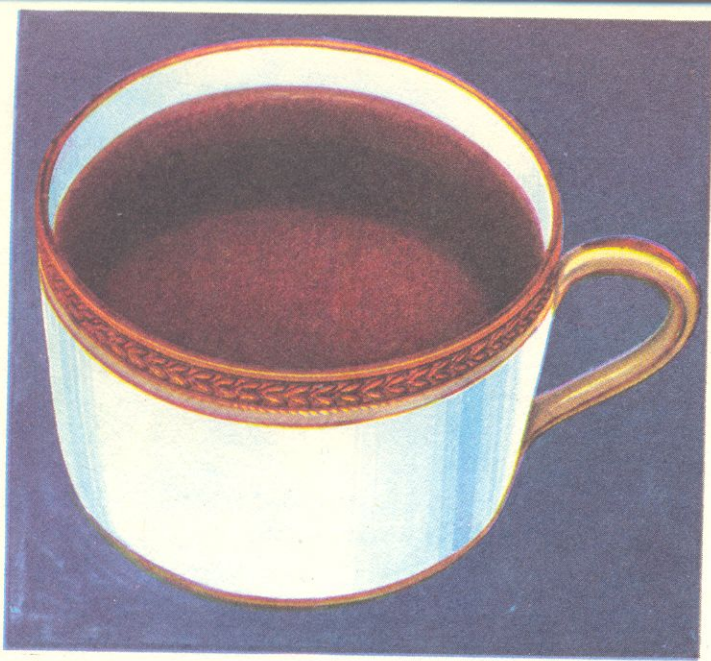
COOKING Most food has to be cooked before it can be eaten. Is your Mummy a good cook?

CLASSROOM When you go to school, you sit in a classroom with your friends to learn your lessons.



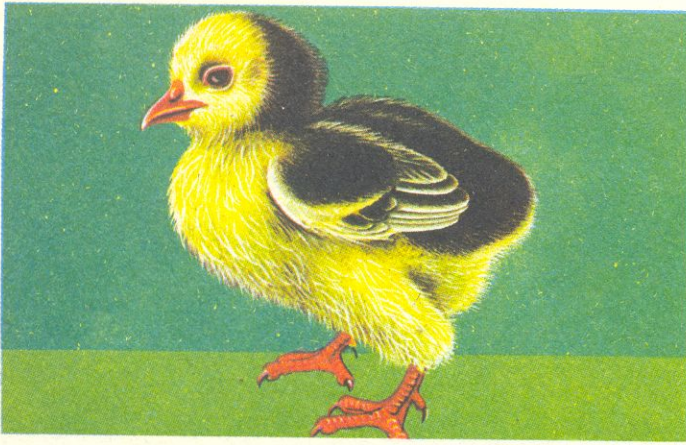
COACH People go for coach rides to visit places. They can carry lots of people.



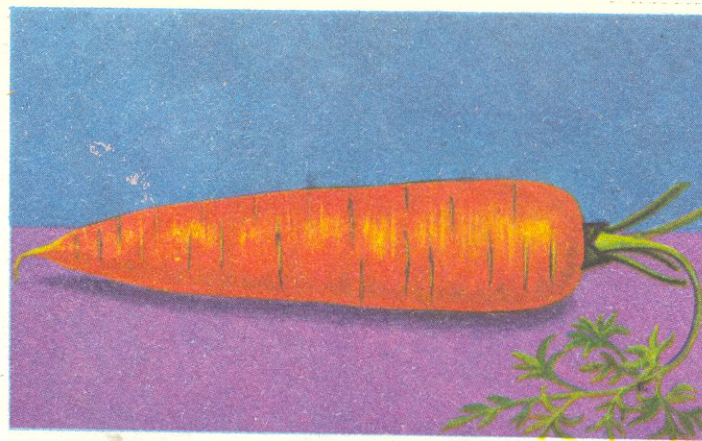
CARPENTER Carpenters work with wood. They use tools like hammers, saws, chisels and screwdrivers.



CUCUMBER Although the cucumber is a fruit, they are mostly eaten in salads. They are green in colour.



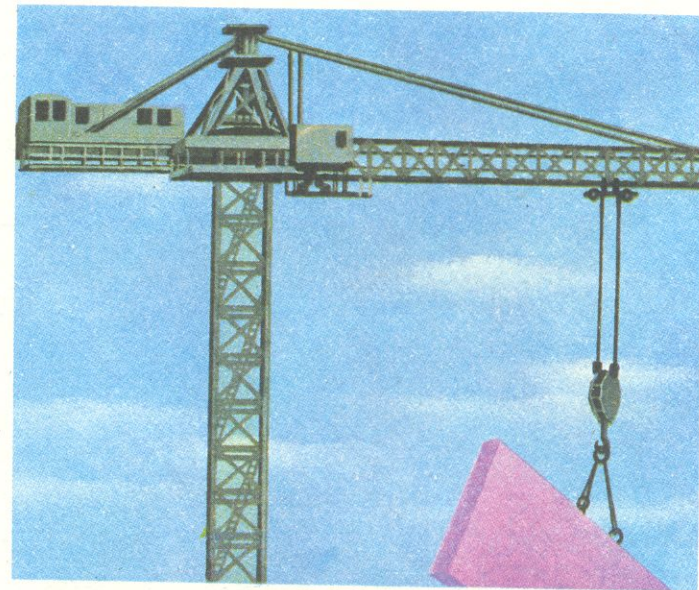
CHICK A chick is a young bird. They are all fluffy when they are hatched.



CARROT Carrots are actually roots of a plant. We eat them as a vegetable.



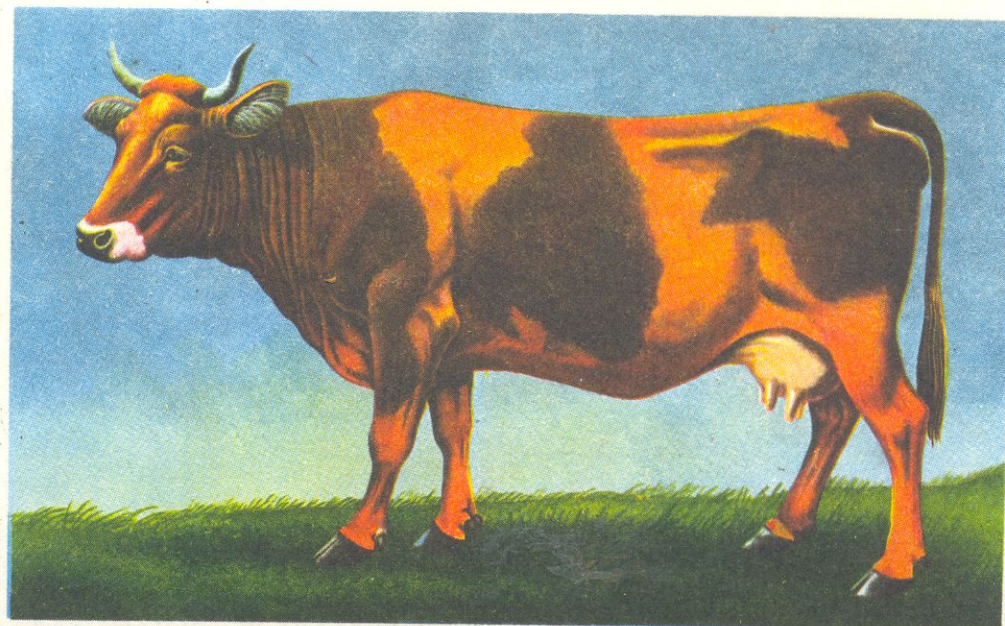
CABBAGE This is a vegetable, too. The centre of a cabbage is known as the heart.



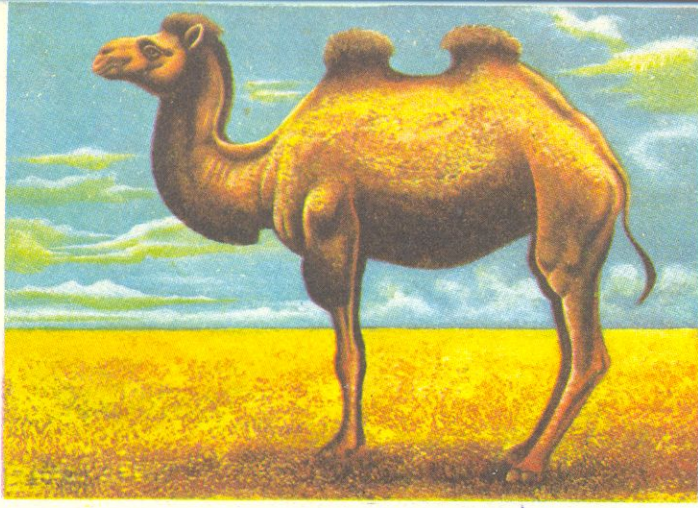
CRANE Cranes are used for lifting very heavy loads. A man, sitting in a cabin at the top, operates the crane.



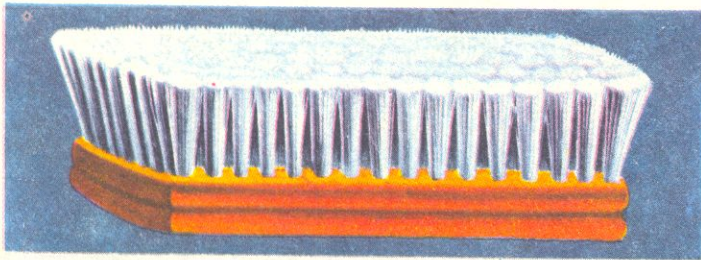
CHERRIES Cherries are a sweet fruit with a little stone in the centre of them.



COW We get our milk from cows. Can you see her udders?



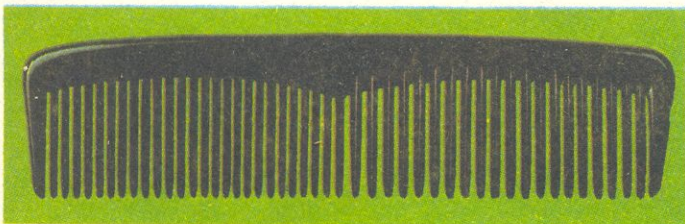
CAMEL The camel lives in hot climates like the Sahara Desert. It can go for many days without water.



CLOTHES BRUSH This brush has lots of bristles. They help to keep your clothes clean.



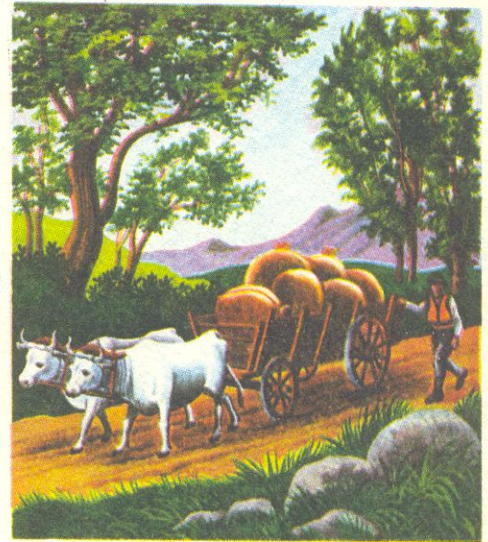
CORN Corn is grown and used as a cereal. Do you like cornflakes for breakfast?



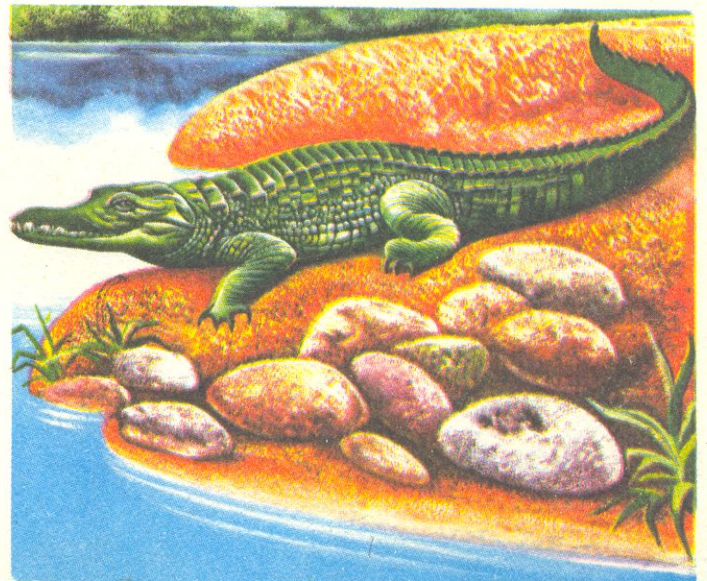
COMB By running the teeth of a comb through your hair, you can keep it tidy.



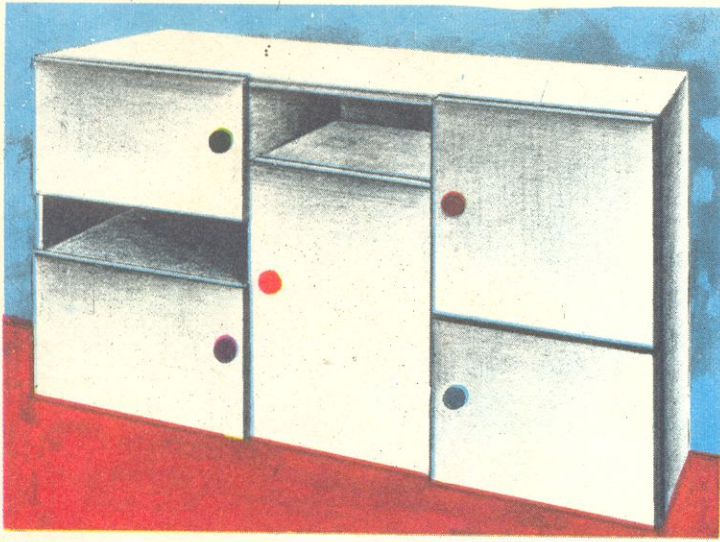
COAT This is a garment worn over your clothes to keep you warm.



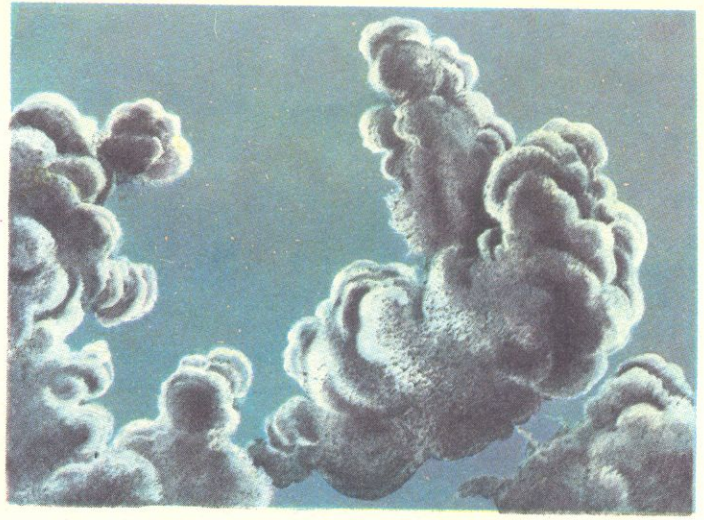
CART In some countries, farmers use carts drawn by oxen to move heavy loads.



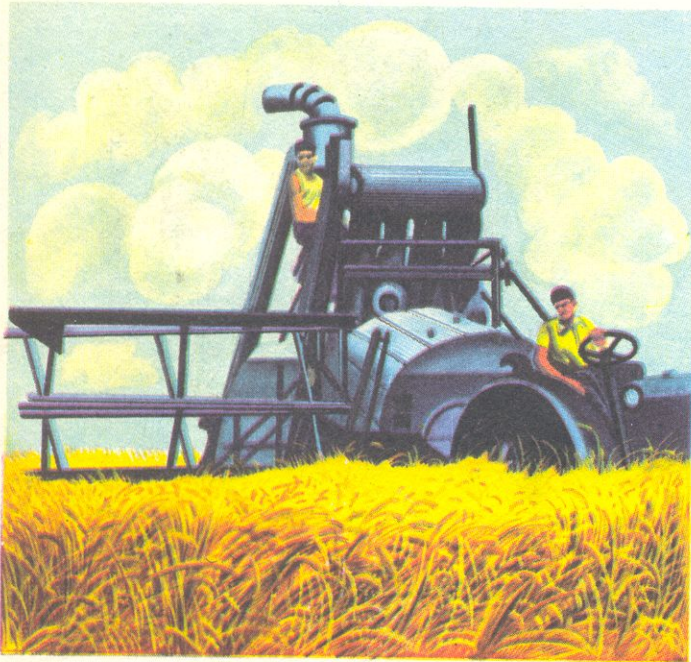
CROCODILE This reptile can live on land or in water. His sharp teeth make him very dangerous.

COCK This is the male bird. His crowing heralds the dawn.



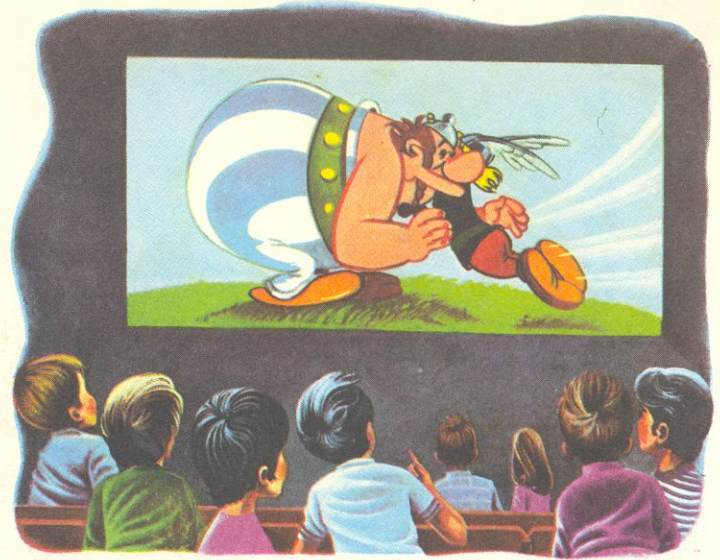
CUCKOO The cuckoo is a funny bird. She lays her eggs in other birds' nests.



CAKE There are many delicious varieties of cake. Do you like to eat some for your tea?



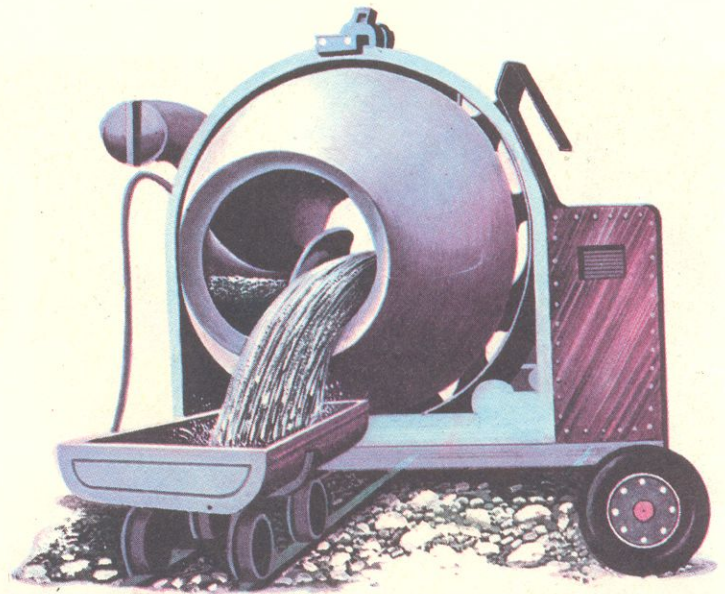
CLOWNS You see clowns at circuses. They wear funny clothes and have painted faces.



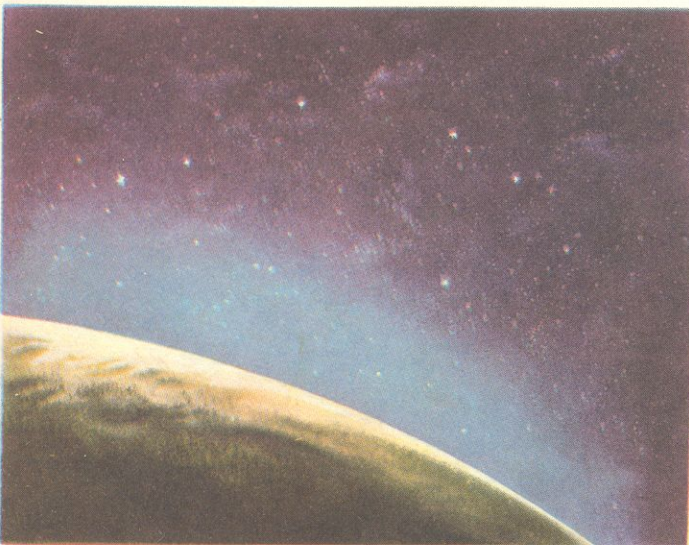
CINEMA Films are shown at cinemas. The one in our picture is called a cartoon.

DAHLIA Dahlias are very pretty and have single and double flowers.



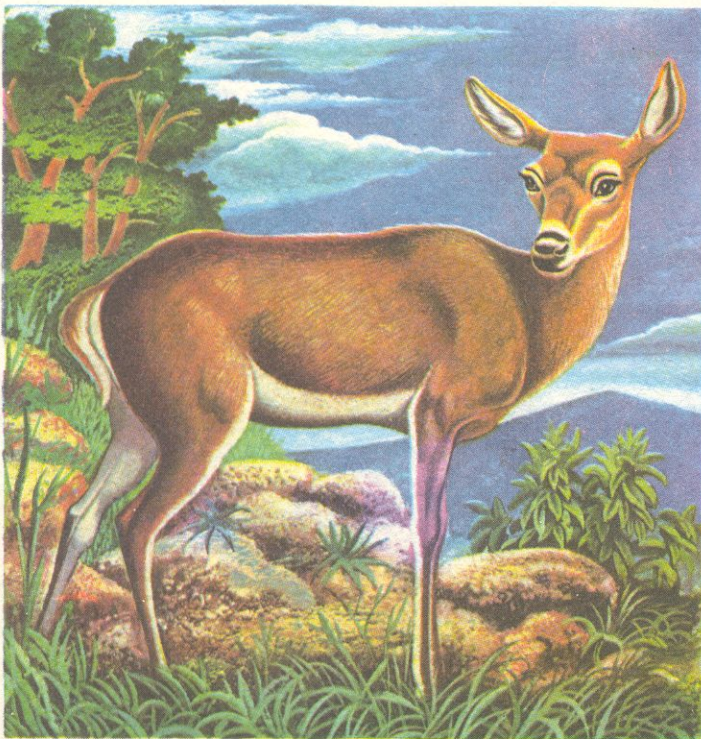
DENTIST When your teeth ache, the dentist is the man who looks after them.

DONKEY Donkeys are beasts of burden. They are used for giving children rides at the seaside as well.



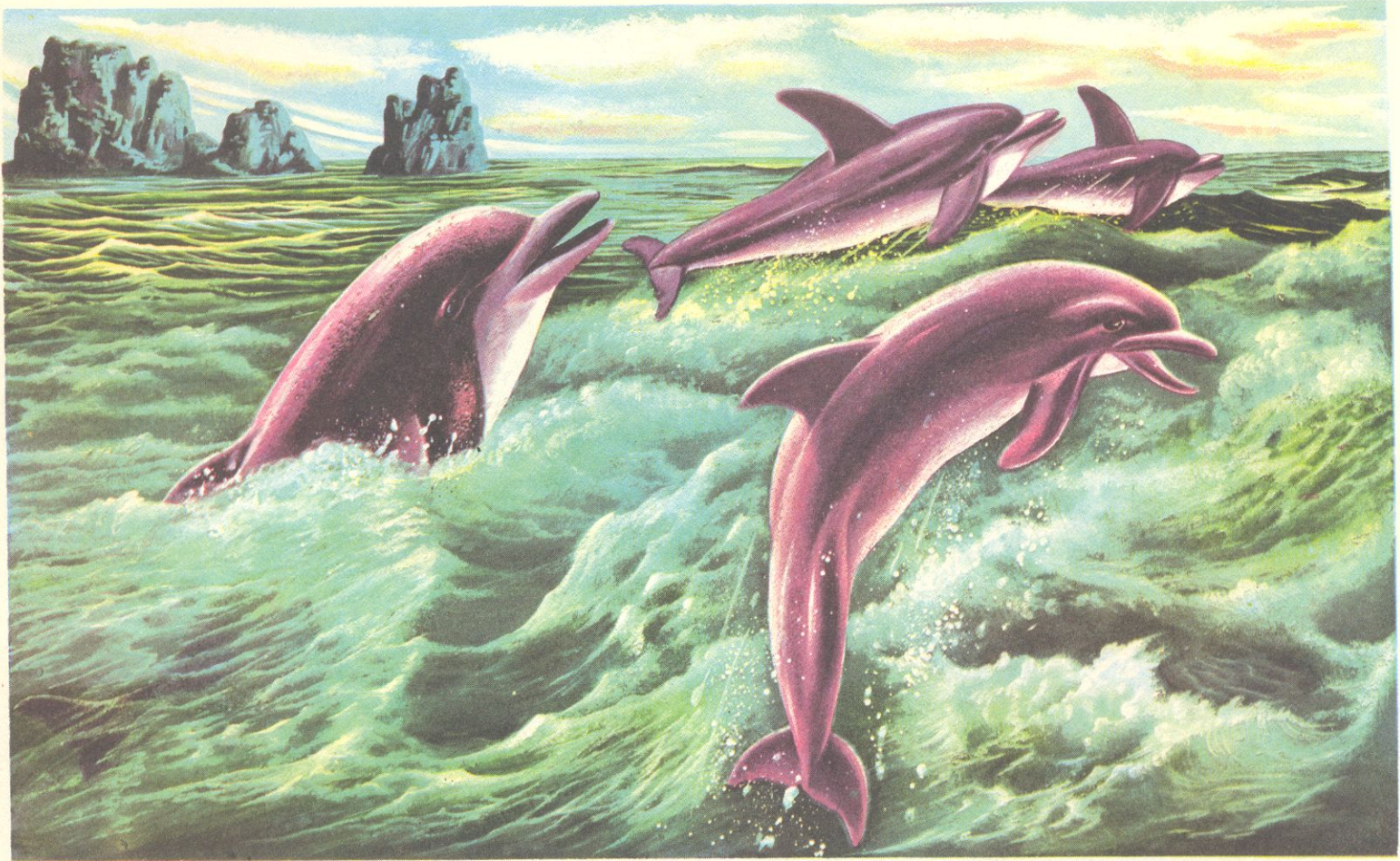
DEER In bygone days, the deer was hunted for its meat.

DRESS A dress is a long garment worn by women.



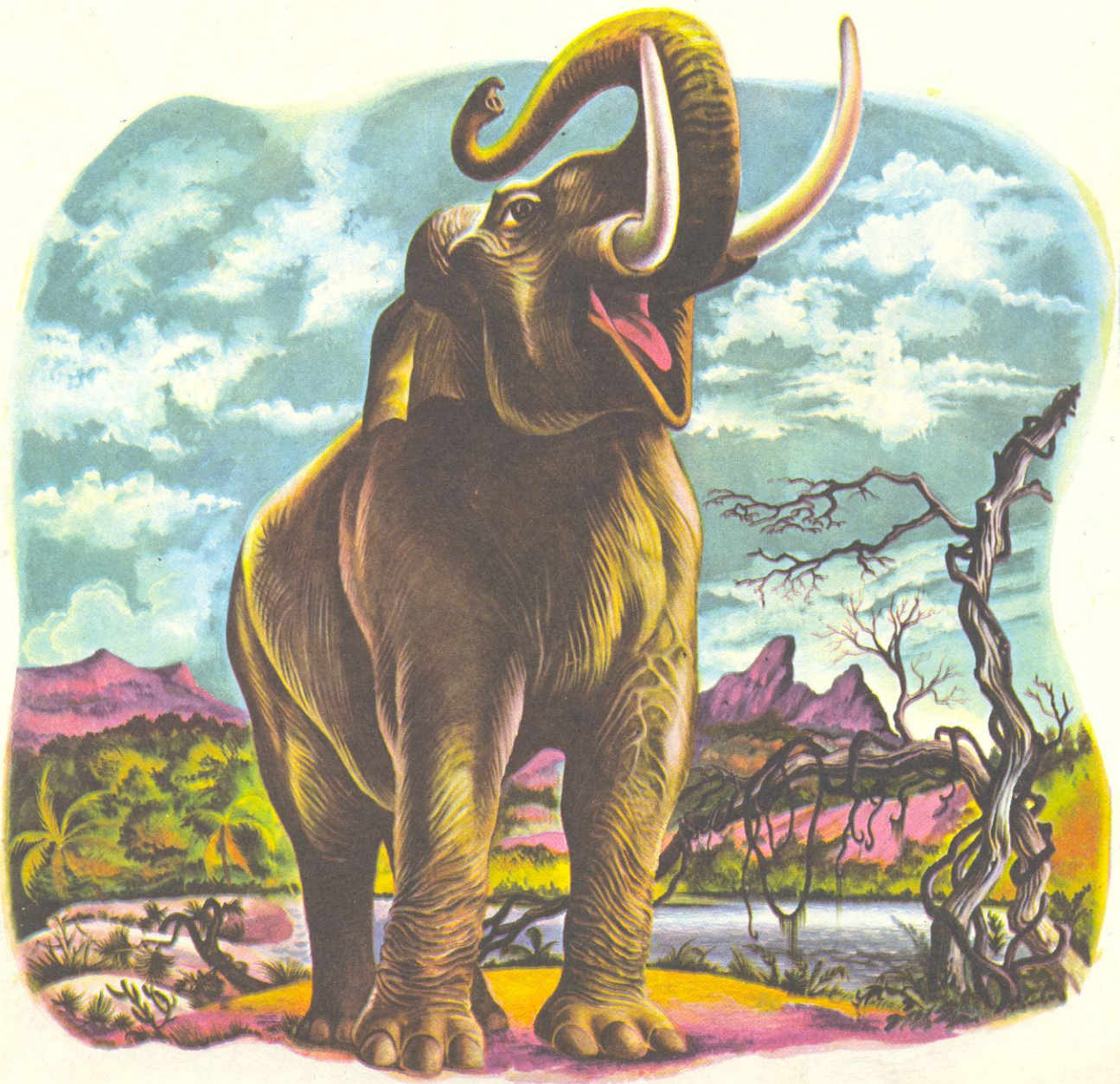
DOLPHINS These are very intelligent and playful fish. They can be trained to do many clever tricks.



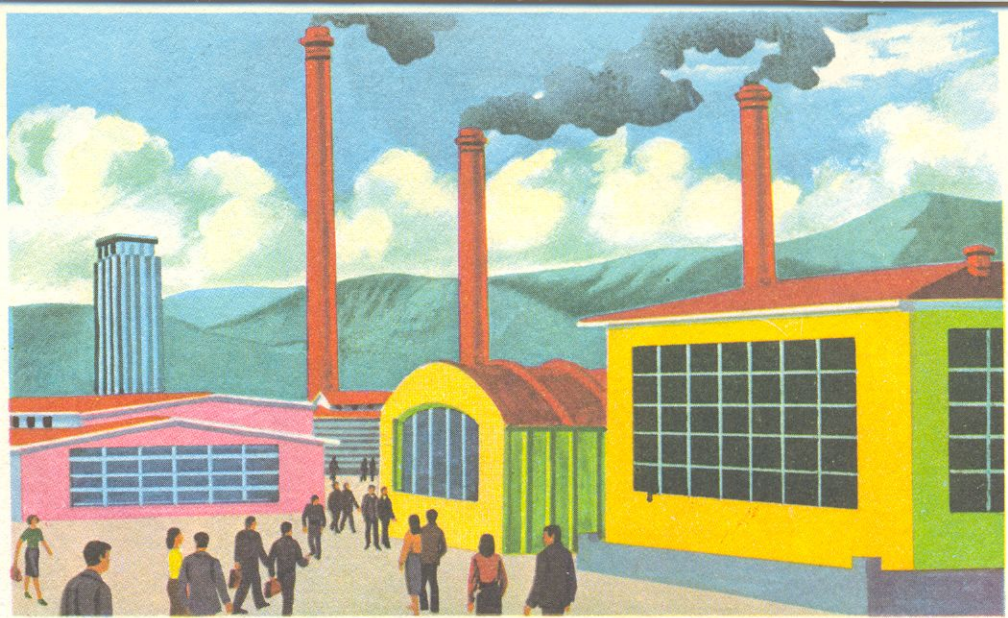
DOG Dogs are known as 'man's best friend'. They make very good pets.



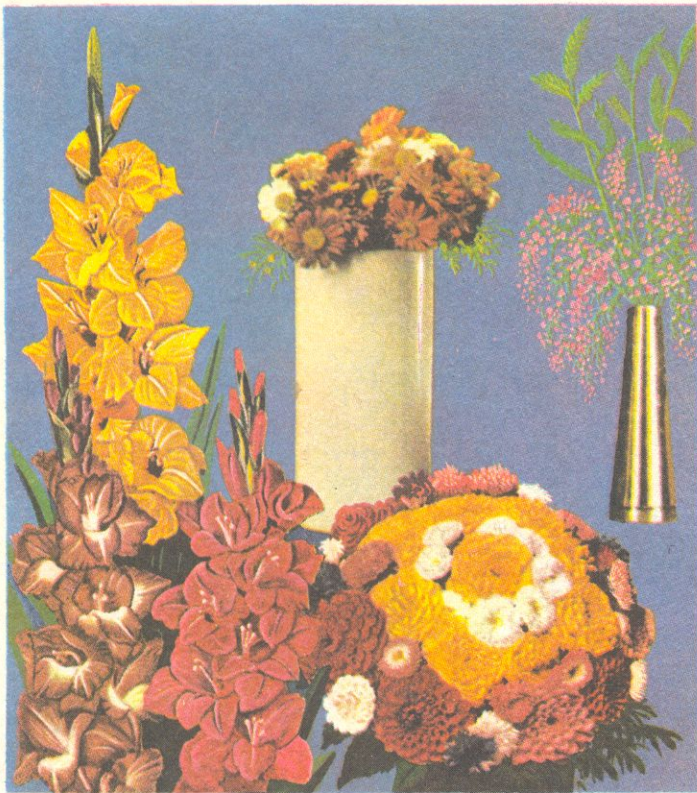
EDUCATION Being educated can mean everything from learning arithmetic, geography and history to being taught how to play games.

FLAX This plant is cultivated for its textile fibre.



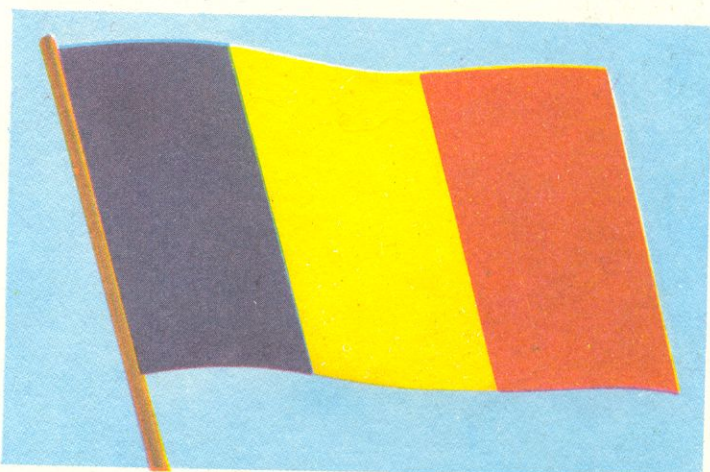
FORK A fork has a long handle and four prongs at the end. This is to help you pick up your food when eating.



FLATS A block of flats is lots of small houses built on top of one another.



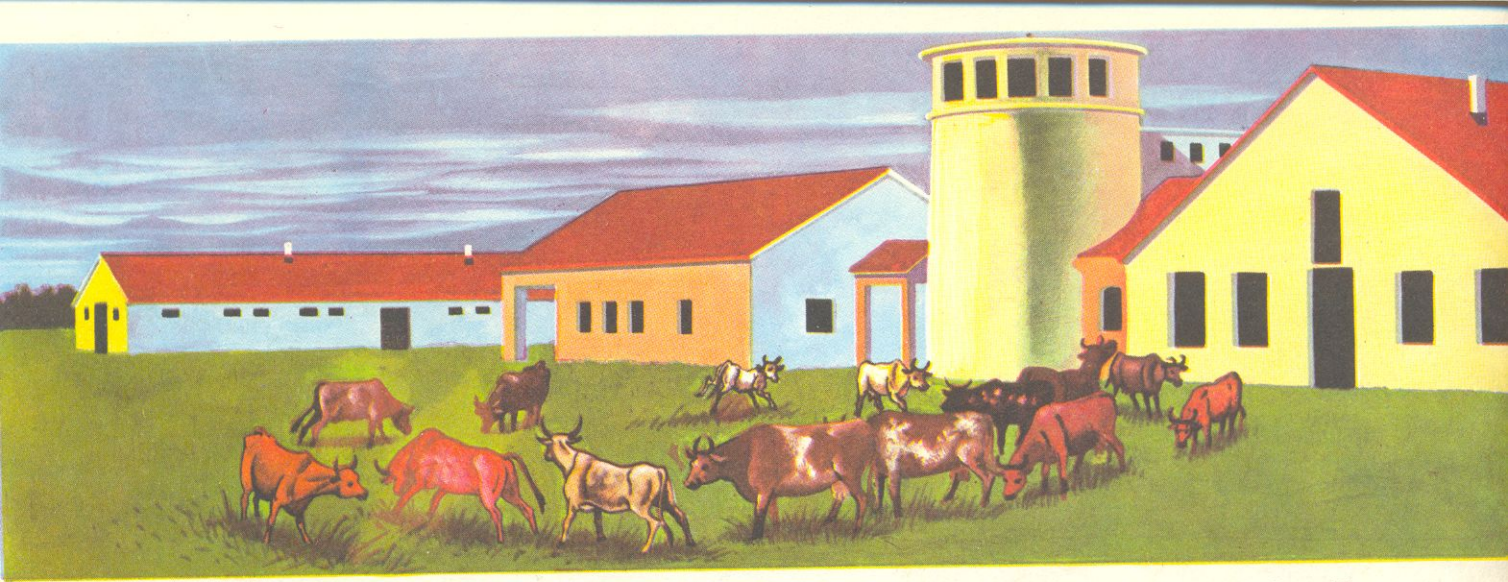
FROG Frogs can live on land or in water. They move by hopping.



FLAG Each country has a flag with its national colours on. The flag in the picture represents Romania.



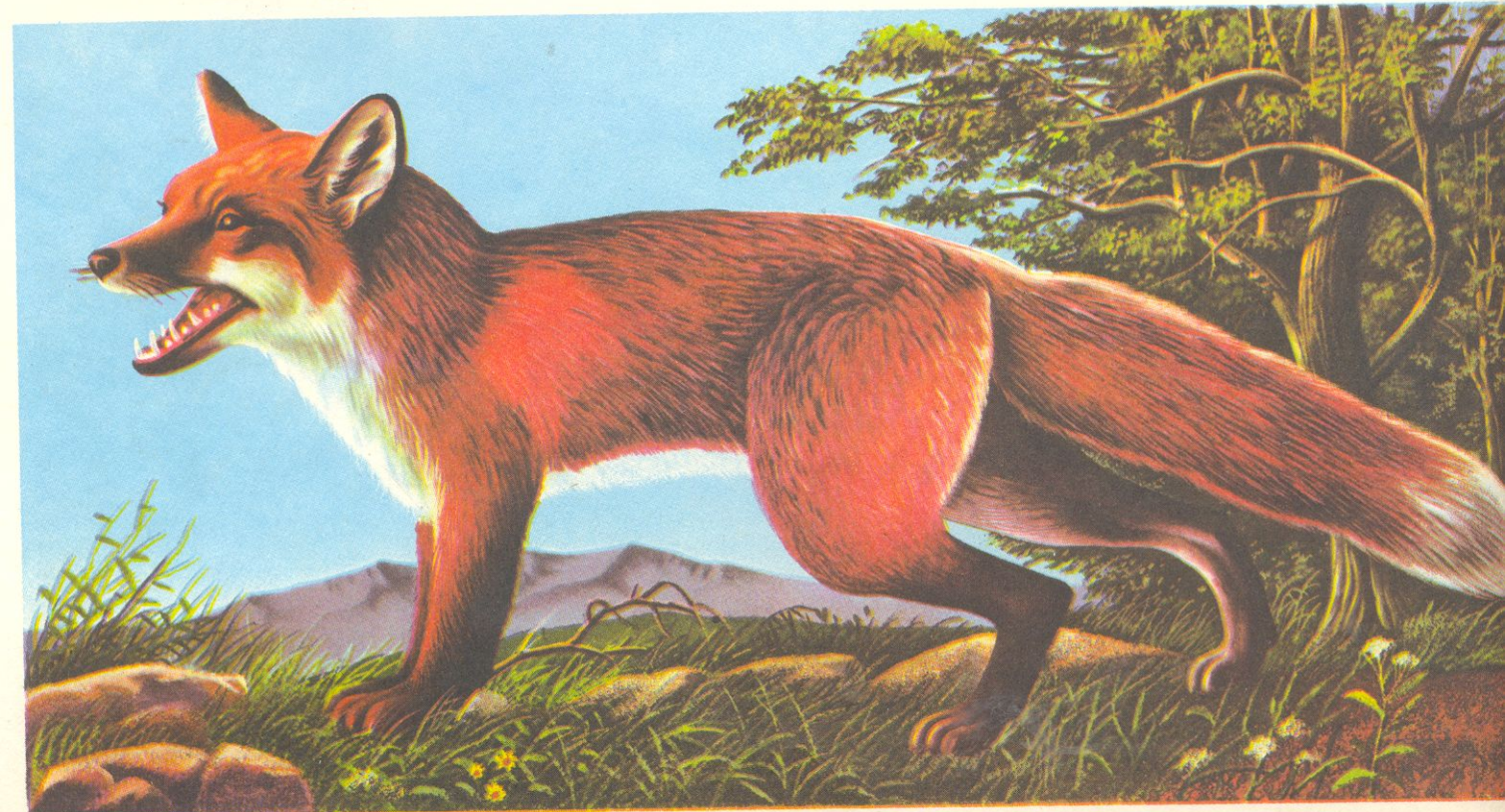
FROGMAN With special breathing equipment, frogmen can stay underwater for a long time.



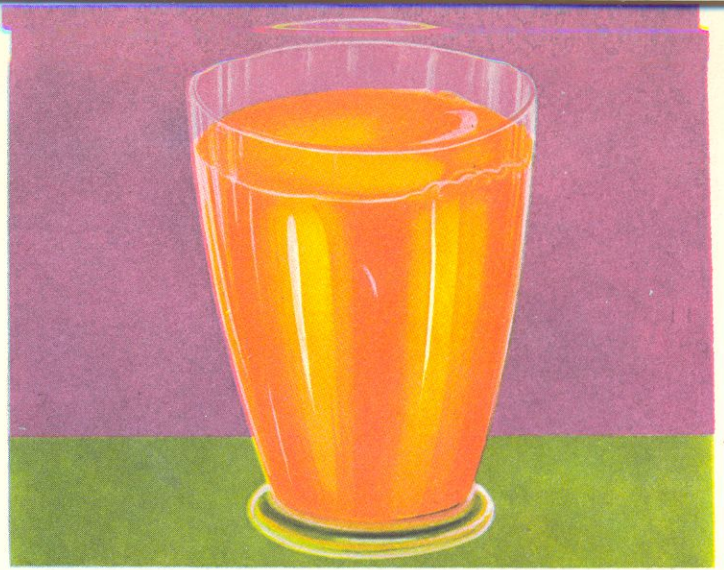
FARM The farm in the picture is a dairy farm. Cows are kept there for their milk.



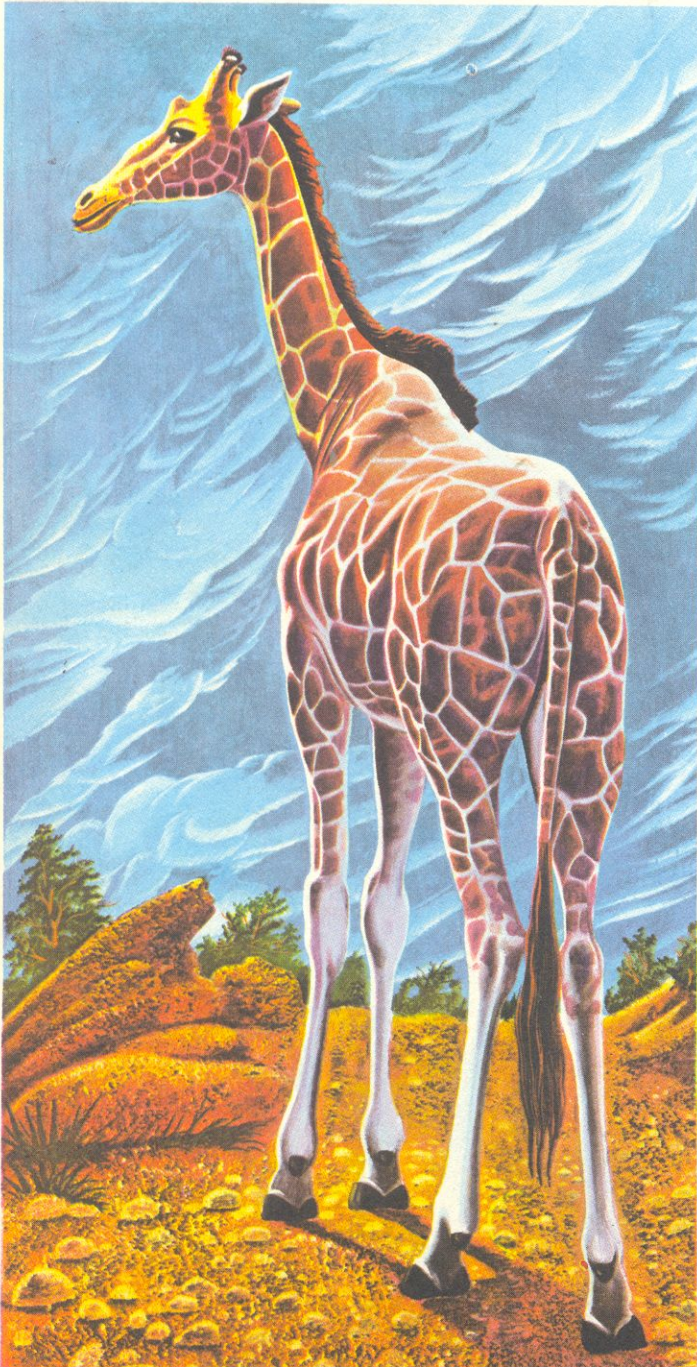
FAIRY TALES Fairy tales are make-believe stories about mythical people and lands.



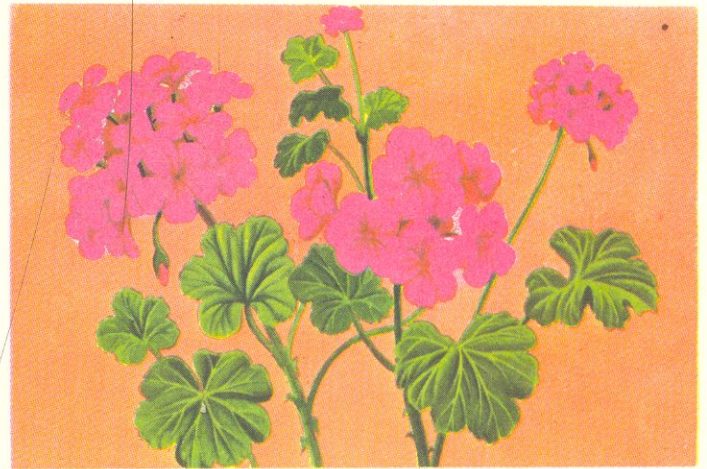
FOX This is a cunning animal. They like to eat the farmer's chickens.



GLASS Glasses are drinking vessels. This glass has orange juice in it.



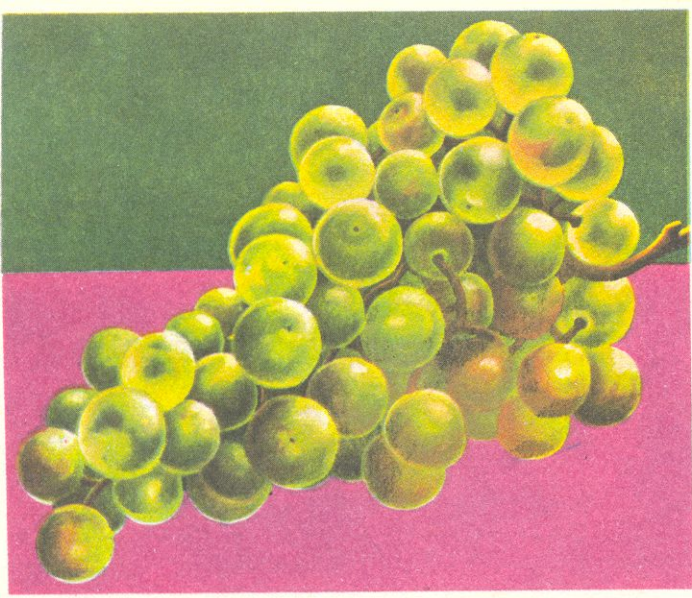
GIRAFFE Do you see the giraffe's long legs and neck. This is so that it can reach up to the tall branches and eat the leaves off the trees.



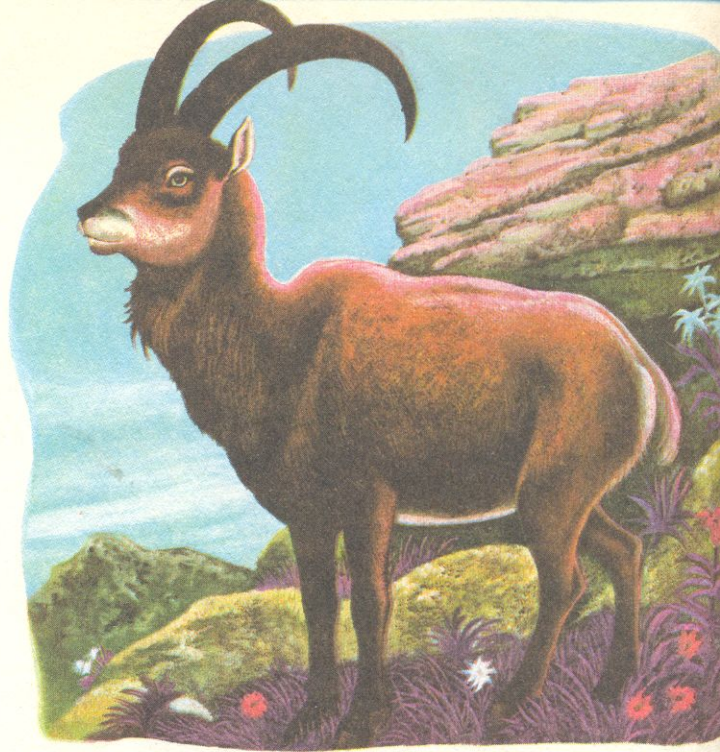
GERANIUM Although the geranium is a wild plant, they can also be grown indoors.



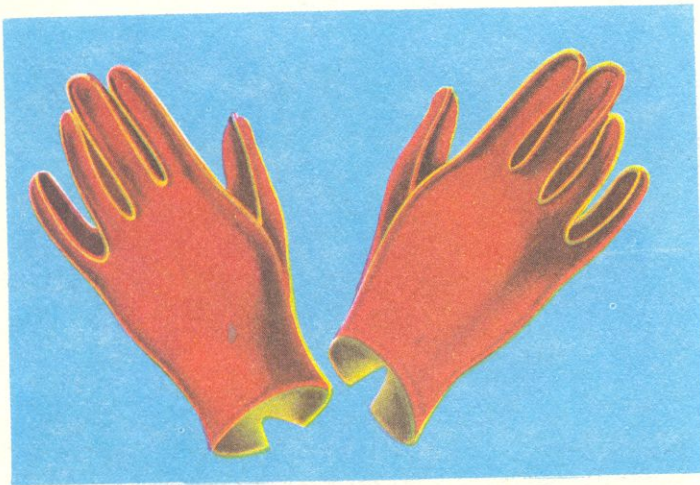
GARDENER He is the man who tends the garden. He keeps it looking very pretty by weeding and pruning.



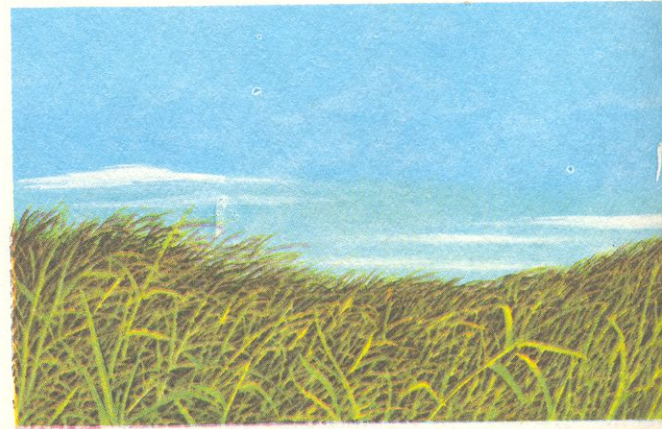
GRAPES Grapes are eaten as a fruit. They grow on vines. Wine is also made from them.



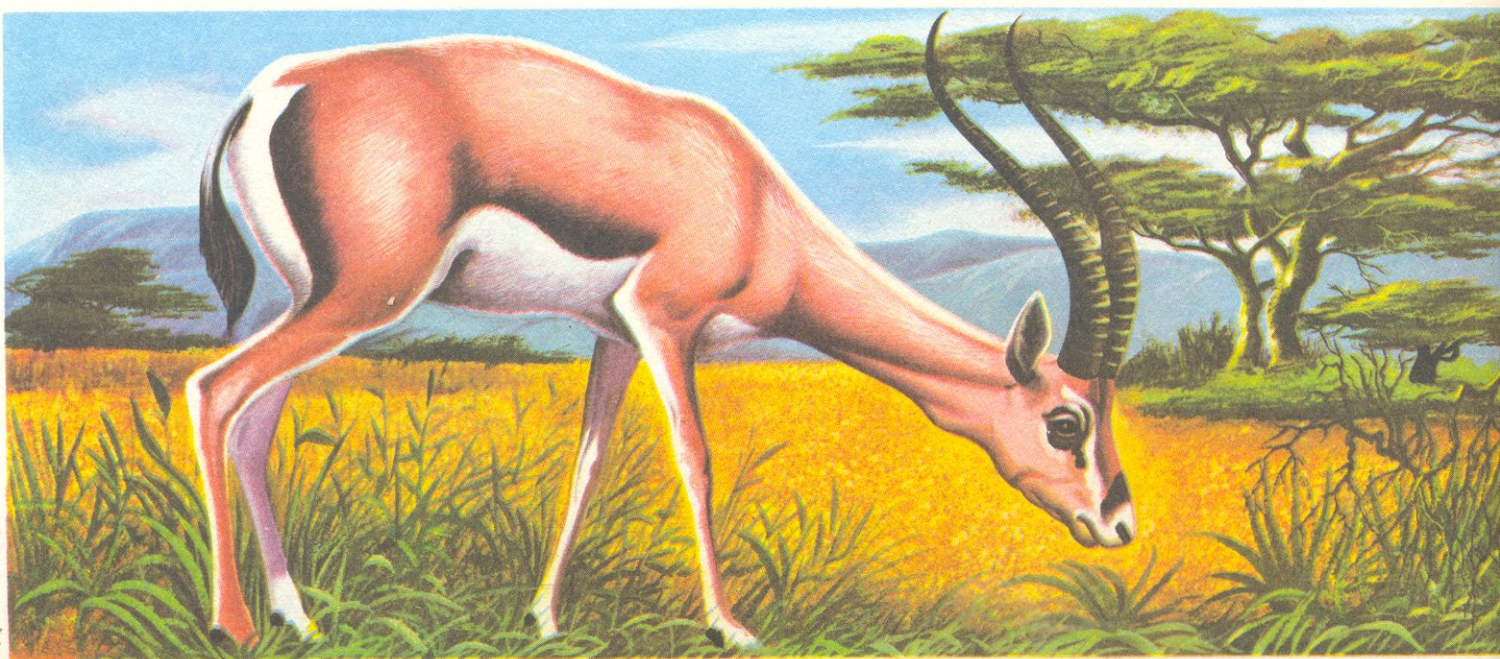
GOAT The goat in the picture is a black goat. He likes to run free in rocky surrounds.

GAZELLE The gazelle is a graceful, soft-eyed kind of antelope.



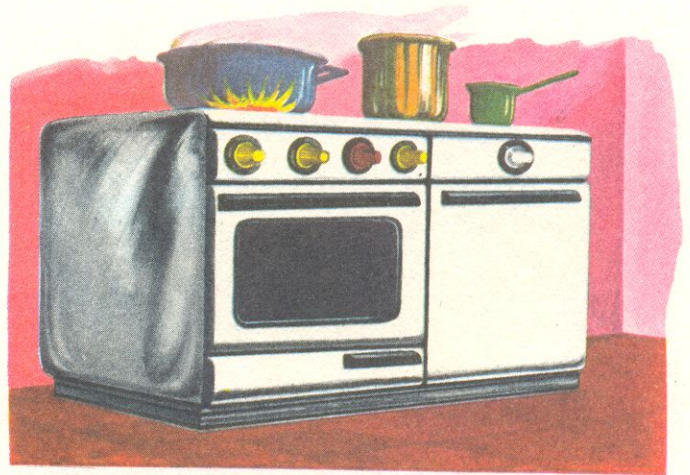
GOAT Here is another kind of goat. See how long and shaggy his coat is.



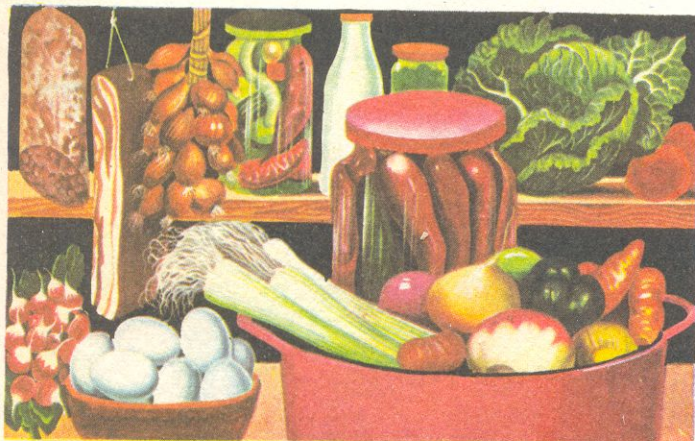
GOLDFINCH Our friend the goldfinch is a brightly-coloured song bird.



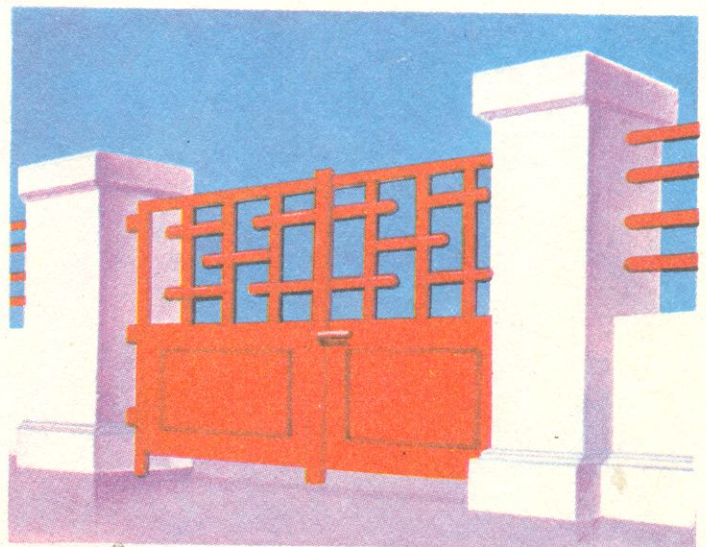
GARLIC Garlic is used as a flavouring in cooking. It has a very strong taste.



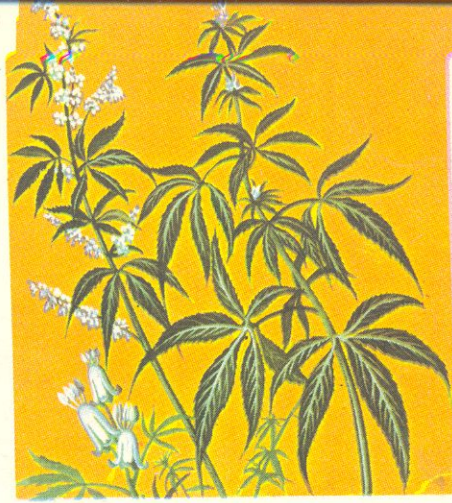
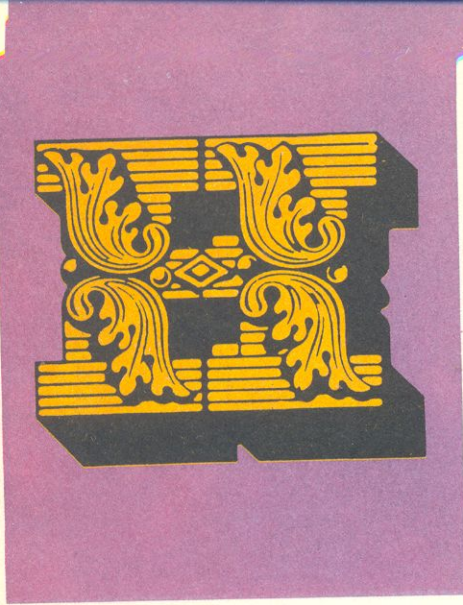
GAS STOVE Your Mummy cooks the food on a gas stove.

GATE If you have a fence or a wall surrounding a building, you need a gate to be able to go in and out.

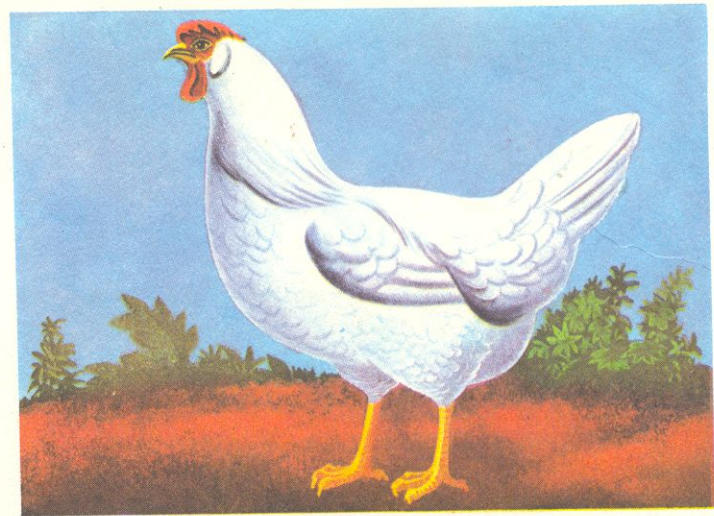


HEMP The fibres of hemp are very tough and are used for making rope.

HAYSTACK After the hay has been cut, it is stacked as shown in the picture.



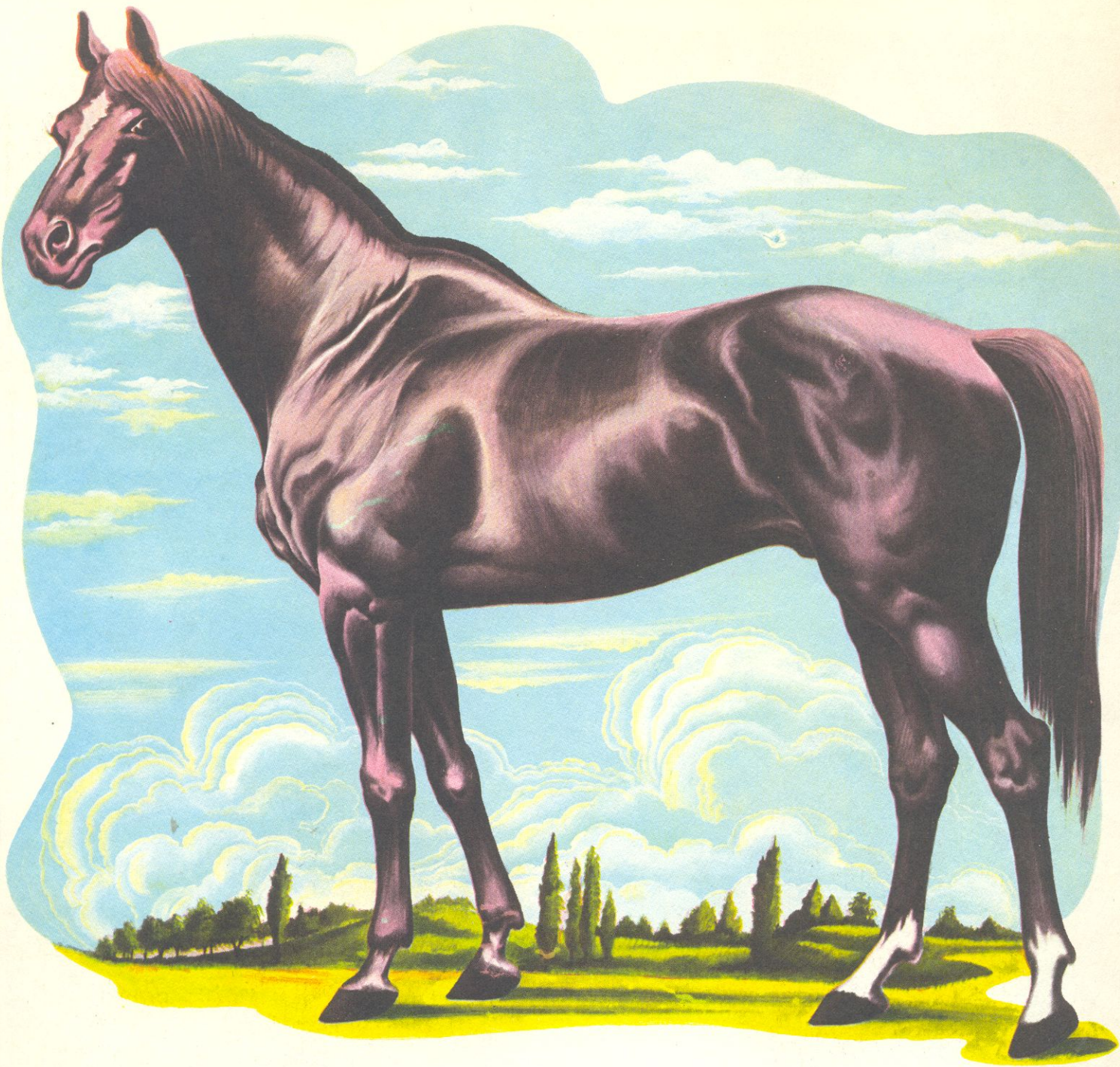
HEDGEHOG This tiny animal curls himself into a ball when he is in danger. The sharp spines on his back protect him.



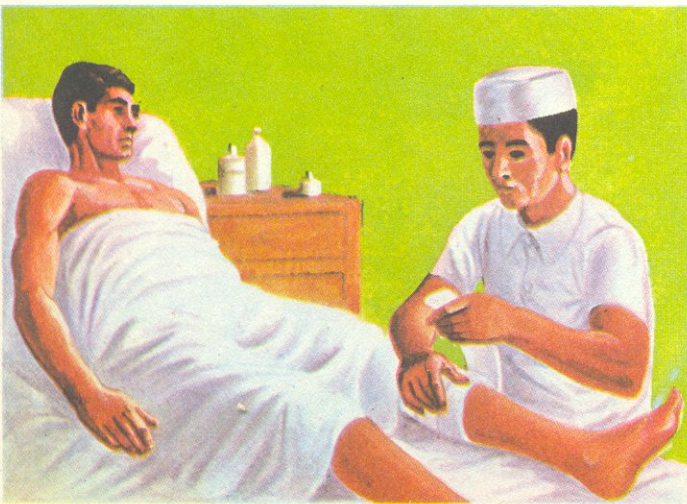
HEN Most of us like eggs for breakfast. The hen lays them for us.



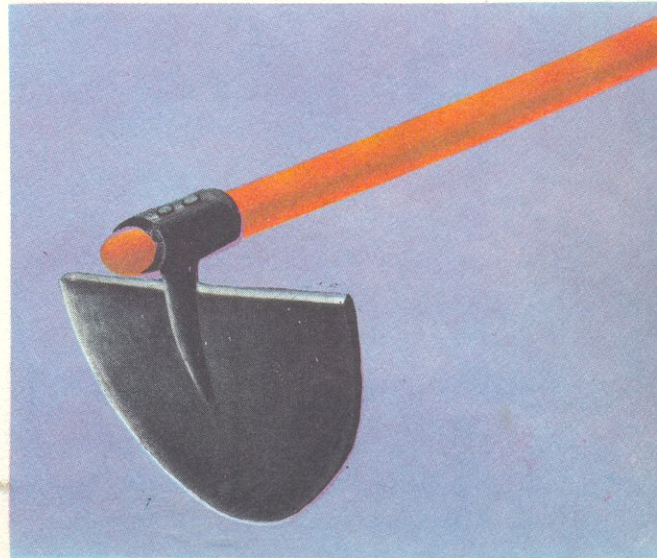
HYDRO-ELECTRICITY This is electricity produced by water power.



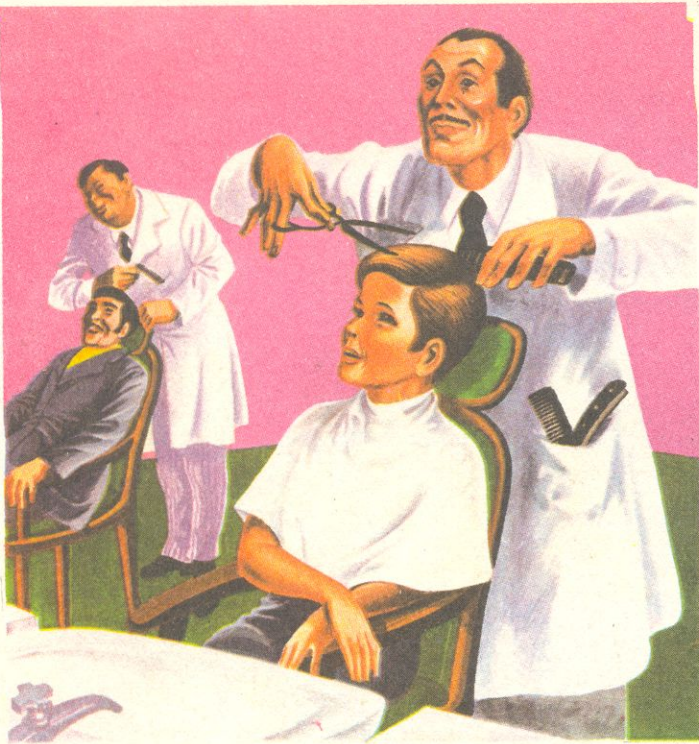
HORSE As well as a beast of burden the horse is used in sporting circles. The one in the picture is a race horse.



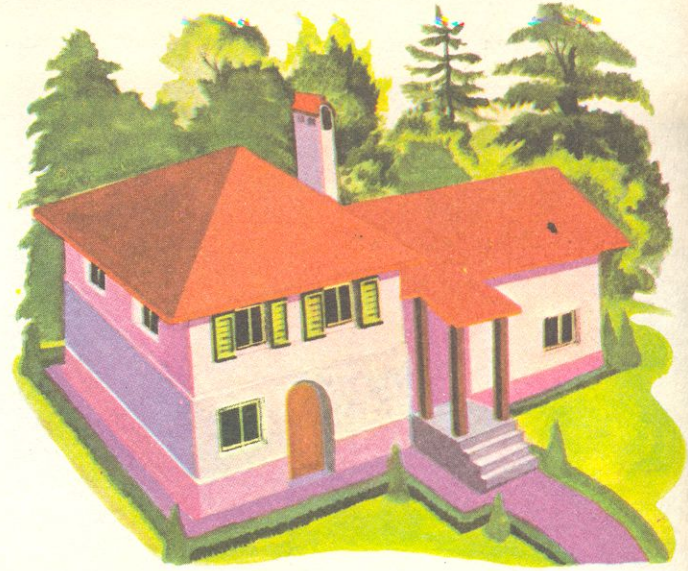
HOSPITAL Doctors and nurses work in hospitals. That is where people go when they are ill.

HAIRDRESSER Hairdressers cut and style hair. Have you had your hair cut recently?



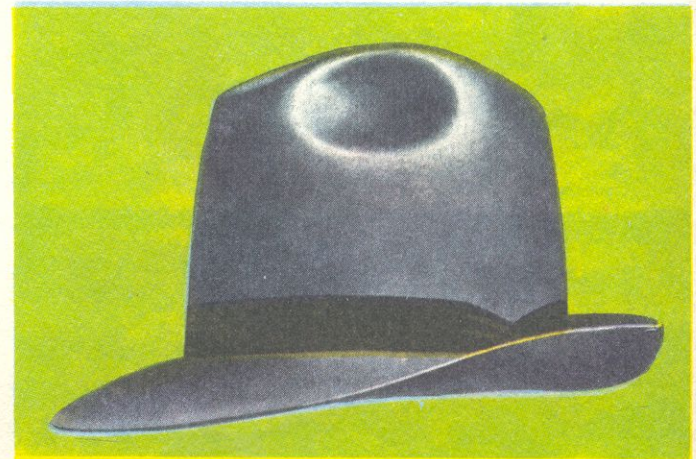
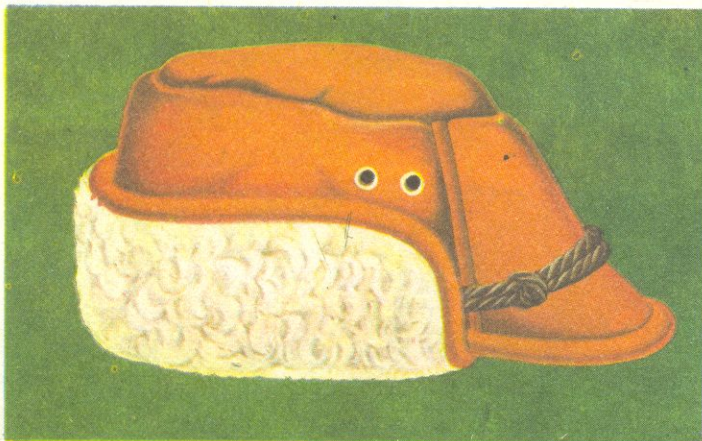
HOUSE Houses are dwellings for people to live in. They are usually made from bricks.

ICE-CREAM You eat ice-cream when it has been chilled in the fridge. It comes in many flavours.



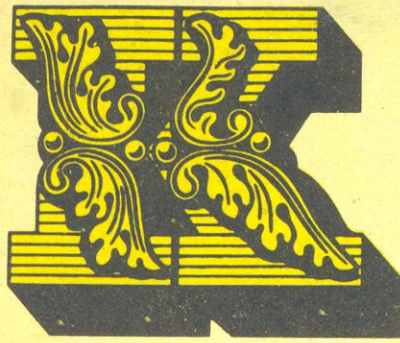
INSULAR This is an island surrounded on all sides by water.



JACKAL Jackals are animals of the dog kind. They are about the size of a fox.



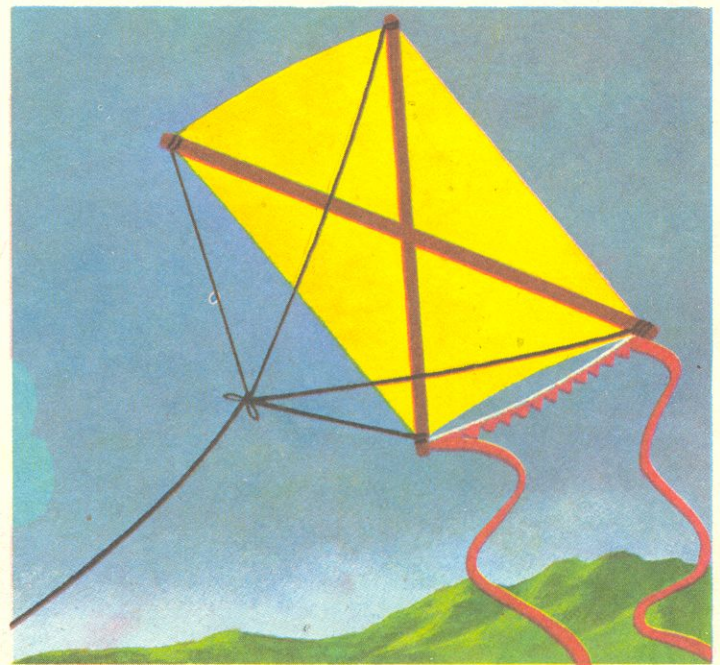
JOCKEYS Men who ride horses in races are called jockeys.



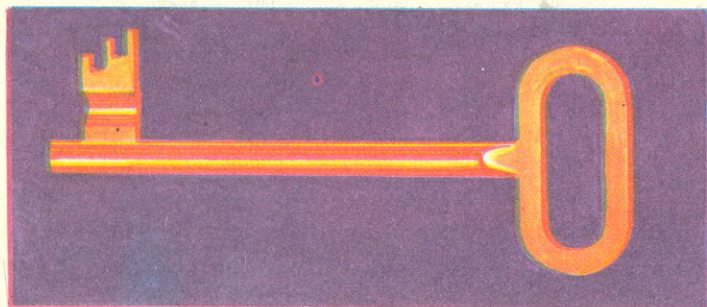
KANGAROO This animal is a marsupial. This means it carries its young in a pouch.

KITE Kites are brightly coloured pieces of material, tied to a piece of string, which soar high into the air carried by the wind.



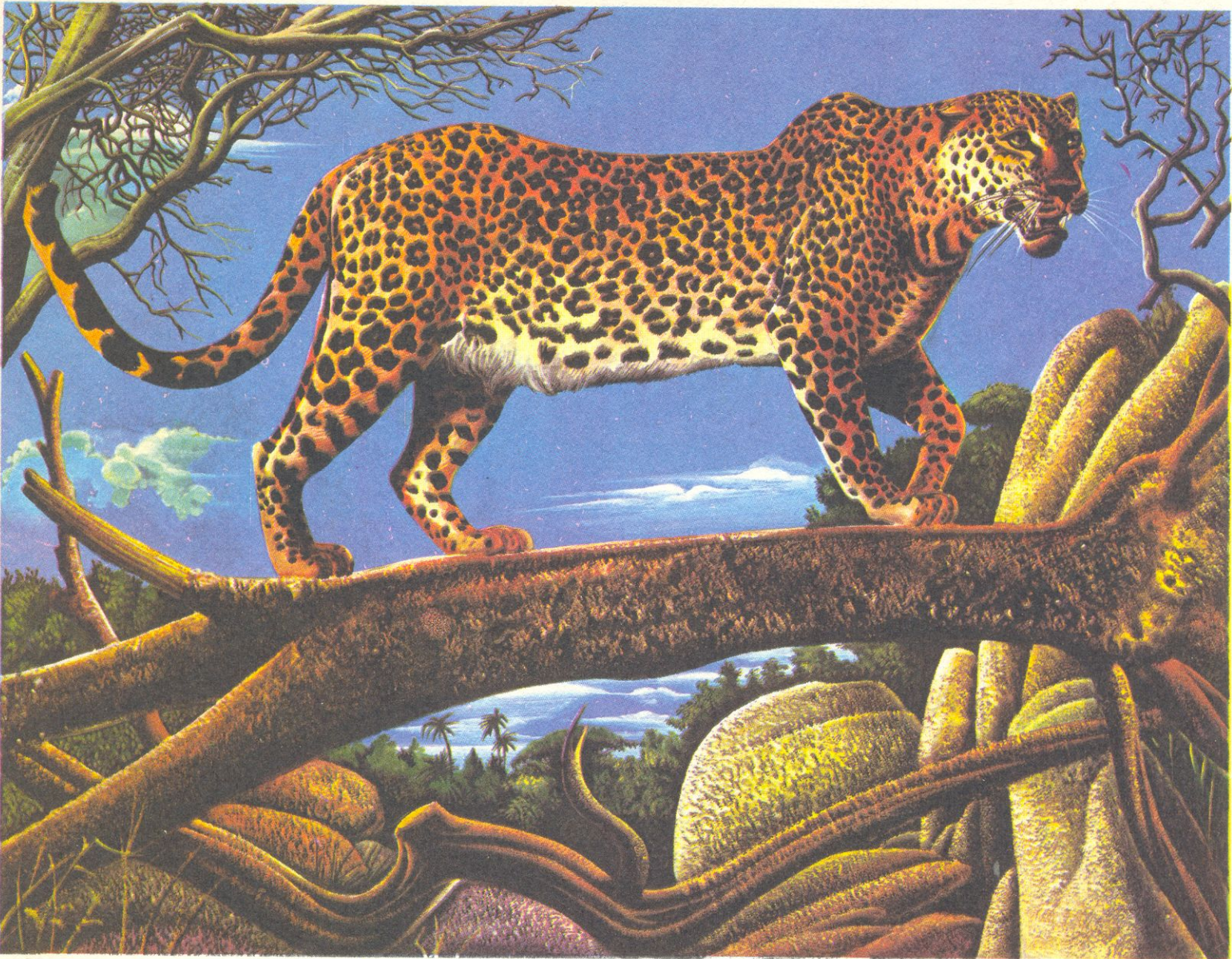
KEY To unlock a door or safe, you need a key. Each lock has its own key.



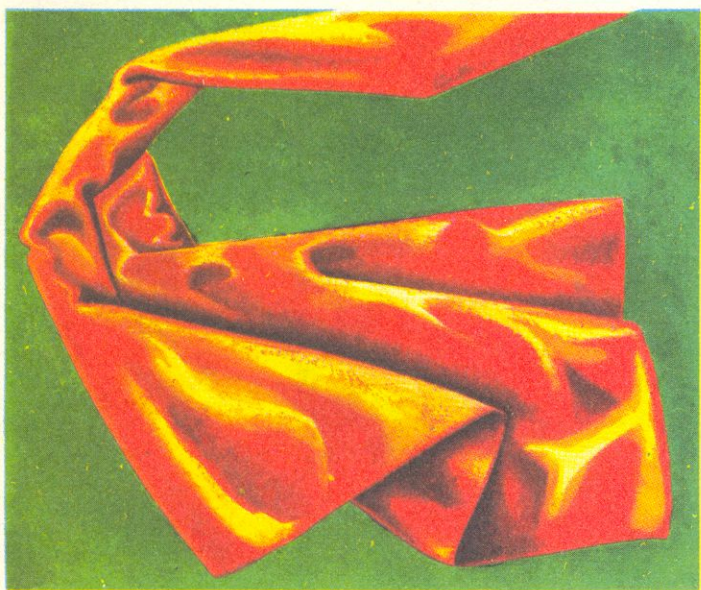
LAKE Lakes are an expanse of water usually surrounded by highland.



LLAMAS They live in South America and are like the camel but without humps.



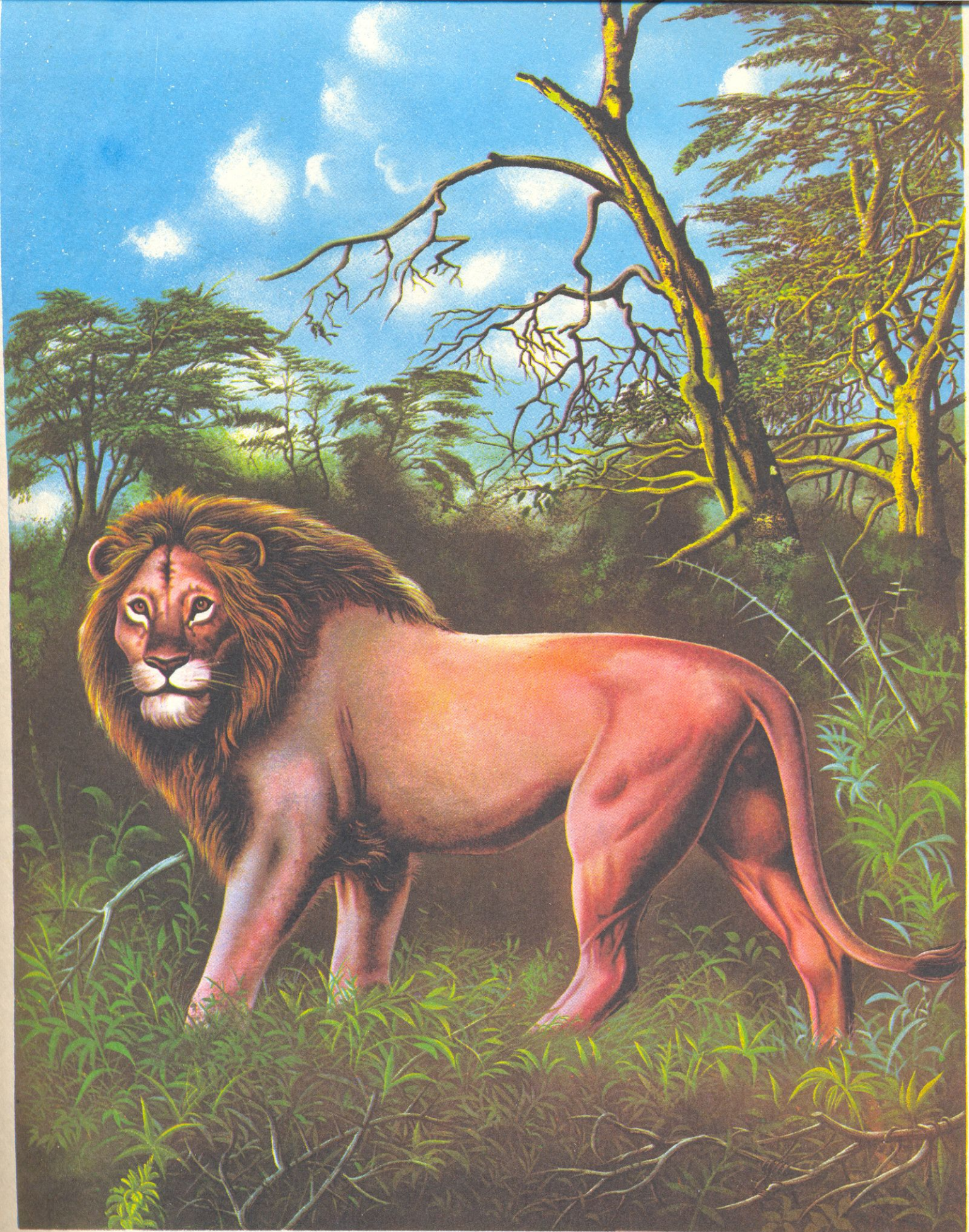
LEOPARD A variety of jungle cat, the leopard's distinguishing marks are its spots.



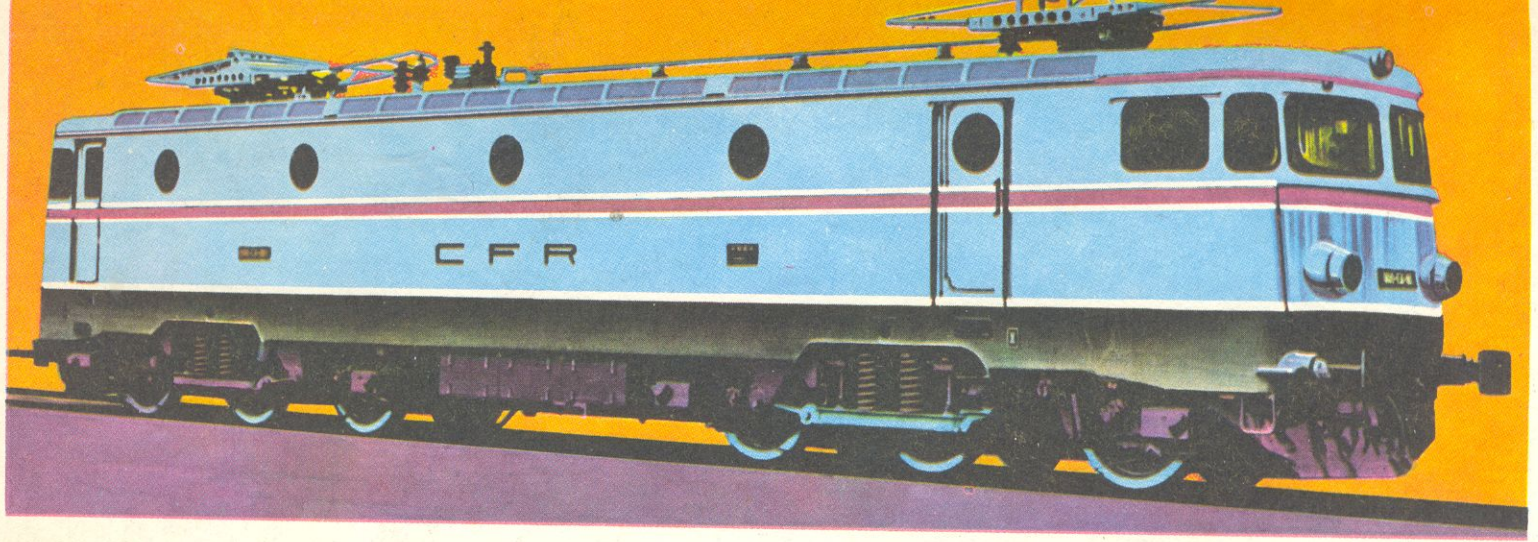
LINEN This is cloth woven from flax. Do you remember seeing the flax plant earlier in the book?



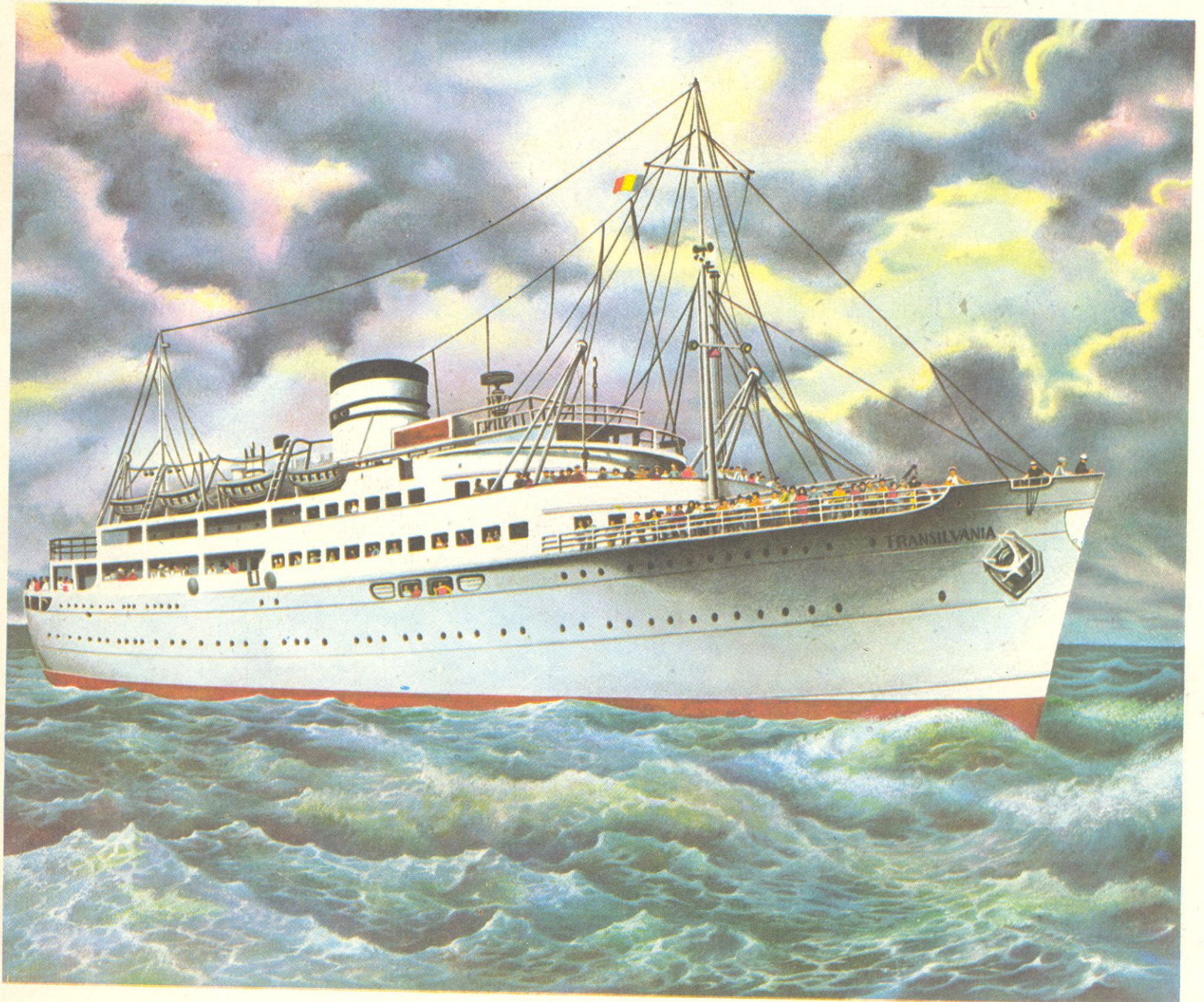
LIBRARY A library is a collection of books. It is also a building where you can go to borrow books.



LION The lion is a magnificent beast and is known as 'the King of the jungle'.



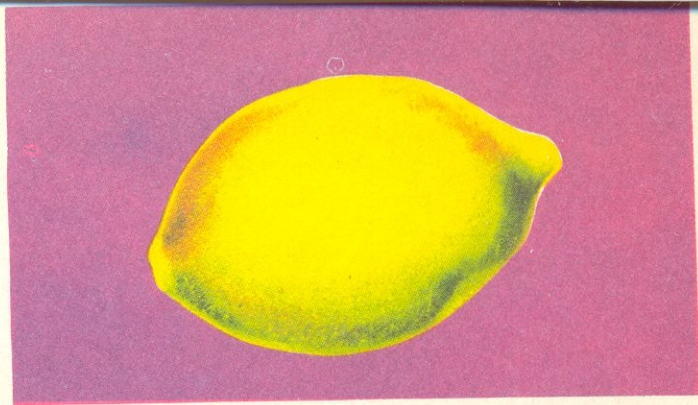
LOCOMOTIVE This train is powered by overhead electric cables.



LINER This is a term given to a passenger-carrying cruise ship.



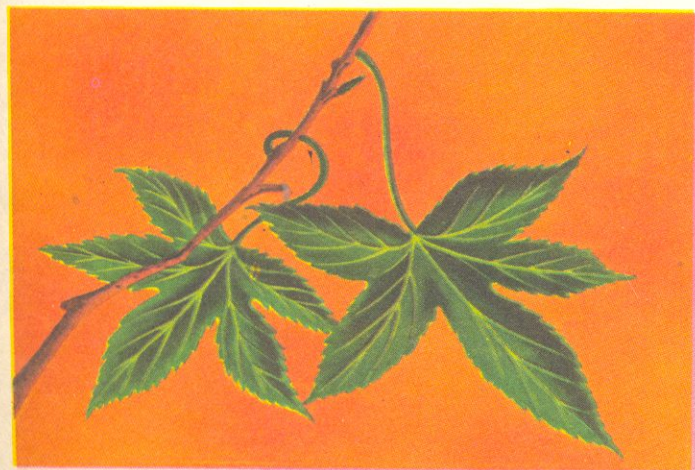
LIGHTNING Those zigzag flashes are caused by an electrical discharge between clouds.



LEMON This yellow fruit has a very bitter taste. Its juices are used in the making of lemonade.



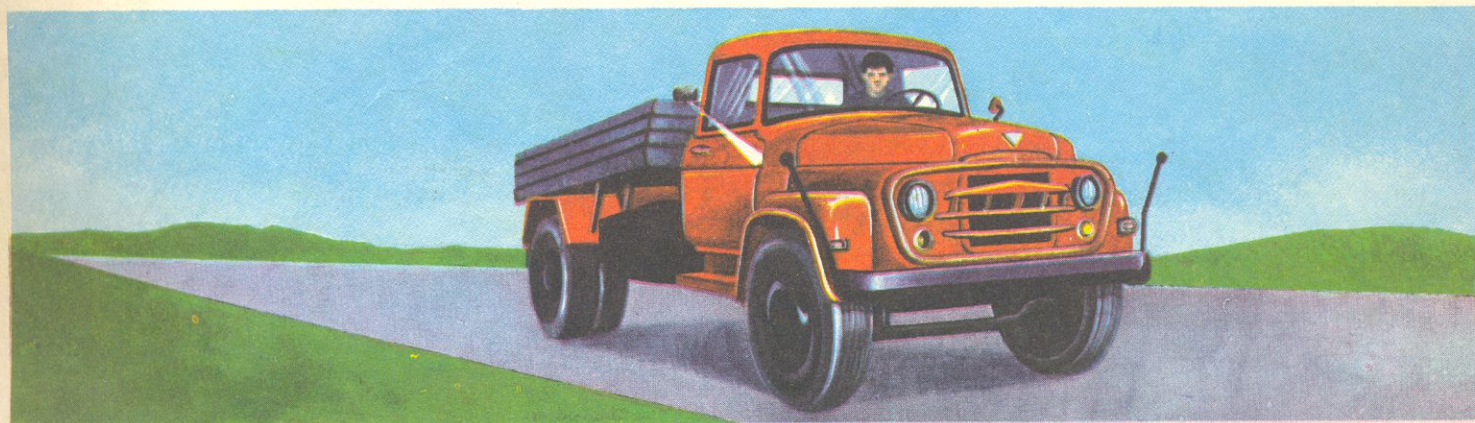
LOCUST Locust are very destructive insects. They devour large areas of vegetation in their thousands.



LEAF Plants and trees have leaves. They are generally green and grow from out of the sides of stems and branches.



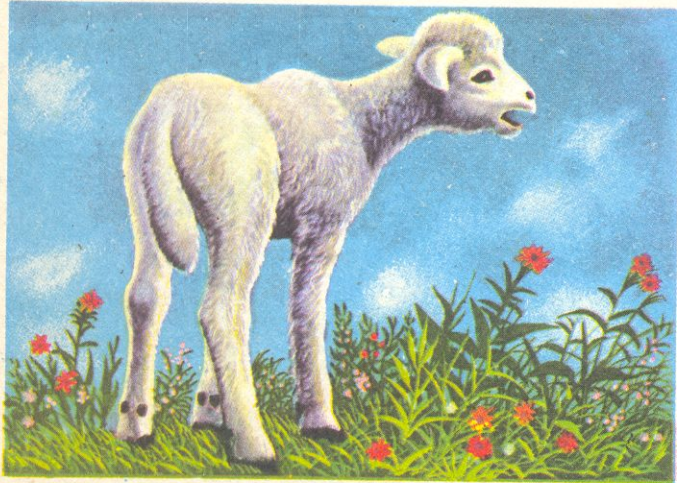
LADYBIRD A harmless insect, the ladybird is reddish-brown in colour and has black spots on its back.



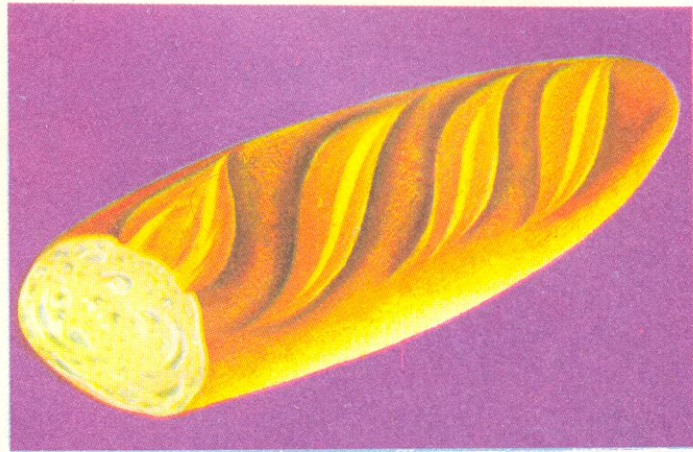
LORRY A lorry is a large flat, sideless wagon. They can carry bulky or heavy loads.



LOUNGE Sometimes known as the sitting-room, the lounge is the main room of the house where the sofa and arm-chairs are kept.



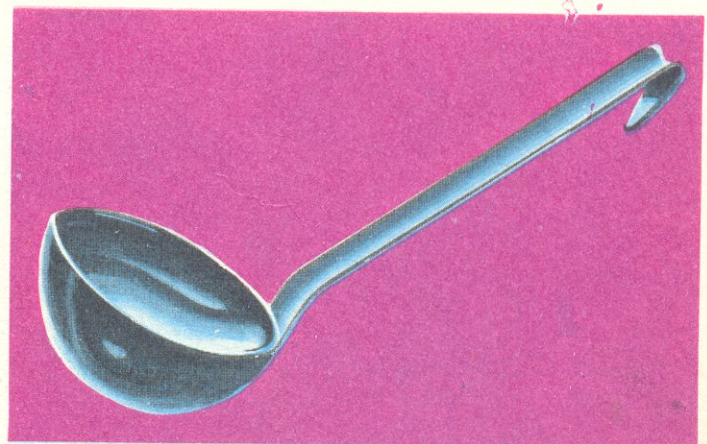
LAMB This fluffy little animal is born in the spring and is the baby of the sheep.



LOAF To make a loaf of bread you mix yeast, flour and water and then bake the mixture in an oven.



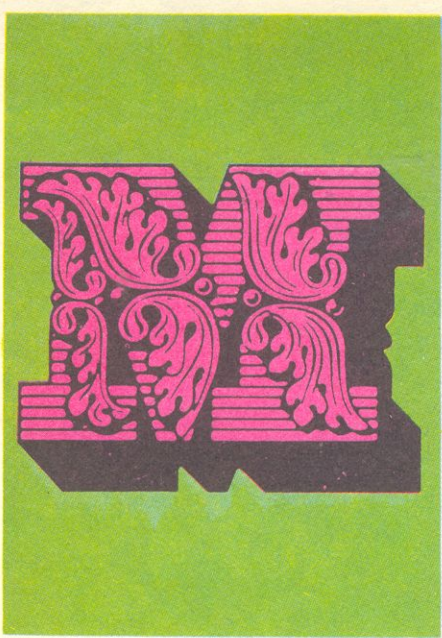
LARDER A larder is a cupboard or dresser in the kitchen where your Mummy stores the food.

LYNX These wild cats are noted for their short tails, spotted fur and tufted ear-tips.



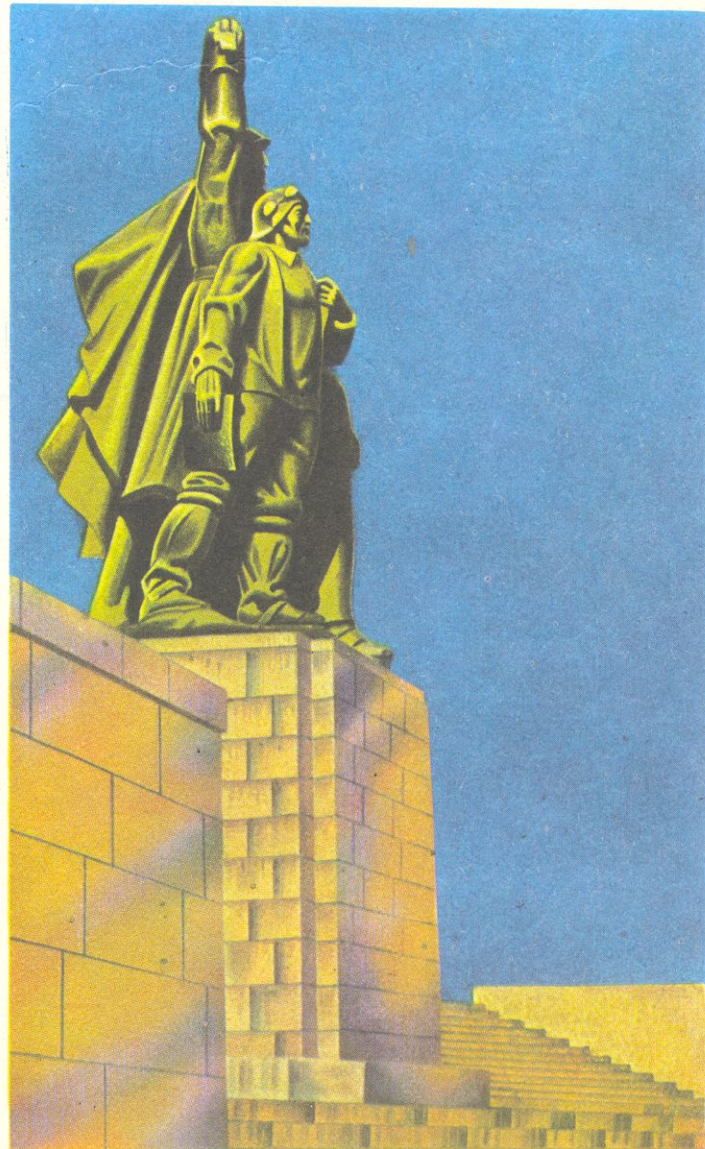
MONKEY The monkey lives in trees. He is a creature that closely resembles man.



MIRROR Mirrors reflect our images. This enables us to look at ourselves like the little girl is doing.



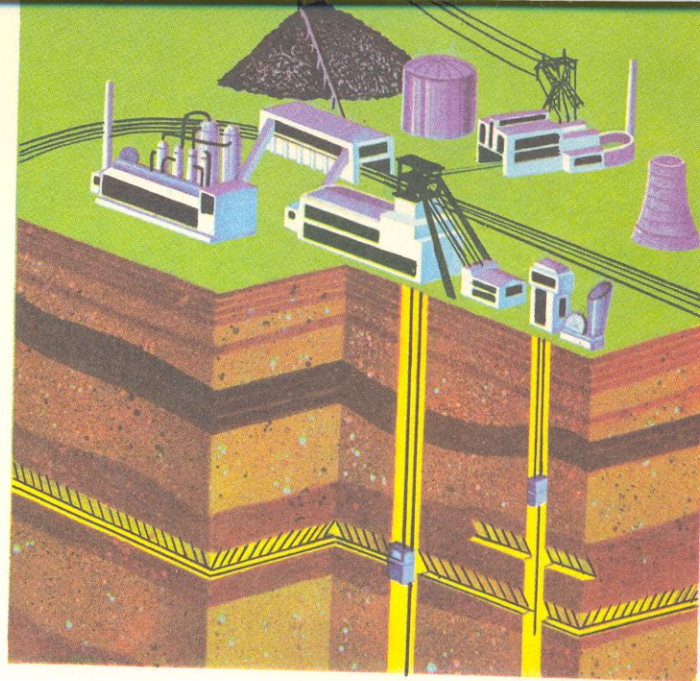
MINK A semi-aquatic, stoat-like animal. The mink is killed for its fur, from which they make coats.



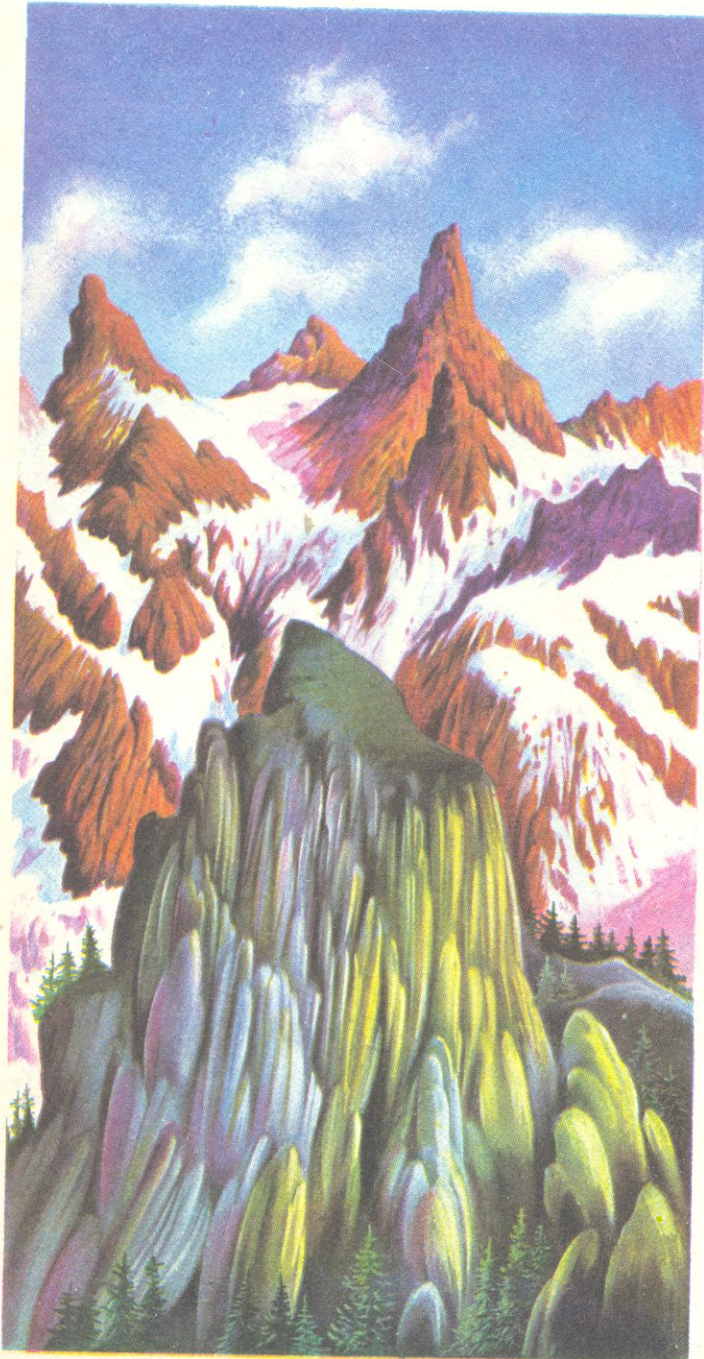
MONUMENT These are built to commemorate historical occasions or important events.



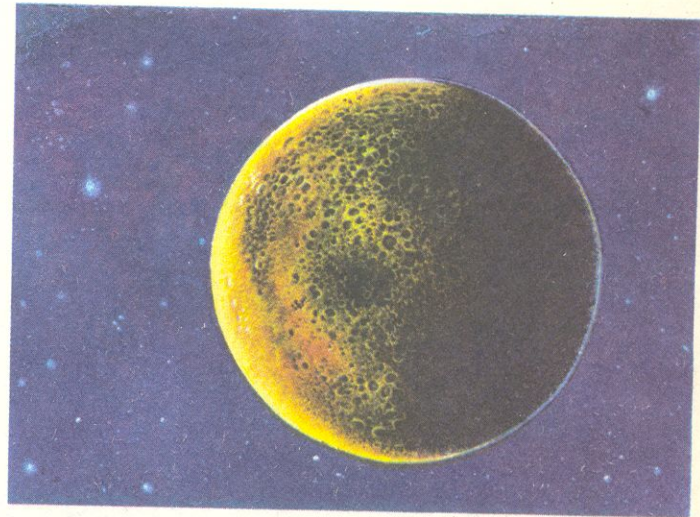
MOUSE The mouse is a member of the rodent family. They are shy and timid creatures.



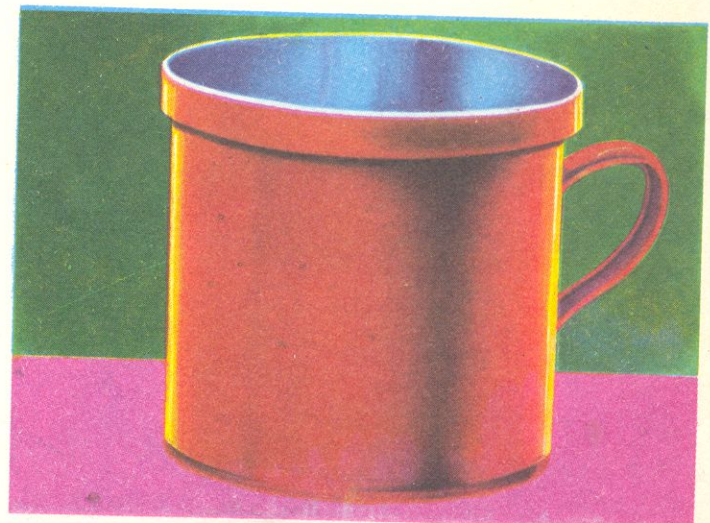
MINE Mines are dug deep into the ground so that minerals like coal can be excavated.



MOUNTAIN Mountains reach high into the sky. It is very cold at the top of mountains and there is nearly always snow which caps the peaks.



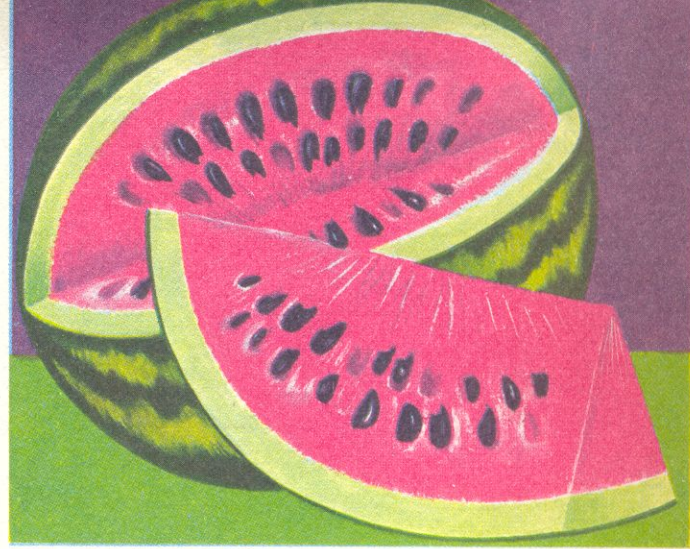
MOON The moon circles the earth once every twenty-four hours. It provides us with light in the sky at night.



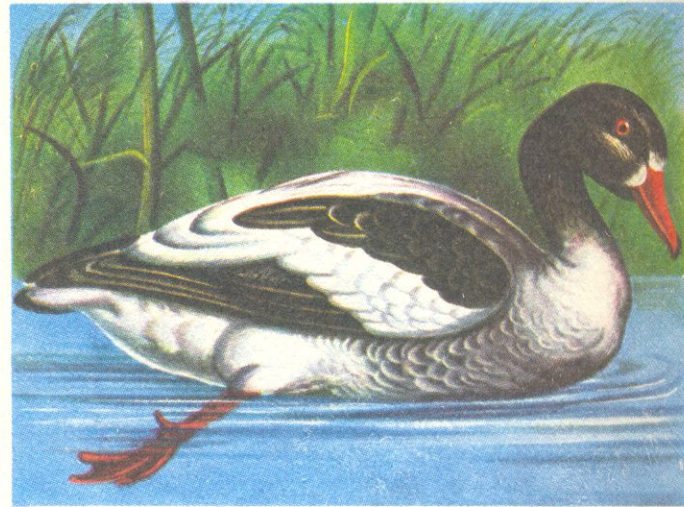
MUG A mug is a large type of cup.



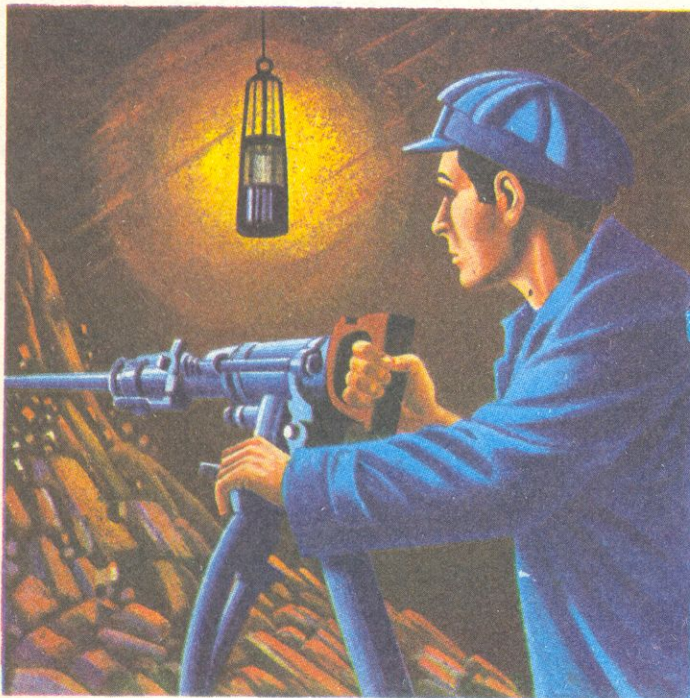
MILK Milk comes from the cow and is very nourishing to drink.



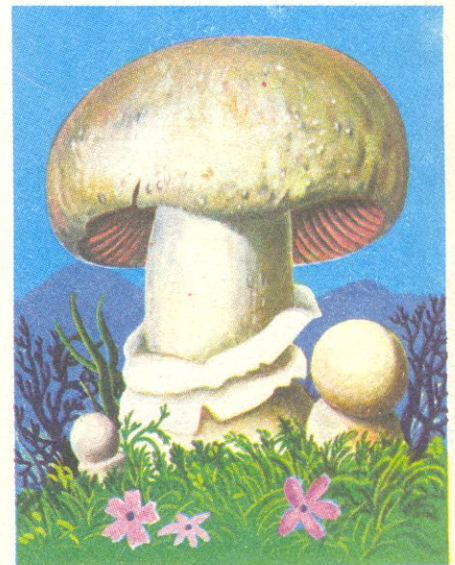
MELON This is a water melon. It is green on the outside and red inside. It has lots of large pips.



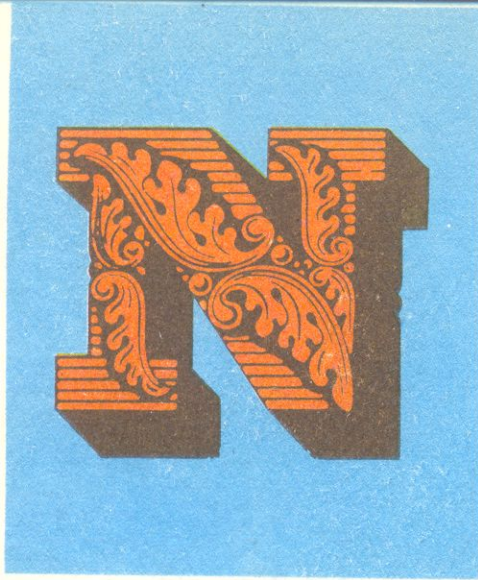
MALLARD This is a wild drake or duck.



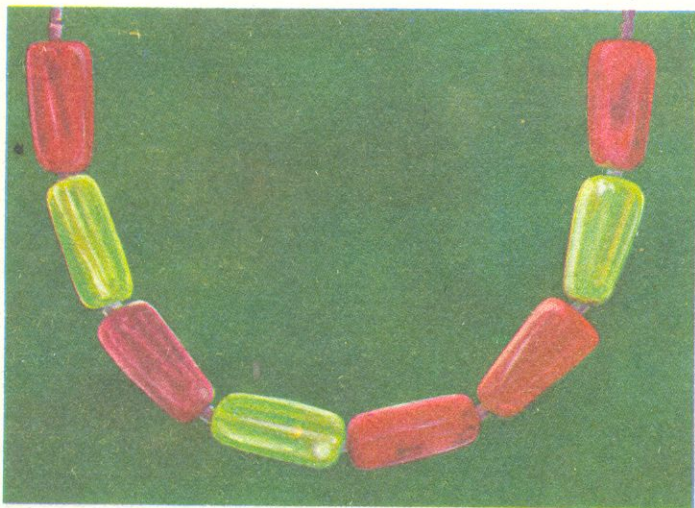
MINER This is a man who works in a mine. He helps to dig the coal.



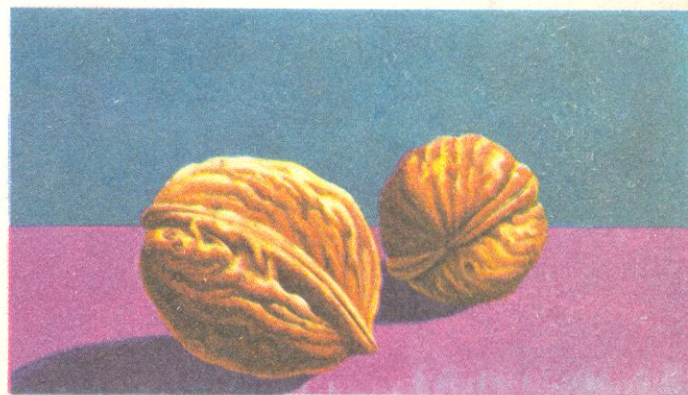
MUSHROOM Mushrooms are an edible fungus that grow wild in the countryside.



NEWSPAPERS Newspapers print and report the news.



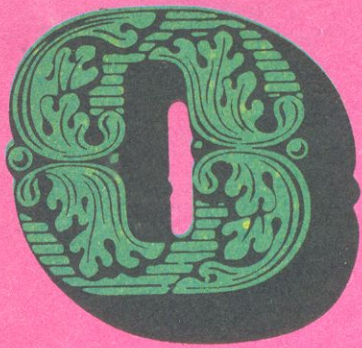
NECKLACE A necklace is made up of beads or pieces of jewellery threaded on to a piece of string and worn round the neck.



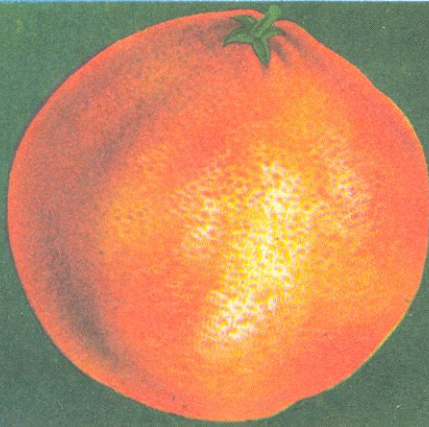
NUTS Nuts have hard outer shells to protect the fruit inside. The nuts in the picture are called walnuts.

OWL Owls are strange birds. They sleep in the day and fly at night.



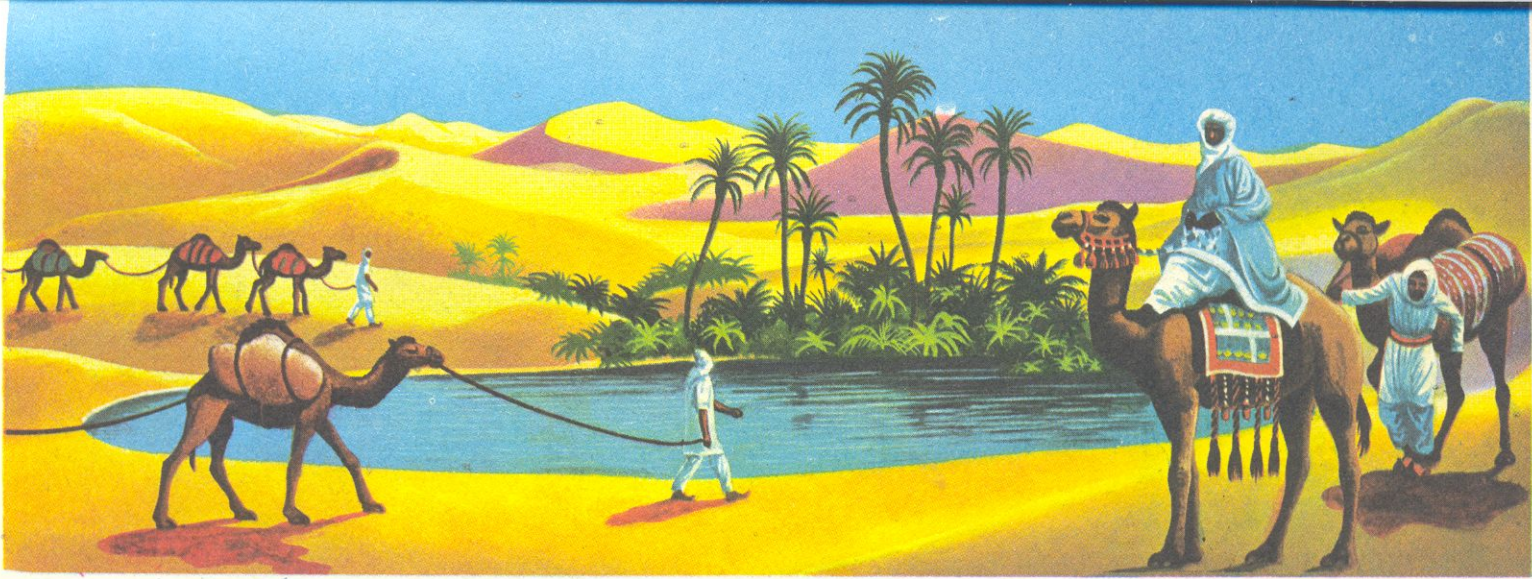
ORANGE This is a citrus fruit with a yellow-reddish tough rind. It has also given its name to the colour.



OATS Oats are grown and used as a cereal for humans and food for horses.



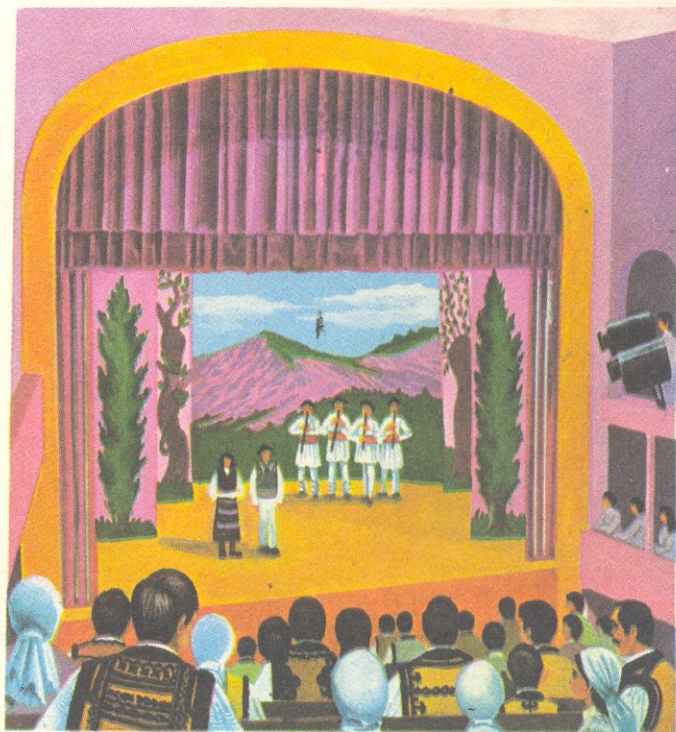
ORCHARD An orchard is the name given to a place which grows all kinds of fruit.



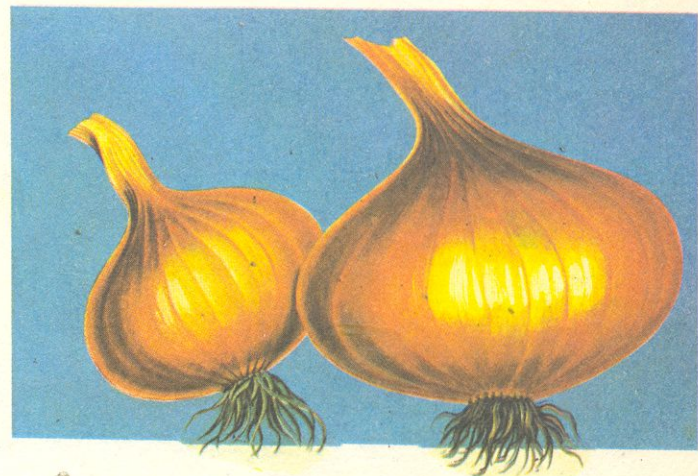
OASIS An oasis is a fertile spot in a desert where palm trees grow by a water hole.



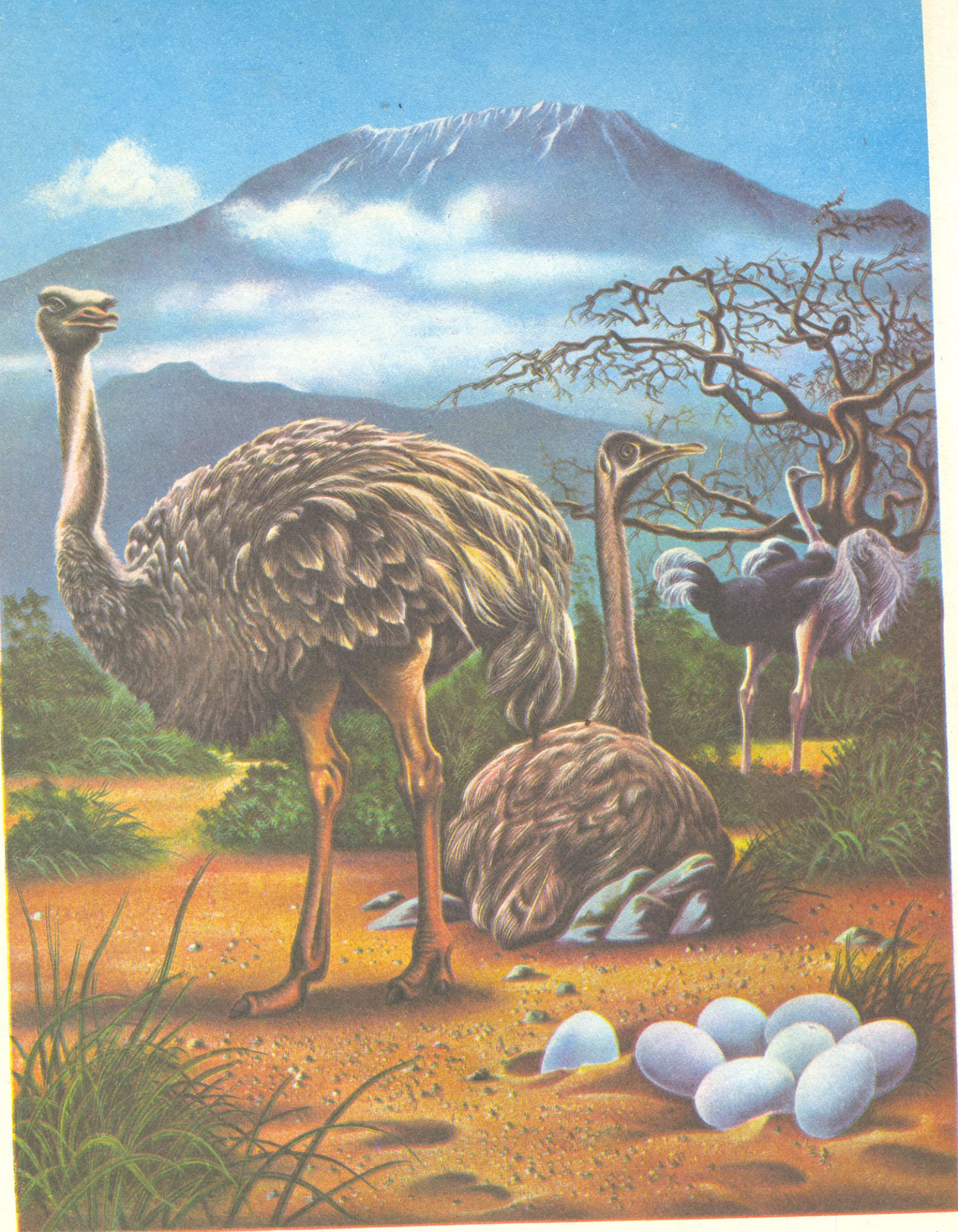
OAK TREE These are tall, strong trees. The fruit of an oak tree is the acorn.



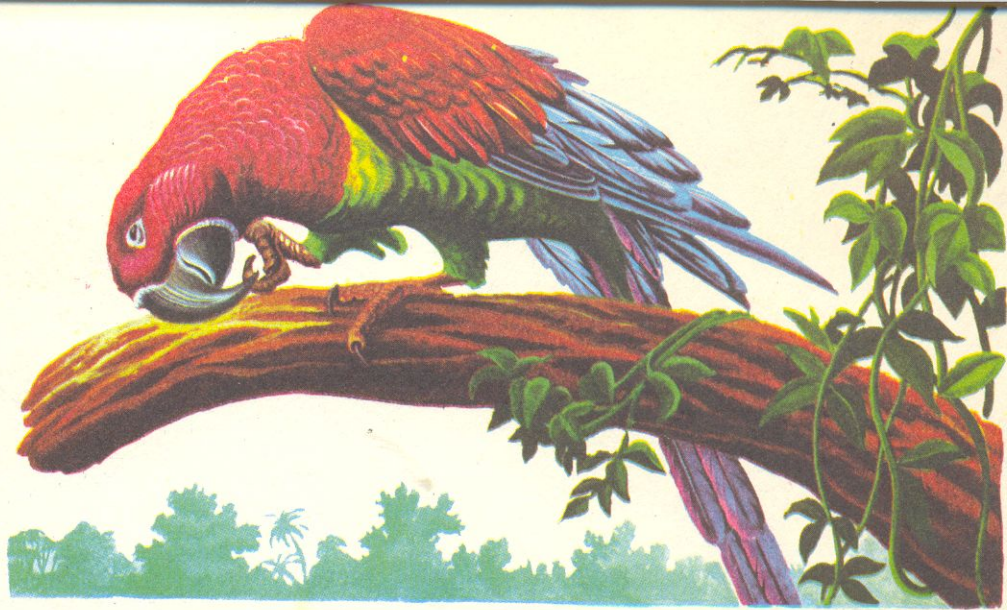
OPERA An opera is a dramatic play set to music where the actors sing their lines.



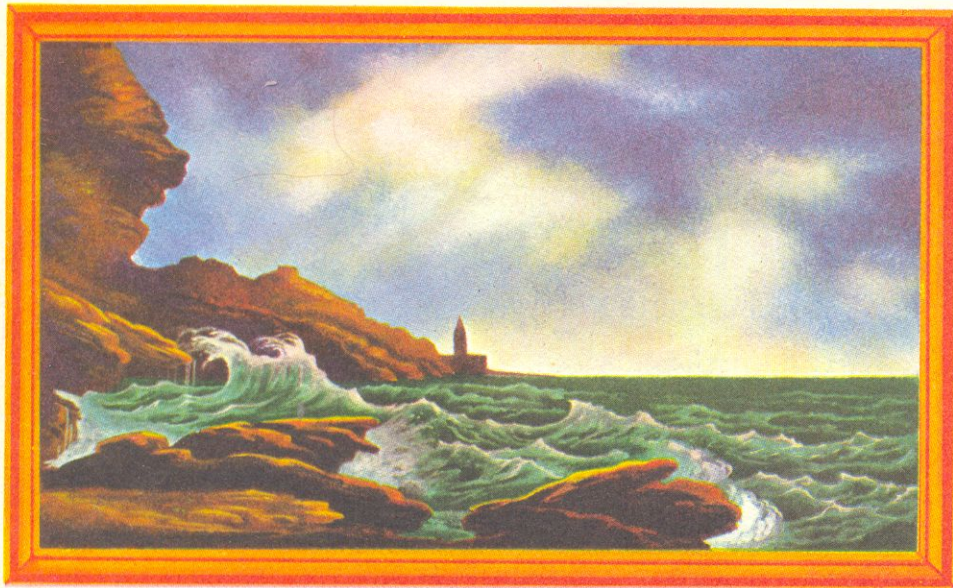
ONIONS These are edible bulbs which are used as flavouring in cooking.



OSTRICH This is a large African bird. It is said that the ostrich buries its head in the sand when it is in danger.



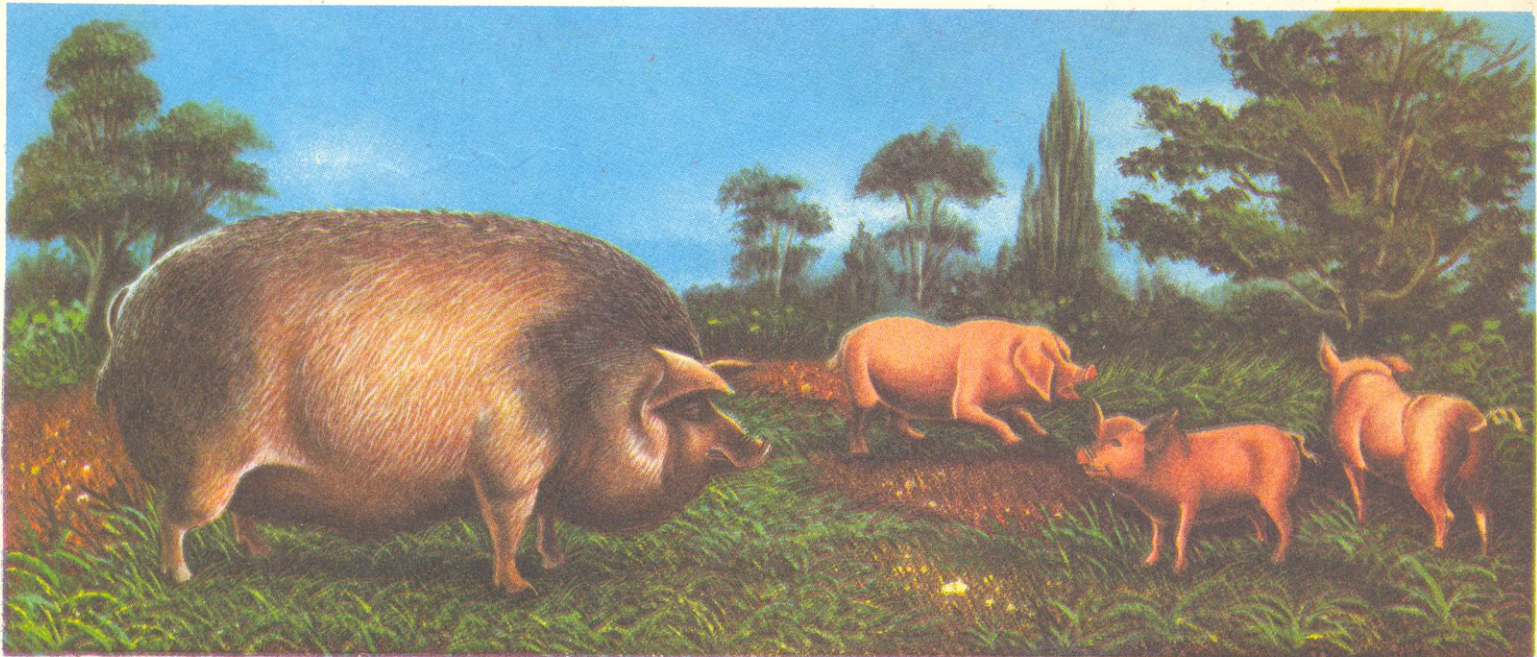
PARROT This bird has a beautifully coloured plumage. It can be taught to speak.

PLUMS A plum is a dark-coloured stoned fruit. When the plum is dried it is then known as a prune.



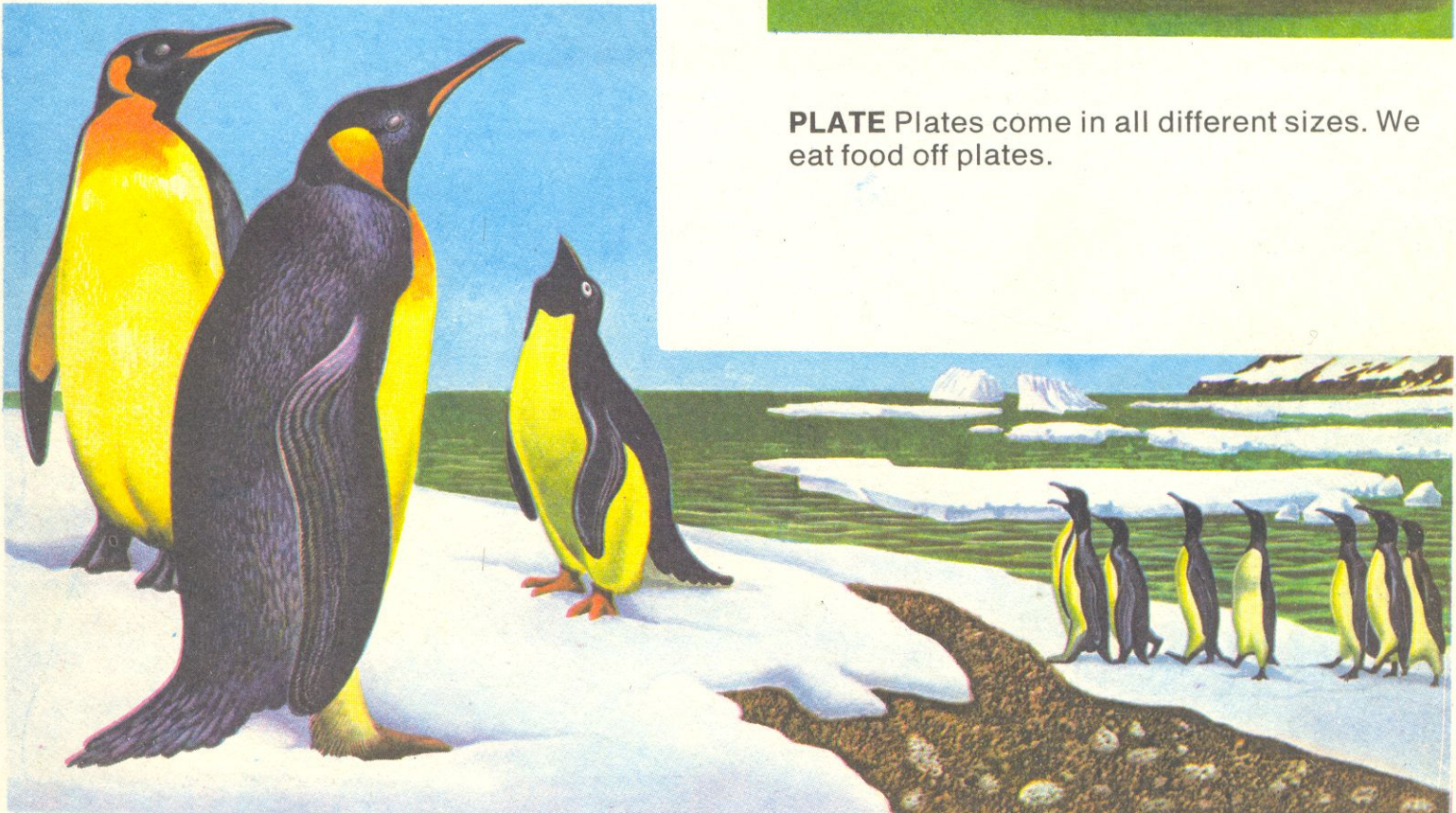
POPPY In the fields one can see lots of poppies.



PEPPERS These are very strong smelling and tasting plants used in cooking, either as a flavouring or as a vegetable.



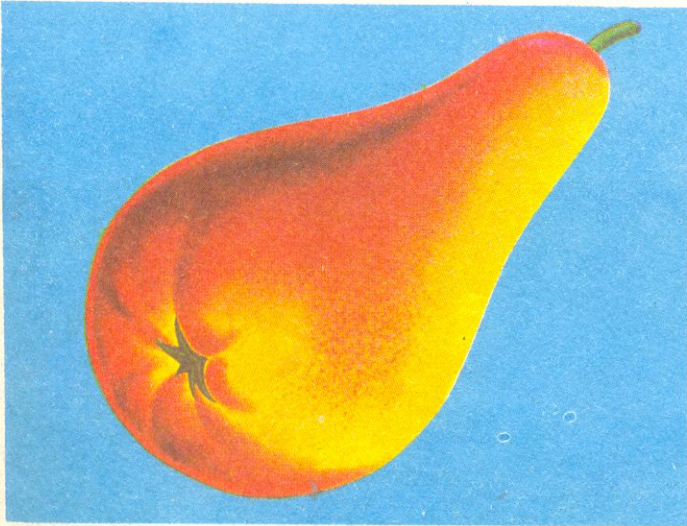
PLATE Plates come in all different sizes. We eat food off plates.



PENGUINS Penguins live at the South Pole and are equally at home on land or water.



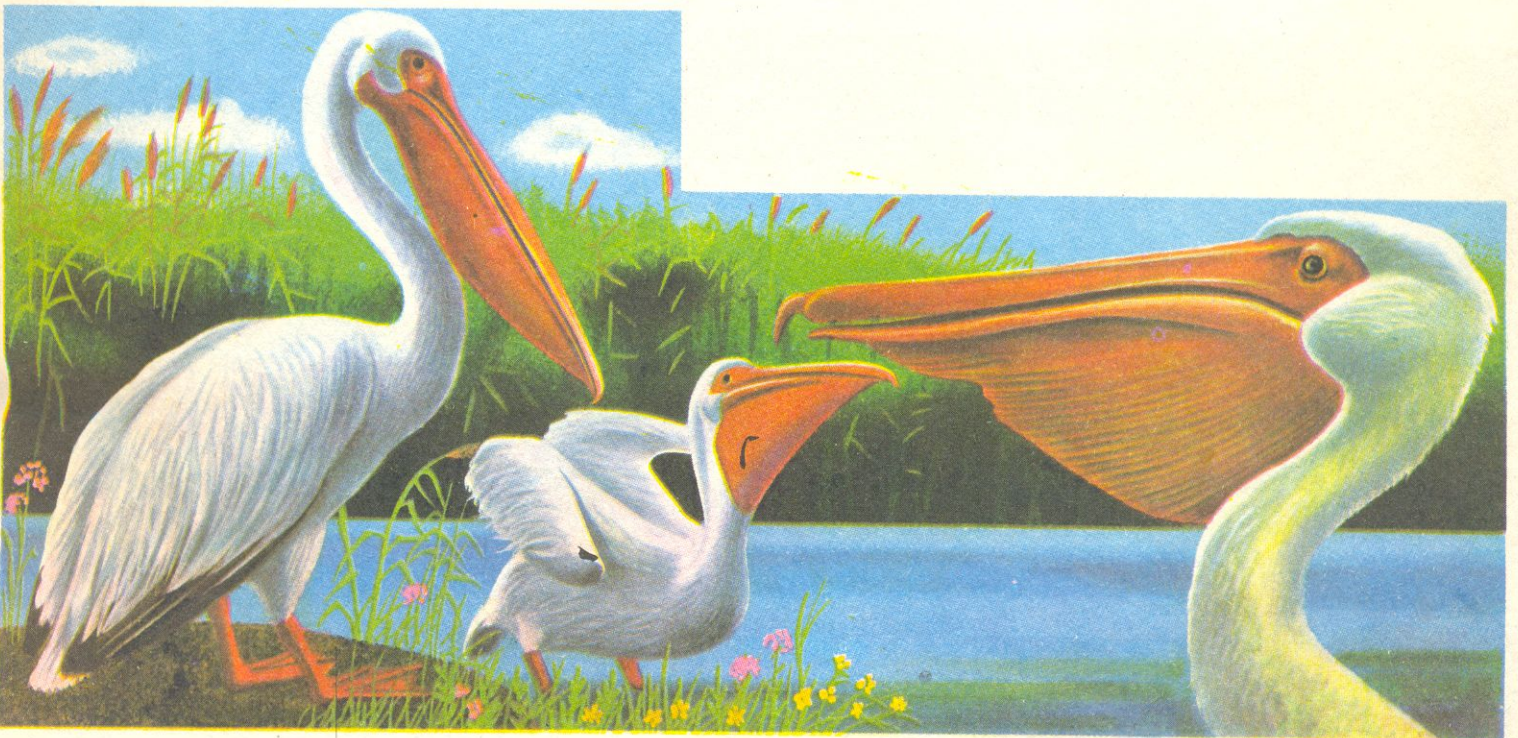
POSTMAN The postman delivers letters, cards and parcels to people.



PEAR The pear is a fruit. It is large at the bottom and tapers to the stalk.



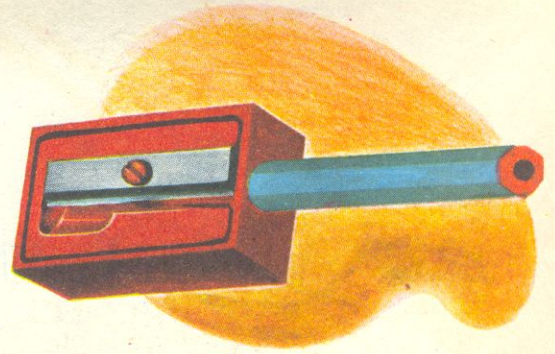
PINE TREE Pine trees are evergreens. This means that they have green leaves all the year round.



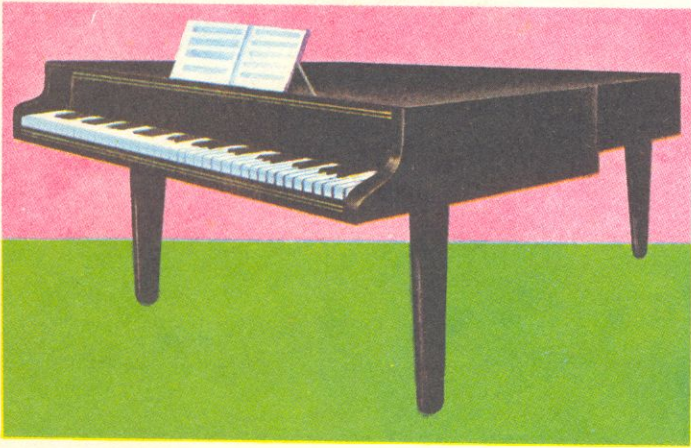
PELICAN Pelicans are fish eaters. They catch fish and store them in their pouch under their beaks.



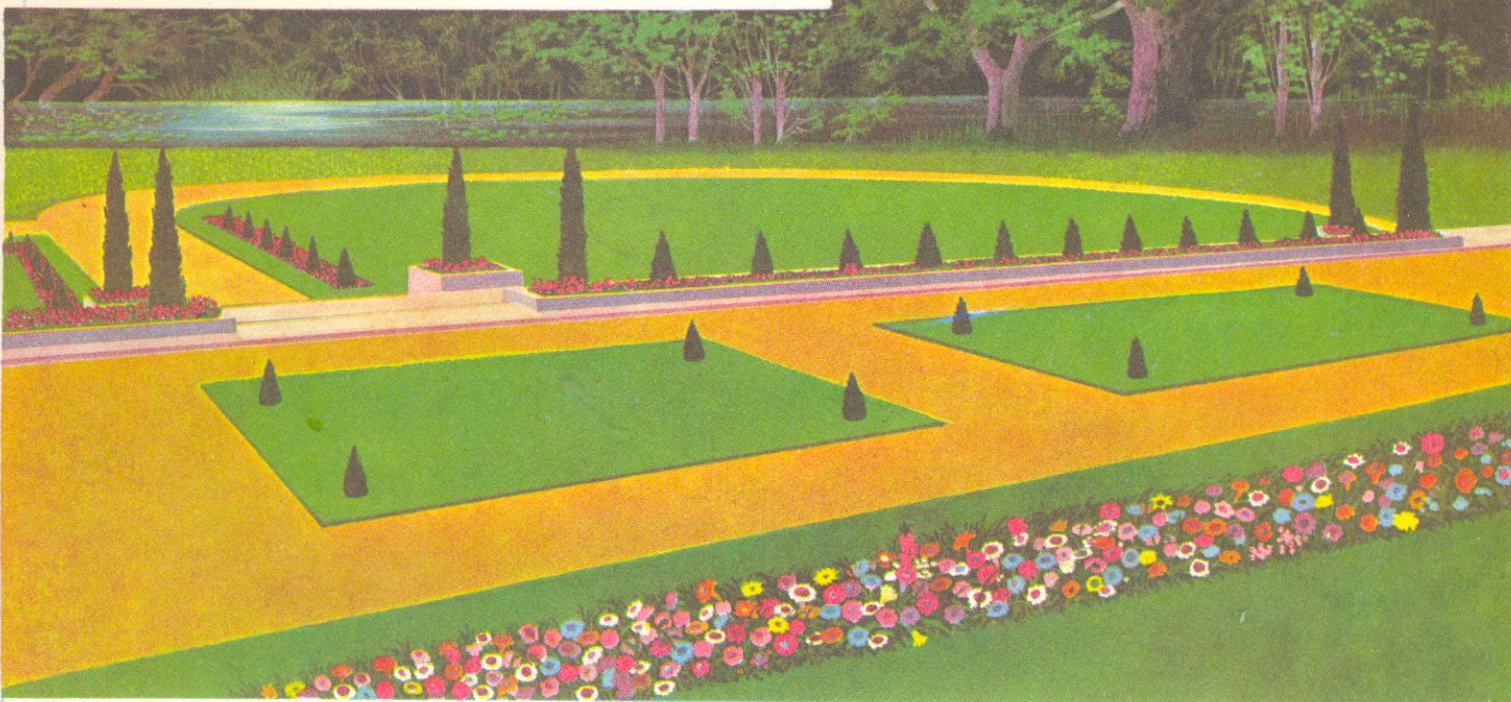
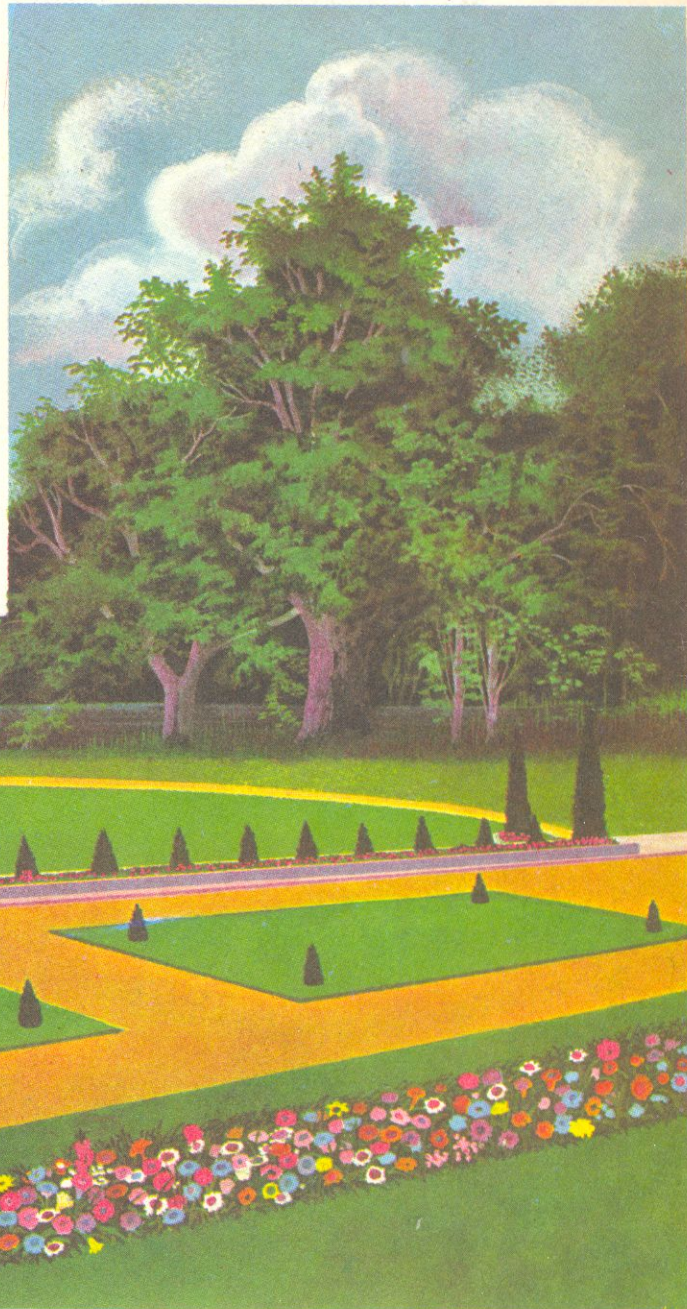
POTATOES These are plant tubers which are cooked in many different ways and used as food.



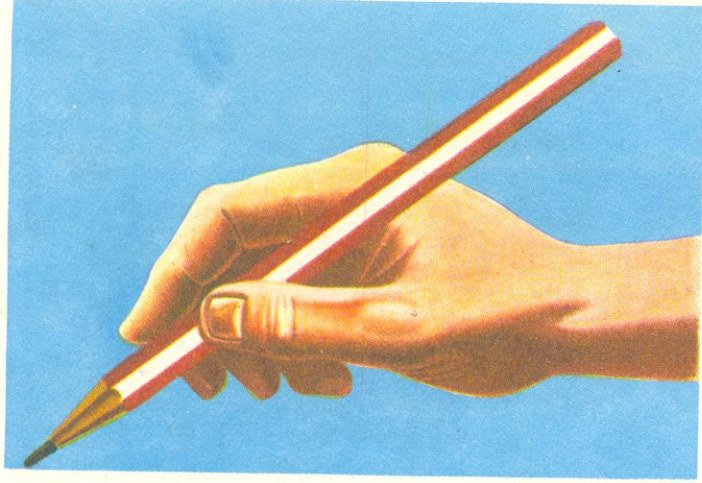

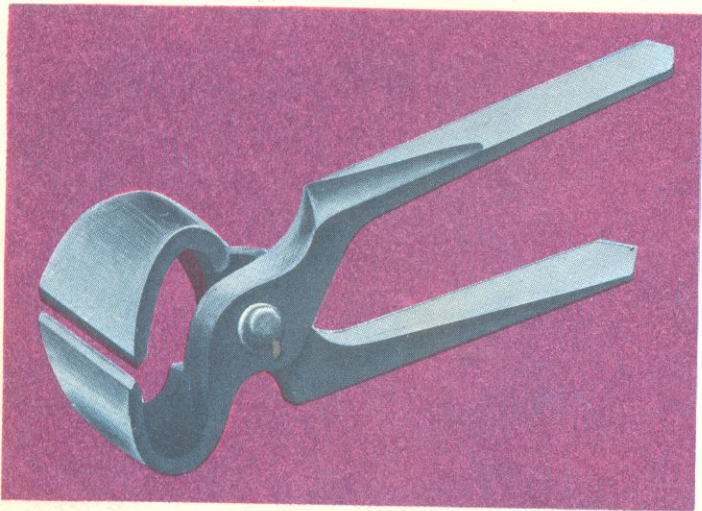
PIANO This is a musical instrument. Its keys are made of ivory.

PINE This is what we call the 'leaves' of the pine tree. They are needle shaped.



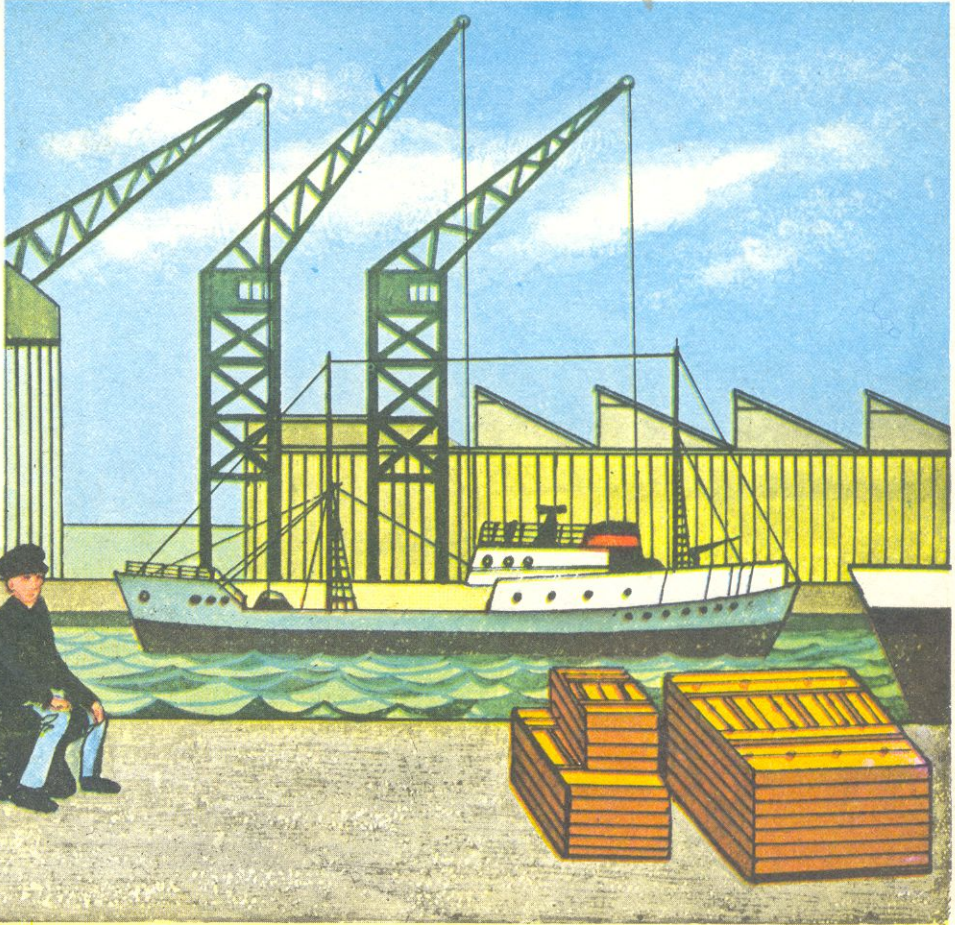
PIGEON Pigeons can be wild or domesticated birds. Some people keep them and use them to race against one another.



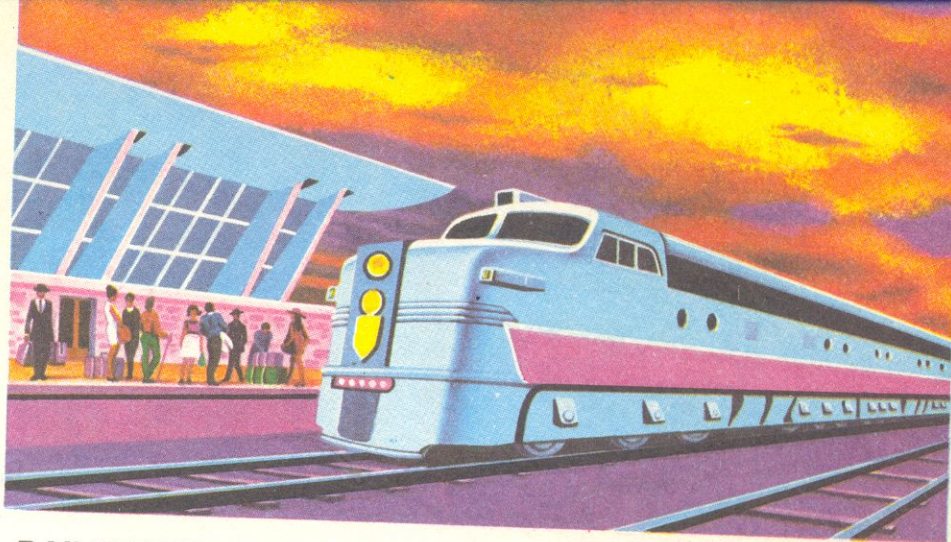
QUEEN A queen is the Crowned Ruler of a country.



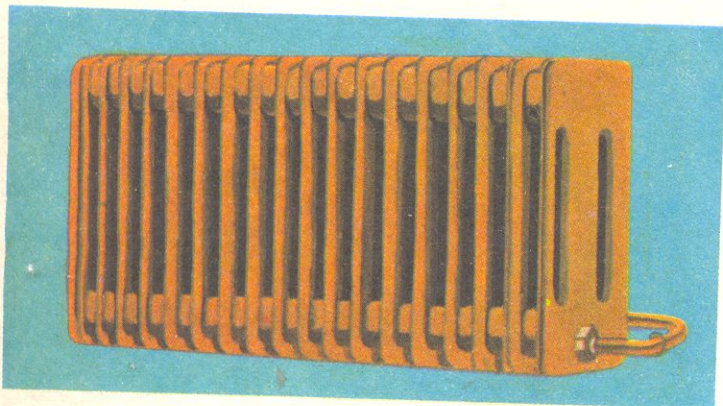
QUAIL This bird is allied to the partridge and is thought very highly of as food.



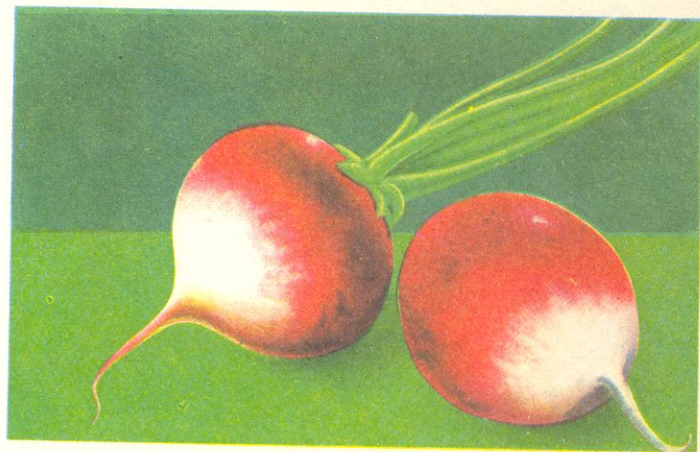
QUAY A landing place for unloading ships.



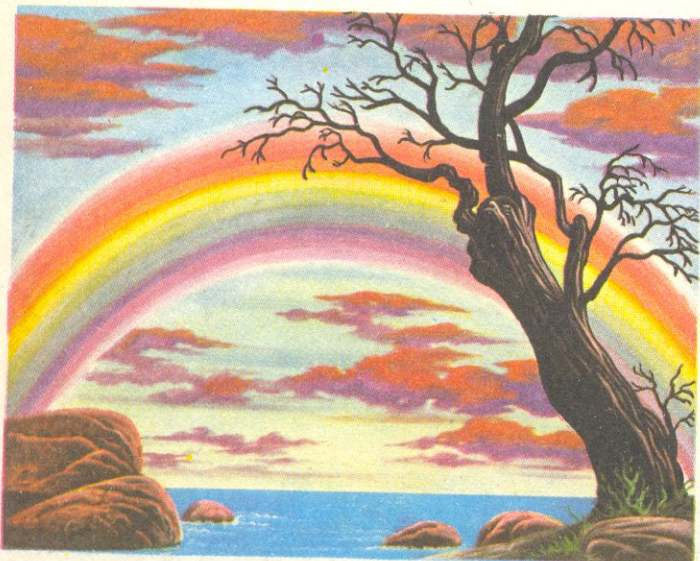
RAILWAY STATION Trains pull into stations so that passengers can get on and off them. The passengers stand on a platform.



RADIATORS Hot water flows through radiators which in turn throw out heat to help warm rooms.



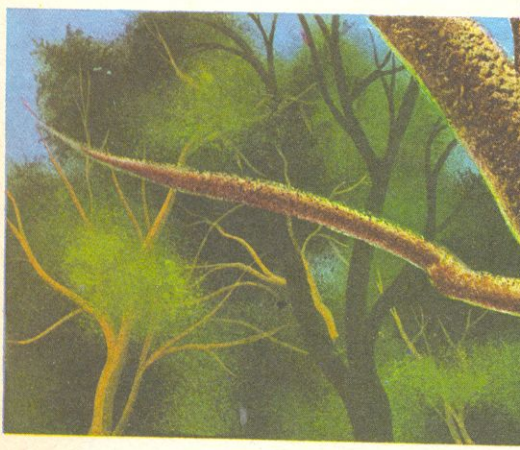
RADISHES These are roots which are eaten raw, often in salads.



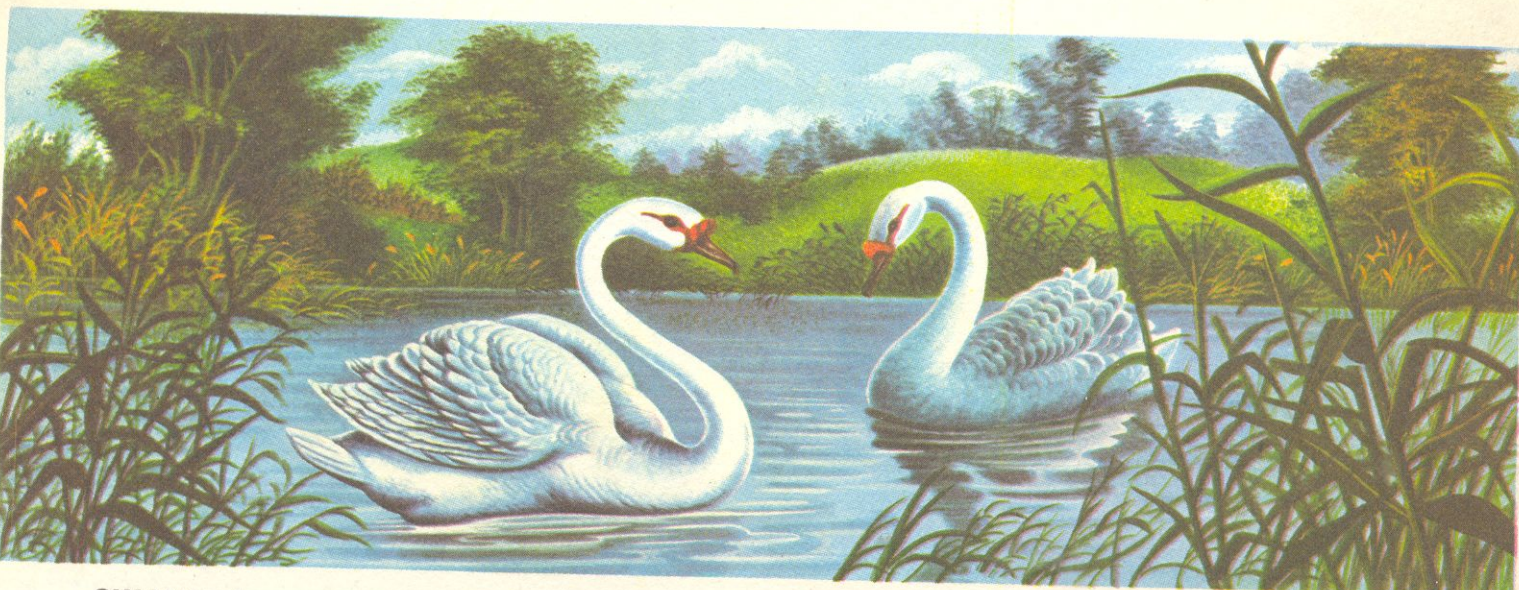
RAINBOW Rainbows are the result of the sun's rays reflecting in falling drops of rain and are made up of seven colours.

STOATS Stoat is the general name for ermine. Other animals in this family include the weasel and ferret.



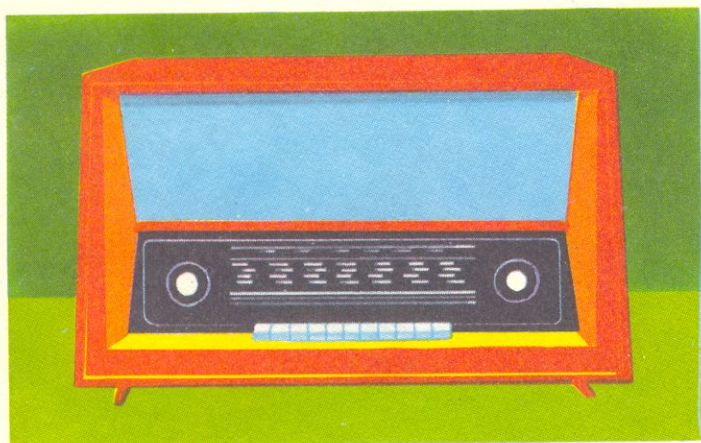
SWANS The swan is a graceful water-bird. Look at its long neck and magnificent plumage.



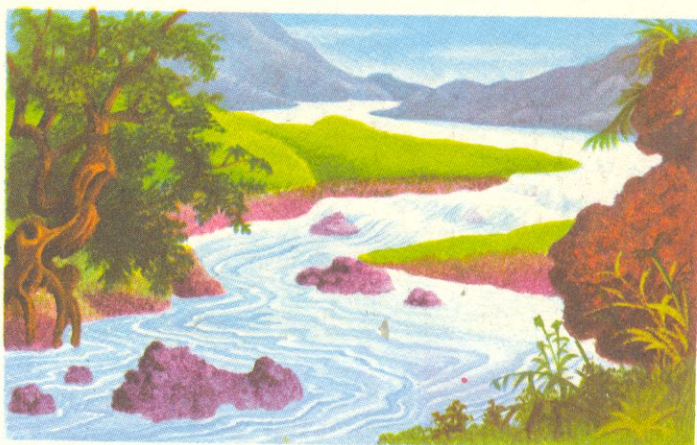
RUBBER A rubber, or eraser, is an implement used to wipe out mistakes when writing or drawing.



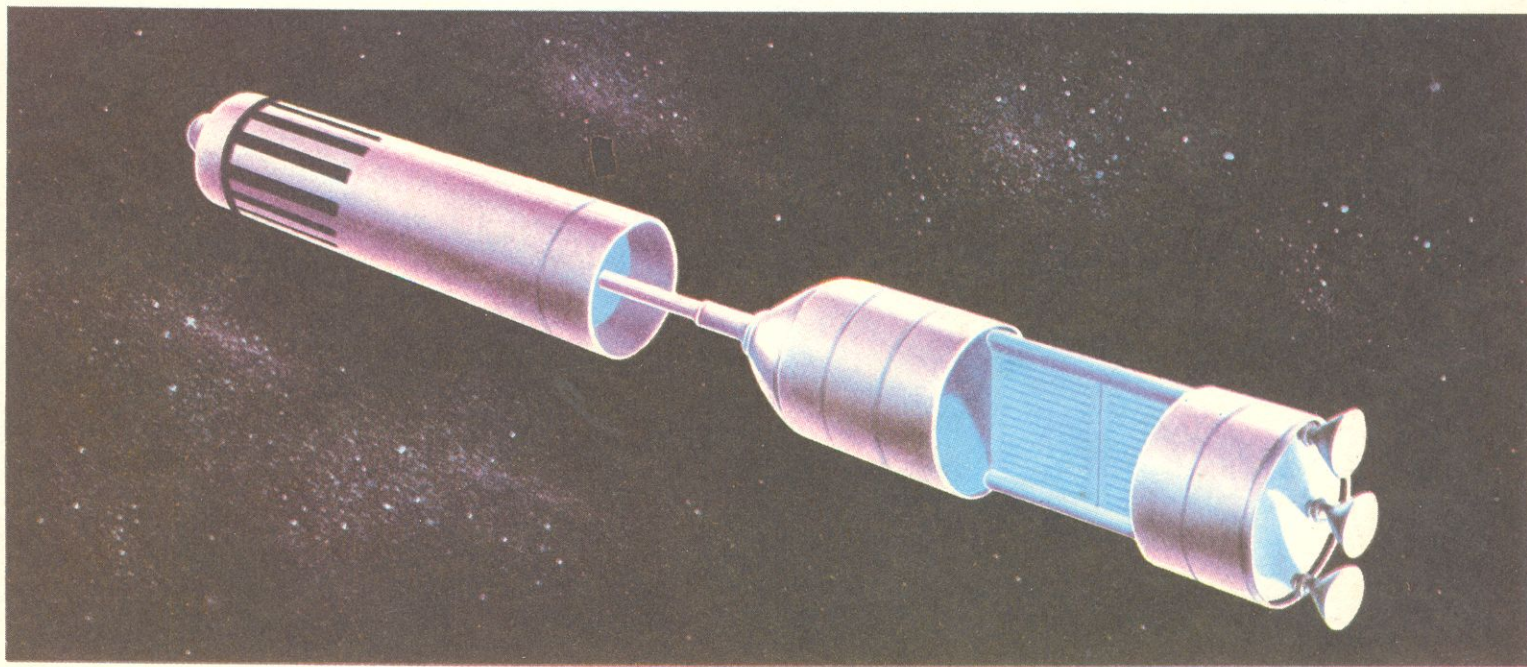
ROSE This is a sweet-smelling flower which grows on bushes whose stems are covered with thorns.



RADIO The radio in the picture is used to receive programmes broadcasted by a radio station.



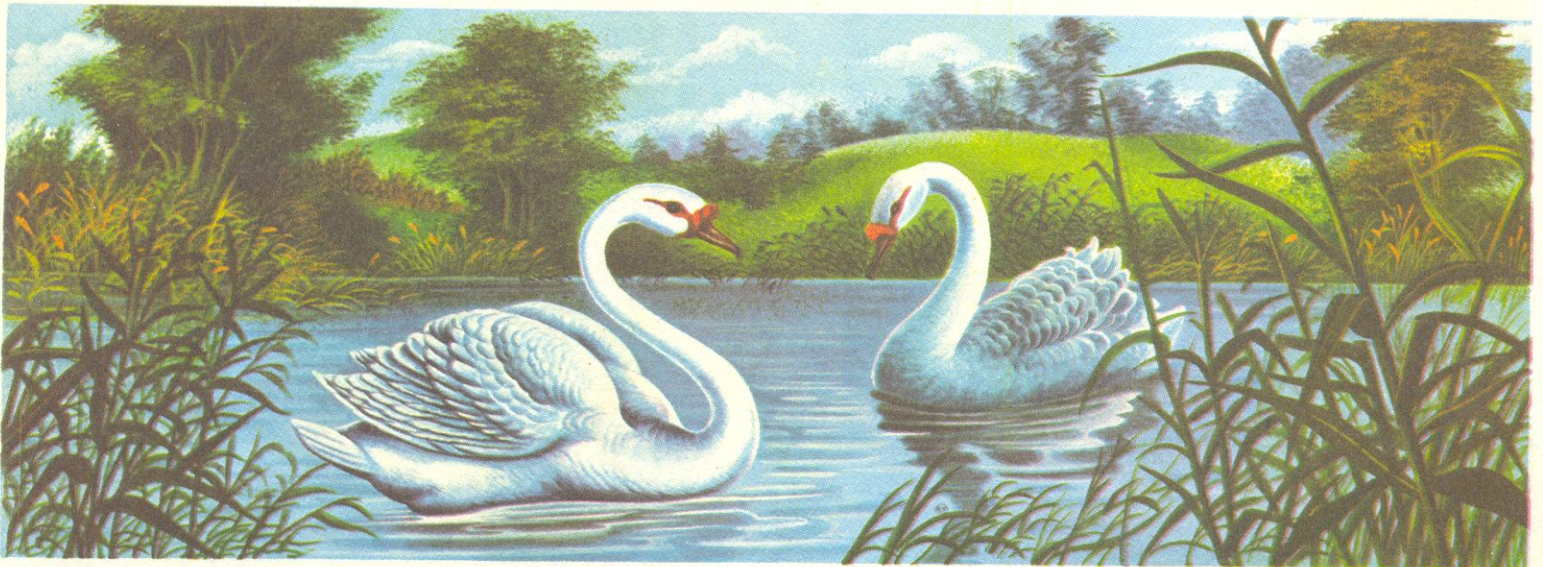
RIVER Rivers usually begin in the mountains and flow down to the sea.



ROCKET Rockets are launched into space to carry men or scientific instruments for research purposes.



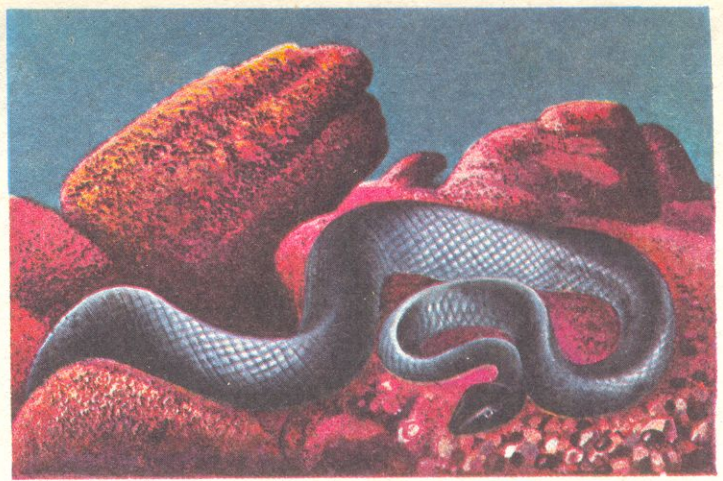
STOATS Stoat is the general name for ermine. Other animals in this family include the weasel and ferret.



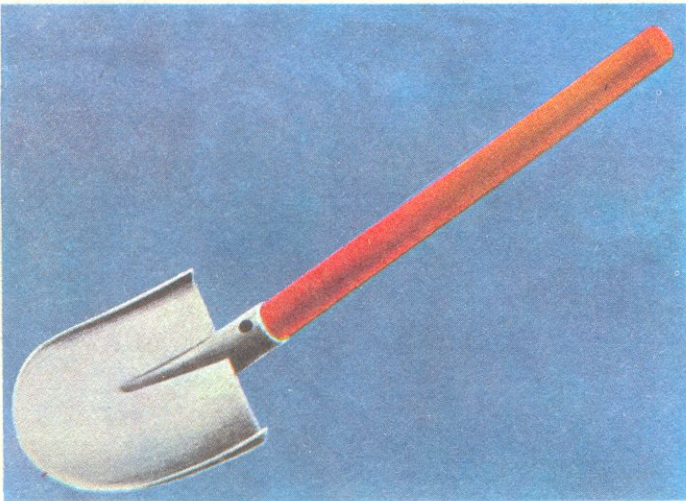
SWANS The swan is a graceful water-bird. Look at its long neck and magnificent plumage.



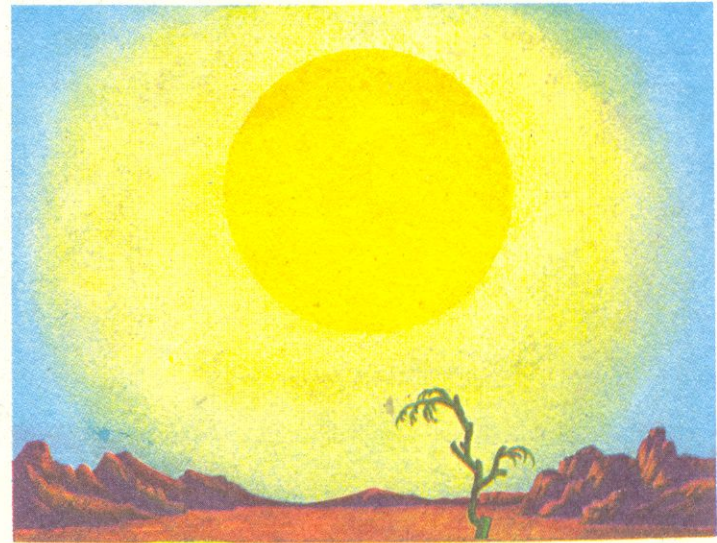
SAW A saw has sharp, jagged teeth to enable you to cut wood.



SNAKE Snakes are of the reptile family. Some snakes are very poisonous. The danger is in the snake's forked tongue.



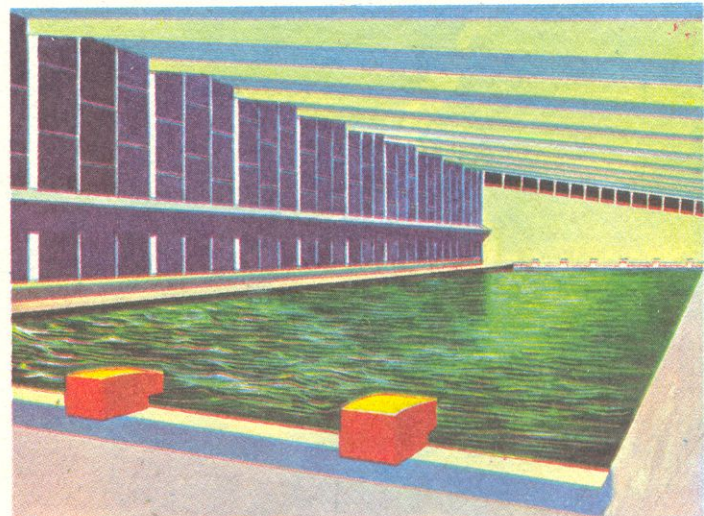
SPADE This is a hand tool for digging earth. It has a long wooden handle and a sharp-edged steel blade.



SUN The earth revolves around the sun. It supplies our planet with its light and warmth.



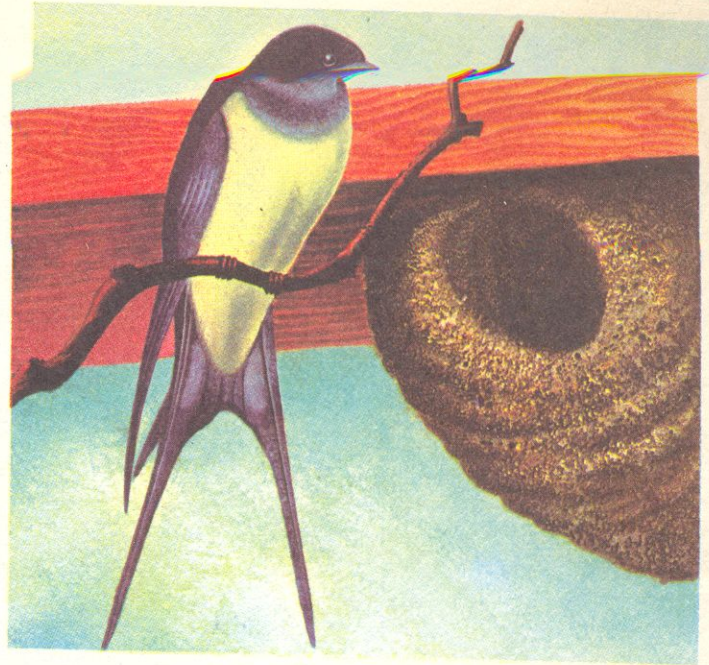
SQUIRREL Squirrels have long bushy tails and live in trees. They hibernate in winter.



SWIMMING POOL A swimming pool has a deep end and a shallow end. That is so everyone can enjoy swimming in safety.



SCISSORS Scissors have two sharp cutting edges. They are used mainly for cutting material.



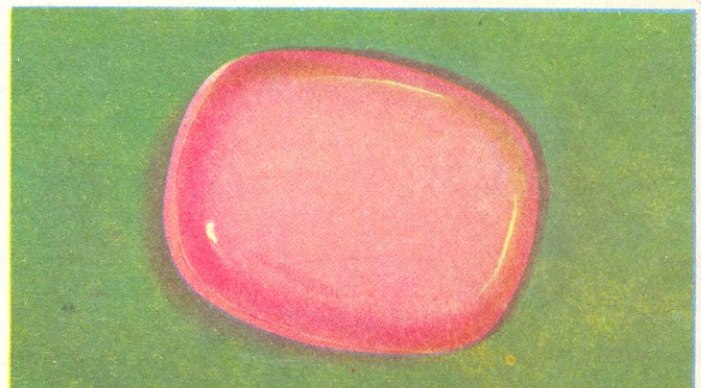
SWALLOW These birds have forked tails and long wings. They are usually associated with summer.



SHARK The shark is the most dangerous of all fish, not only to other sea life but also to man.



SHOES Shoes are made from leather with rubber soles. We wear them on our feet.



SOAP We use soap to wash with. By rubbing in water you get a lather.



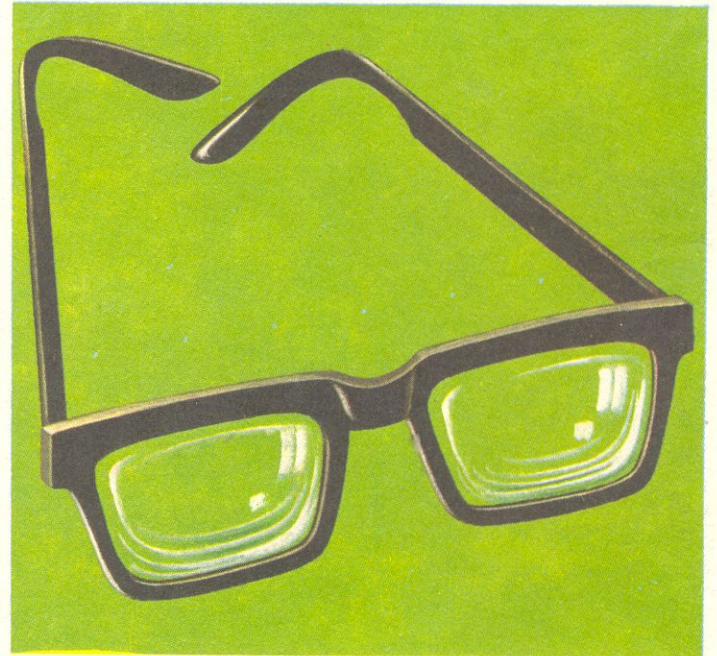
SHEEP The outer coat of the sheep is sheared and from it, garments such as jumpers are made. We call the sheep's coat wool.



SEWING A long pointed needle with an eye at one end is used for sewing. A piece of cotton is threaded through the eye.



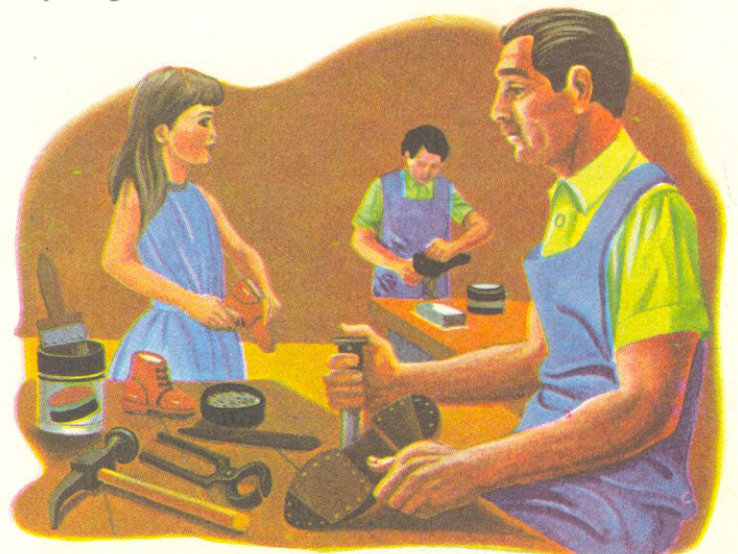
STEELWORKER The steelworker watches the furnace to get top-quality steel.



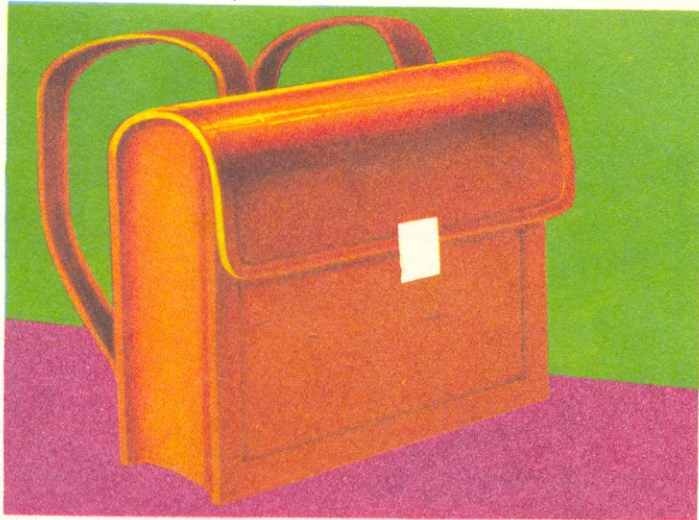
SPECTACLES The glass in a pair of spectacles are called lenses which help people with poor eyesight to see better.



SCARF Usually made from wool or silk, the scarf is worn round the neck to help keep you warm.



SHOE MENDERS Soles and heels on shoes wear down and they have to be repaired. The shoe mender does just that.



SATCHEL A satchel is a leather case carried on your back. School children use one to carry their books to school.



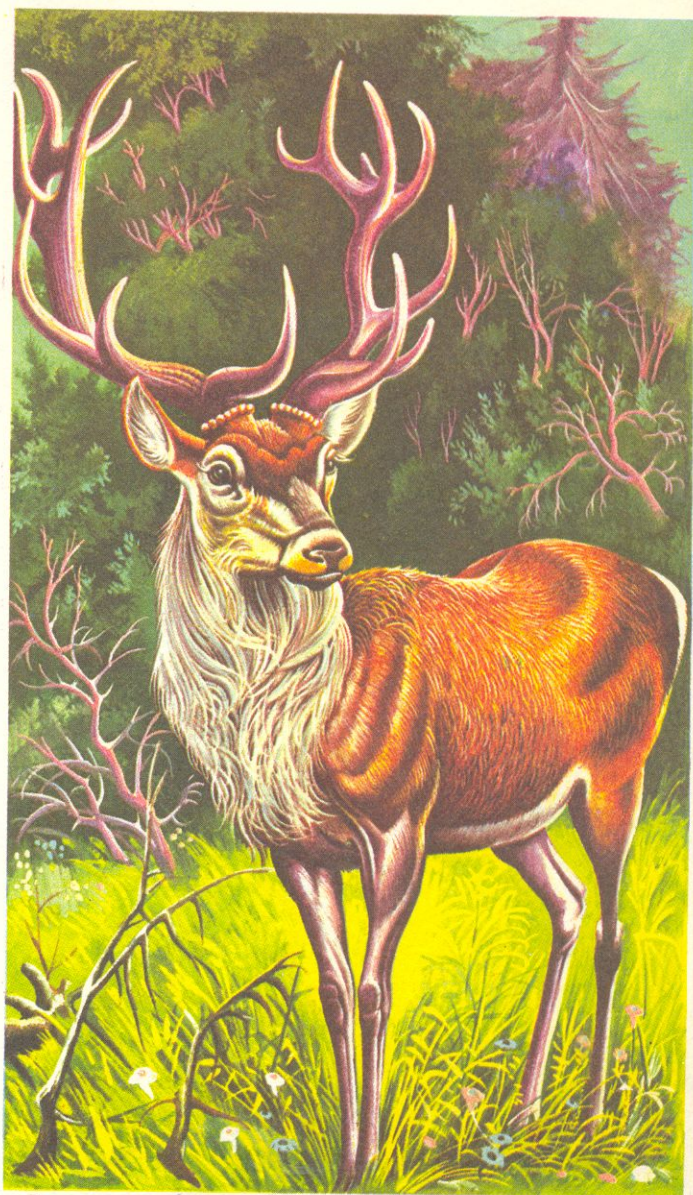
SWEETS This is a collective term used to describe a form of confectionary. Sweets can be many delicious things like chocolate, toffee, fudge and mint.



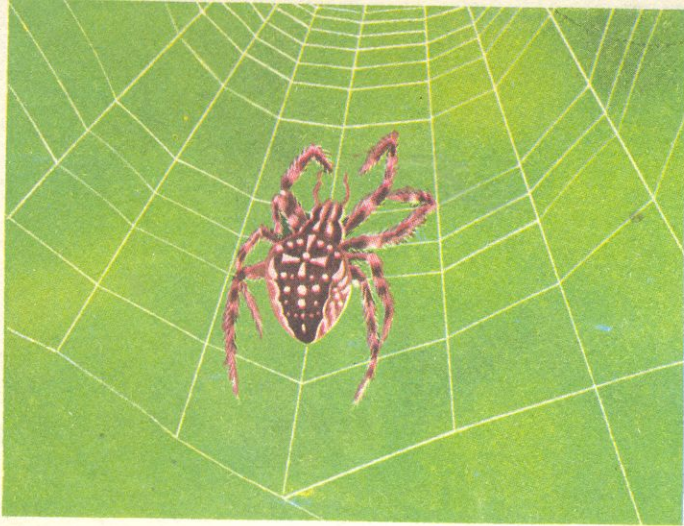
SLIDE A slide is a slippery surface which starts quite high off the ground and slopes back down.



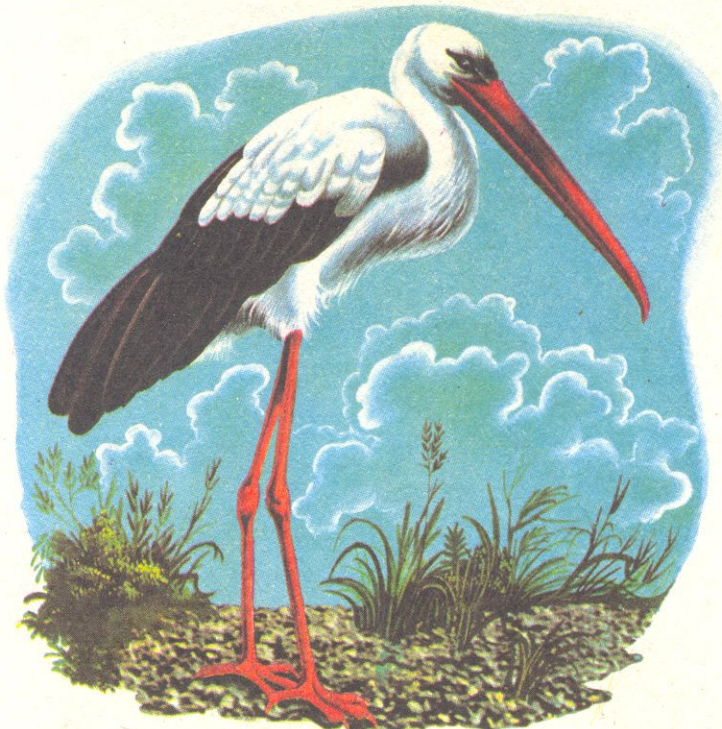
SNOWMAN Snowmen are made by rolling snow up into a big ball and then left to freeze. A face is made by using buttons for his eyes and, like in the picture, a carrot for his nose.



STAG The stag is the male of the red deer, and is distinguished by his magnificent antlers.



SPIDER Spiders live in webs which they spin themselves. They use the web to trap other insects, like flies, which they eat.



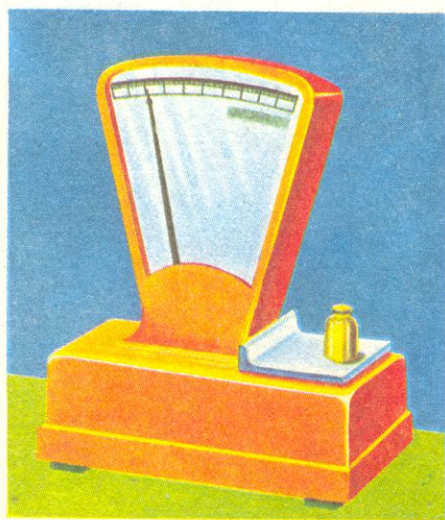
STORK The stork is a wading bird. Sometimes he stands in the water for hours on just one leg.



STORM A storm is heavy rain accompanied by thunder and lightning. When it snows very heavily we call this a snow storm.



SAND Rocks continually washed by sea water, or subjected to vast changes of temperature, slowly crumble to a powder that we call sand.



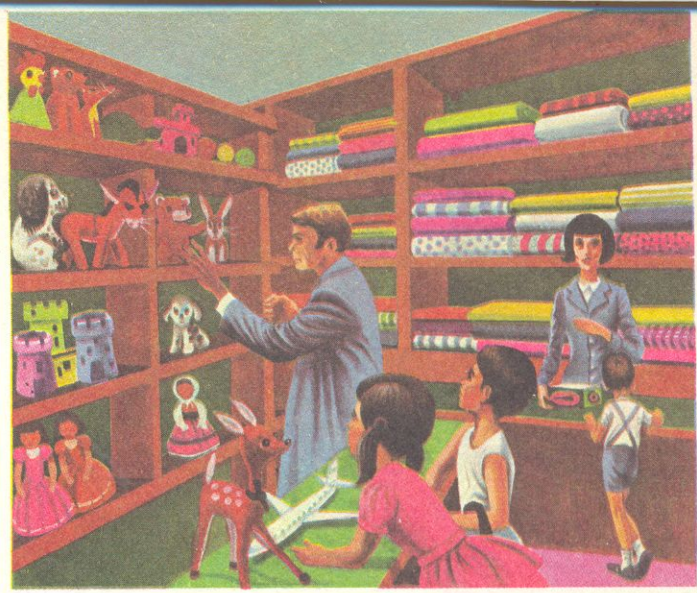
SCALES These are used to find out how much things weigh. The scales in the picture would be used in a grocer's shop for weighing food.



SUNFLOWER With its golden-rayed flowers, you can see why this is called a sunflower.



STRAWBERRIES Grown on bushes, this fruit is red in colour. They are a summer fruit.



SHOP Shops are places where you go to buy things. There are many different shops selling different products.



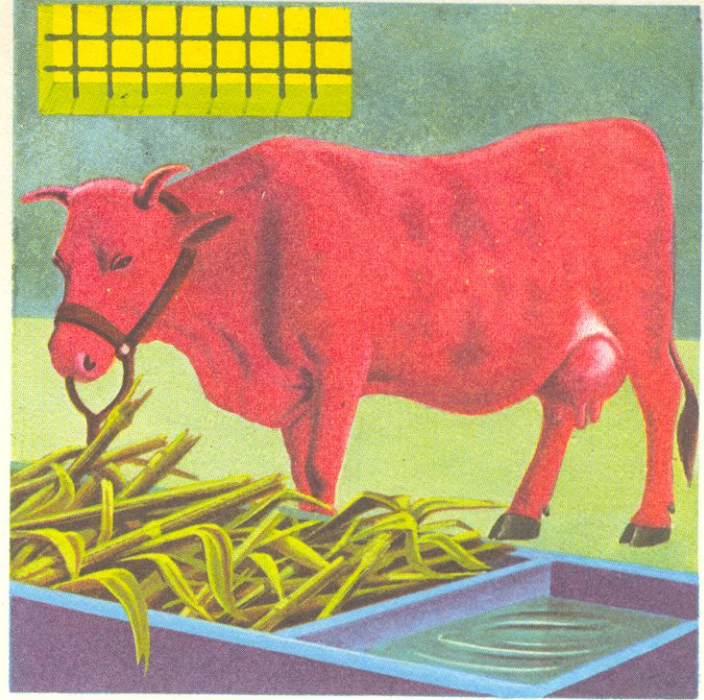
SANDALS These are open shoes fastened by straps. They are worn mainly in summer.



SKYLARK This lovely bird likes to fly spirally upwards singing.



STATUE A statue is a cast or moulded figure of someone . . . usually famous.



STABLE Animals like cows are kept in stables, particularly in winter. This is so that farmers can make sure that they are safe.



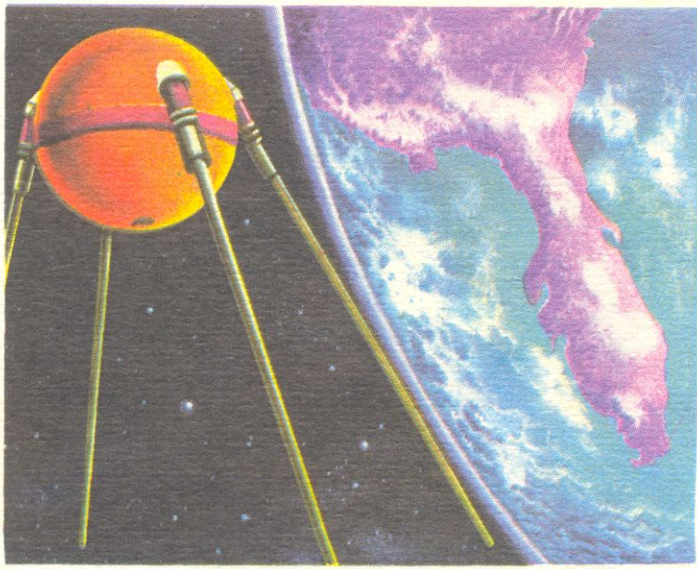
SHIRT Made from many different materials, shirts are garments worn mainly by men. They have a collar and cuffs and are fastened by buttons running right down the front.



SNAIL This very slow moving insect carries its house on its back.



SLEDGE Sledges are flat surfaces mounted on metal runners. These enable them to run freely over snow.



SATELLITE Satellites circle the earth sending back information to scientists. They can also be used to relay television pictures from countries many thousands of miles apart.



SOLDIER A soldier is a single member of an army. They carry guns and other weapons.



STONES This is a general term used to describe pieces of rock which can come in any size.



SPARROW This chirpy bird is very common indeed. They are plainly coloured. You can see lots of sparrows in your garden.



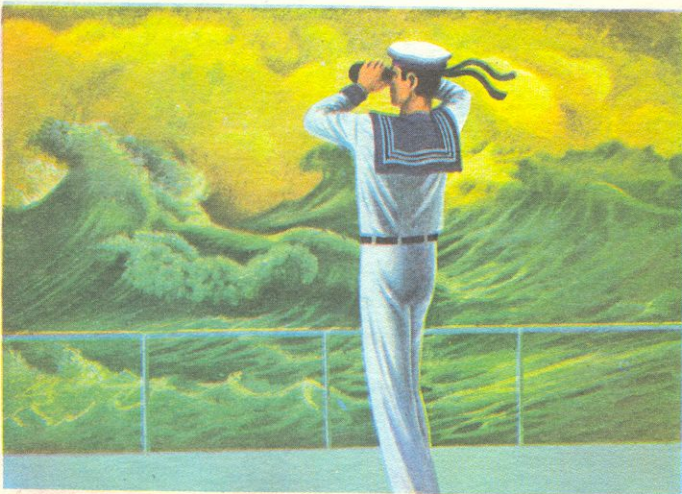
STAIRS Stairs are built to help us reach higher levels in our house.



SILVER BIRCH This tree is so called because they have two silver lines on the underside of their leaves.



SALAMI This is an Italian sausage and is highly flavoured.



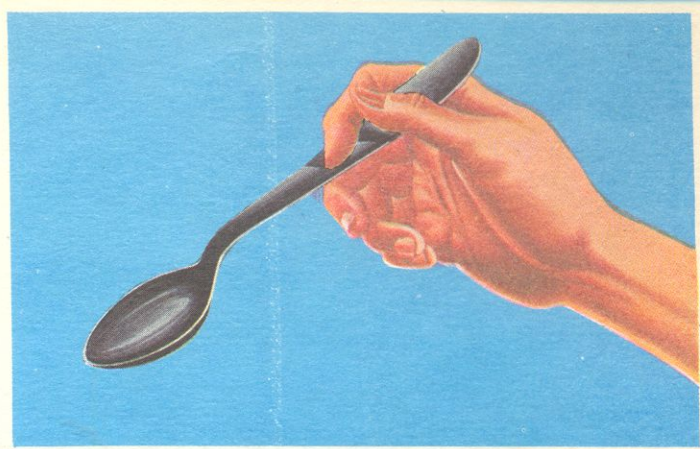
SAILOR The sailor is a single member of a navy. They sail the sea in ships.



SANTA CLAUS We also know him as Father Christmas. He brings your presents at Christmas time.



SNOWDROP This is a white coloured flower which appears in the spring.



SPOONS The spoon on the left is called a table spoon. This is usually used as a measure in cooking. The other one is a dessert spoon and we use it for eating our soup or afters with.



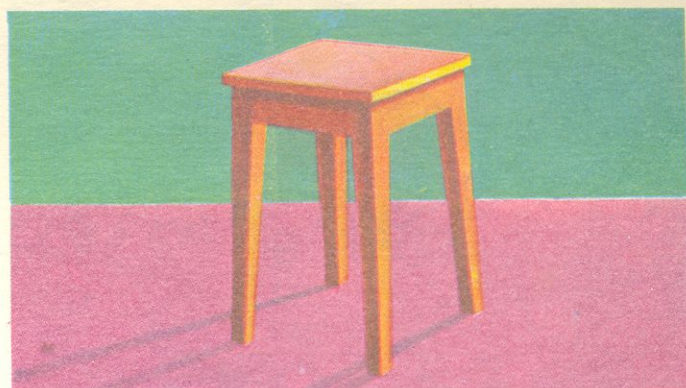
SEWING MACHINE Powered by an electric motor, this machine sends a needle with cotton threaded in it up and down very fast. By moving material underneath the needle, large areas can be sewn very quickly.



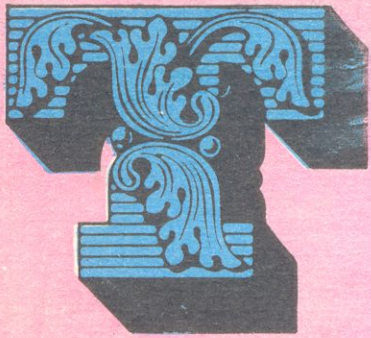
SWING A swing is a flat surface attached by rope or chains to a frame. By sitting on the swing and moving backwards and forwards you can swing to and fro and sometimes go very high into the air.



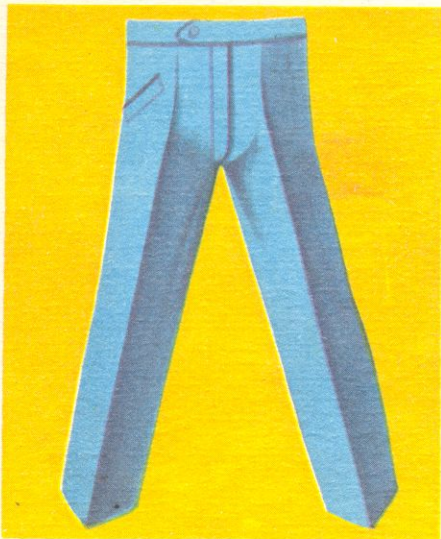
SOCKS You wear socks on your feet. They are made from wool or nylon.



STOOL This is a backless chair and is usually not very high off the ground.



TEAL This is a kind of dark coloured, freshwater duck.



TROUSERS These are two-legged outer garments worn mostly by men.



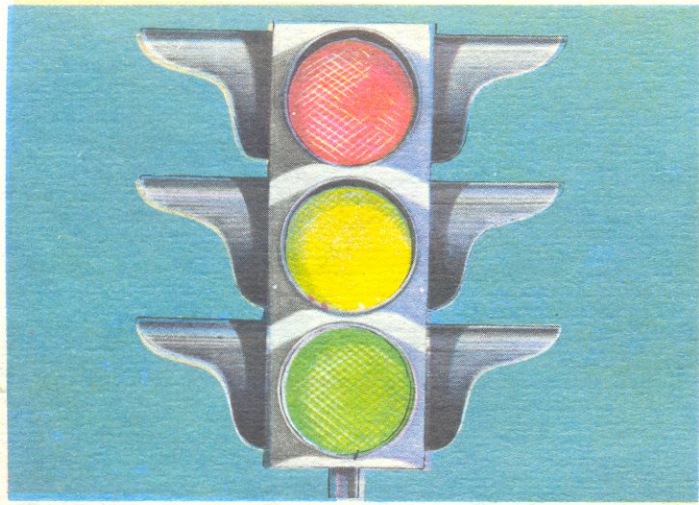
TAILOR A tailor makes clothes. First he takes your measurements, then he marks them out on some material. Next he cuts the material and sews it up to the correct shape.



TWILIGHT This is the part of the day when the sun is setting and the moon is rising.



TRAM This is a sort of bus powered by overhead cables.



TRAFFIC LIGHTS The colours of traffic lights are red, amber and green. Each colour issues instructions to tell drivers what to do next.



TELEPHONE People who own a telephone have a special number. When someone dials that number, your phone rings and by listening at the 'phone's earpiece you can hear the person talking. At the other end of the receiver is a mouthpiece which you use to speak back.



TOWEL Towels are made from absorbant materials so that you can dry yourself on them after you have had a wash.

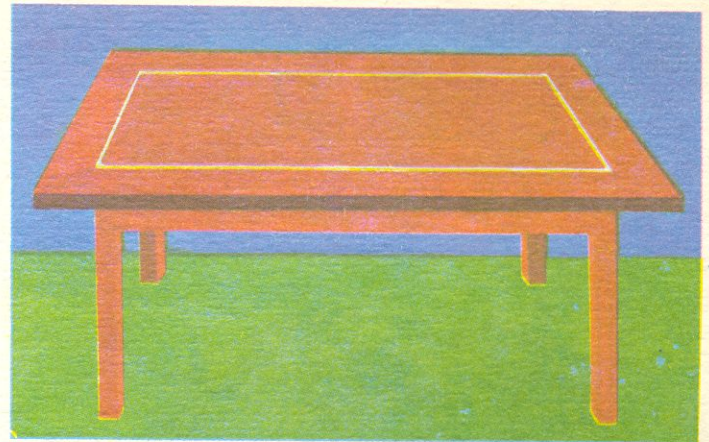
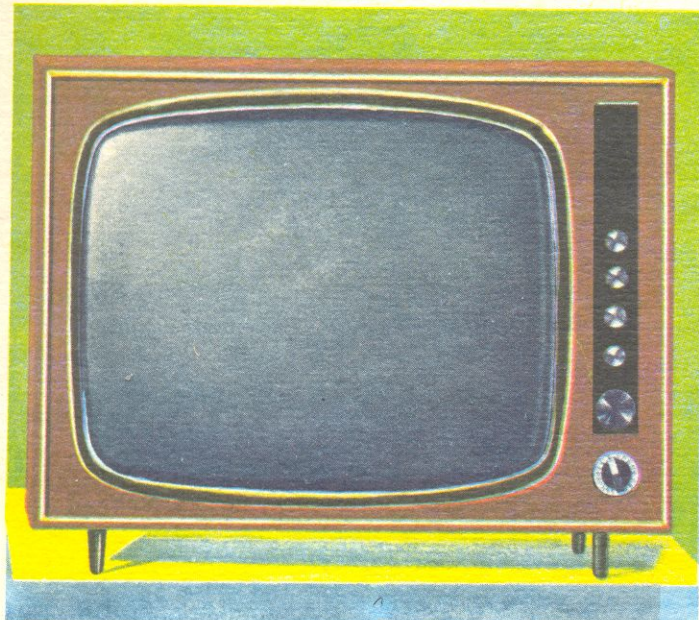
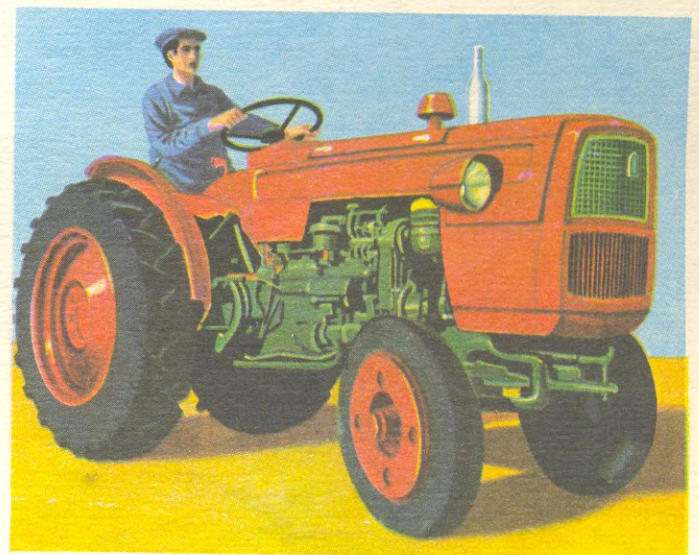


TABLE A flat-topped surface on legs. We sit at a table when we are having our dinner.



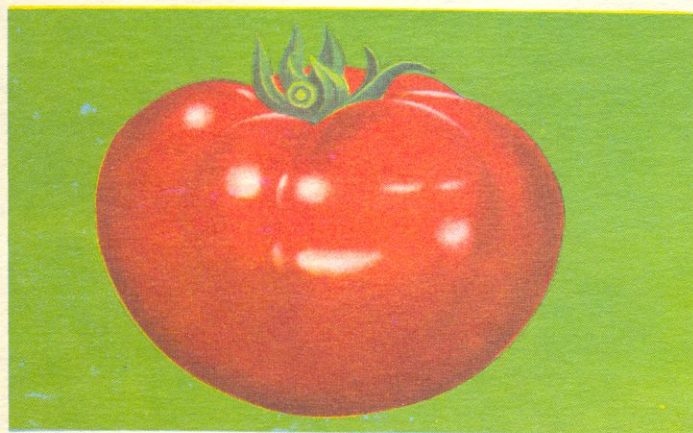
TELEVISION Programmes are broadcasted from television studios and the TV sets which are in our homes pick up the programmes for us to watch.



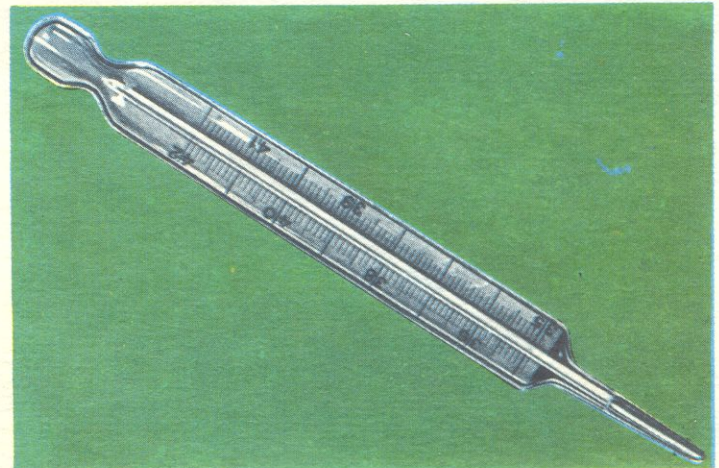
TRACTOR This is a farm vehicle which is used to pull heavy loads with.



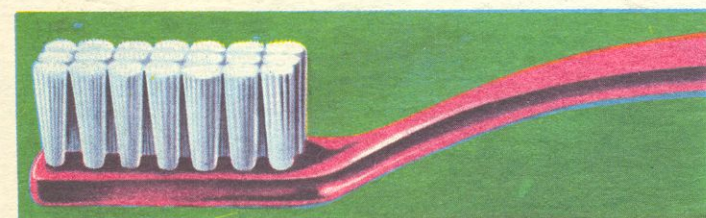
TIGER Tigers are striped, ferocious jungle cats usually found in India.



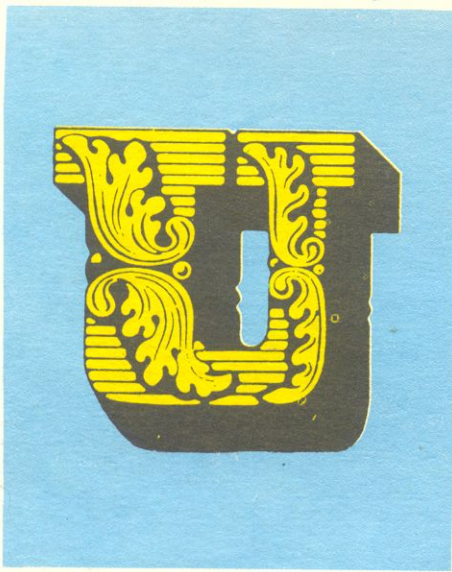
TOMATO A red-skinned, edible fruit, tomatoes are used as a vegetable. You can eat them cooked or raw.



THERMOMETER A gauge for measuring the temperature. This is achieved by a line of mercury moving up and down the thermometer. It goes up when it is hot and moves down when it cools.



TOOTHBRUSH A small brush with stiff bristles and a long handle. You use this to brush your teeth with.



UMBRELLA Umbrellas are used to help keep us dry when it rains.



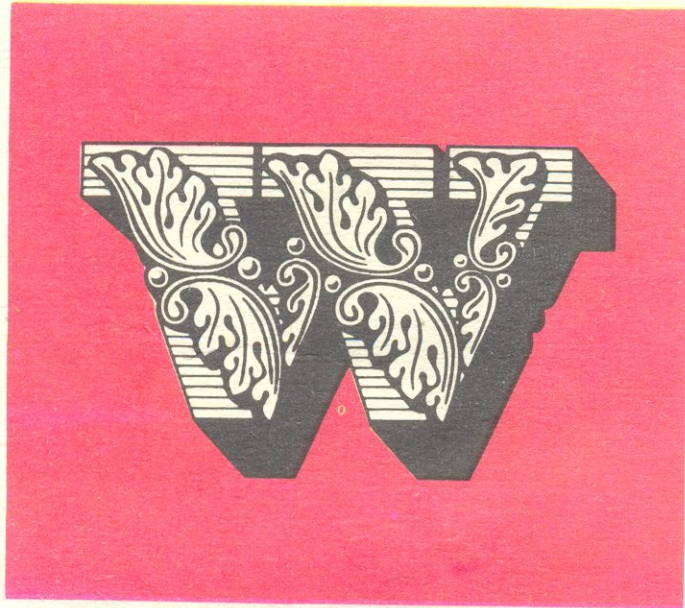
UNDERGROUND RAILWAY This is a network of tunnels which carry passenger trains across some large cities. We call the trains 'tubes.'



VIOLIN A musical instrument whose strings are made from cat gut. It is played by moving a bow across the strings.



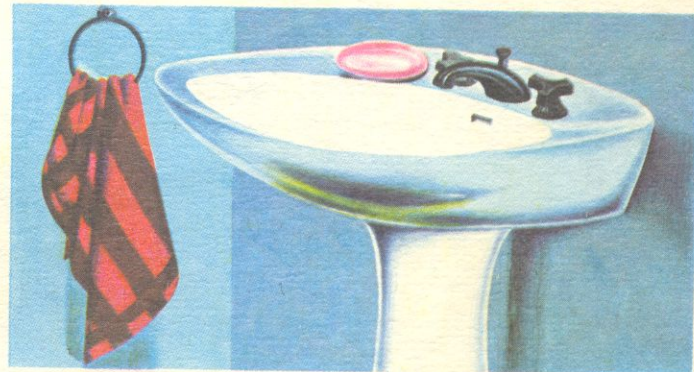
VULTURE These are large birds of prey that feed mainly on dead animals.



WASHING MACHINE This is an automatic machine which washes, rinses and spins clothes dry.



WARDROBE A sort of cupboard used for hanging up your clothes in. Do you have one in your bedroom?

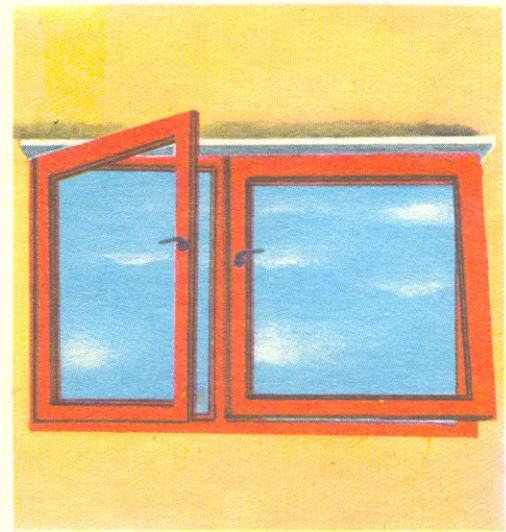
WOLVES Wolves hunt in packs. They prey mainly on sheep.



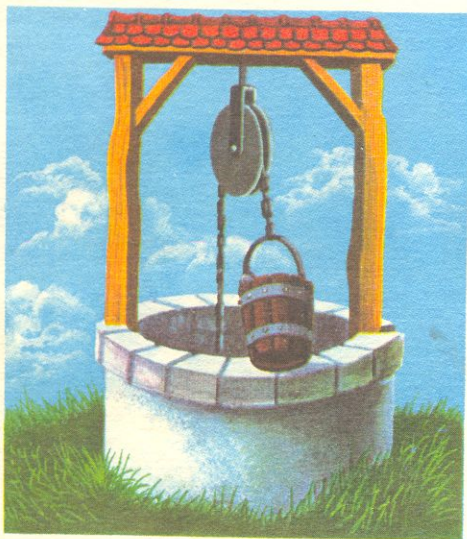
WINTER TIME This is the time of year when the trees are bare; the forest animals are hibernating and the ground is covered with snow.



WILLOWS These trees grow by the waterside and their branches and leaves droop towards the water. They are known as weeping willows.



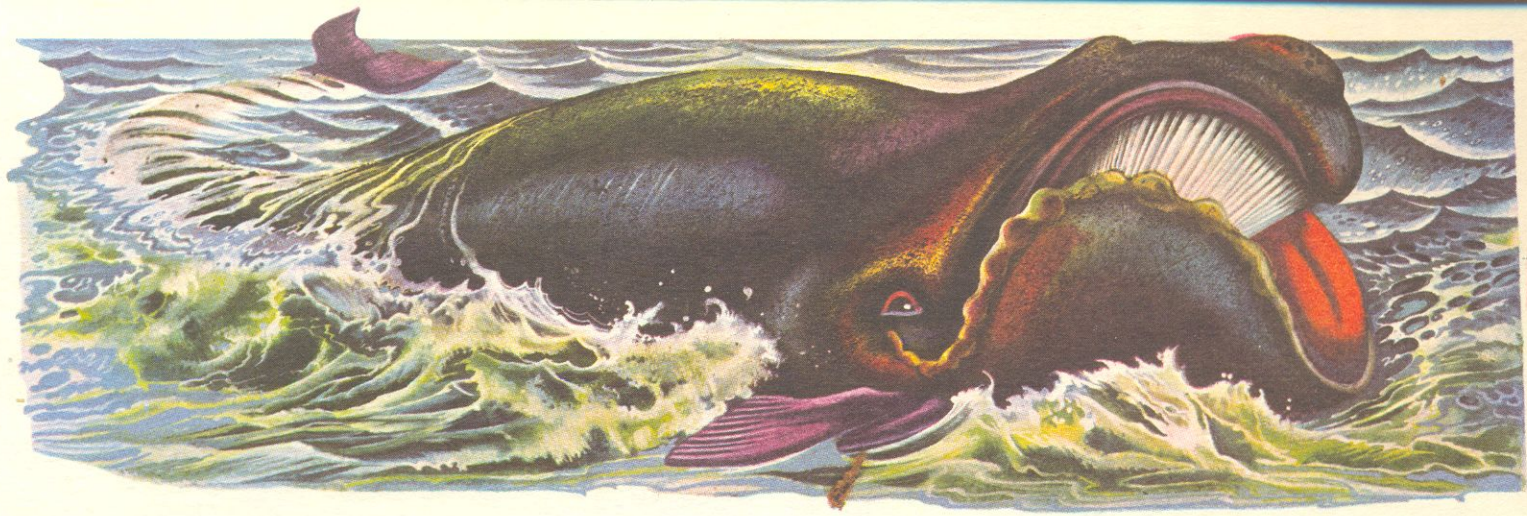
WINDOW Made of glass and set in frames, windows help give rooms light and also allow us to look outside.



WELL This is a water well. The water is drawn from the well by a bucket tied onto a long piece of rope.



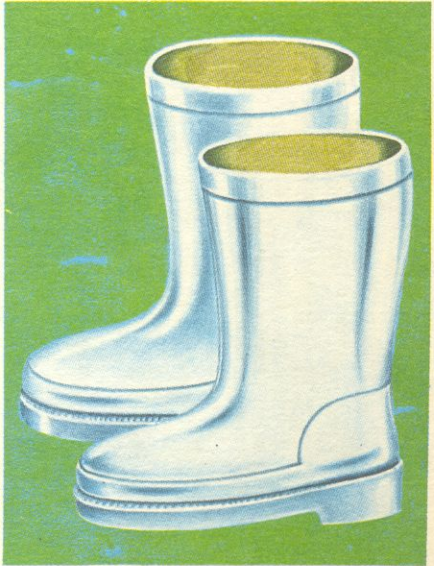
WASP This insect has black and yellow stripes, a slender body and a very nasty sting.

WOODPECKER This bird taps the bark of the tree with its beak to discover insects.



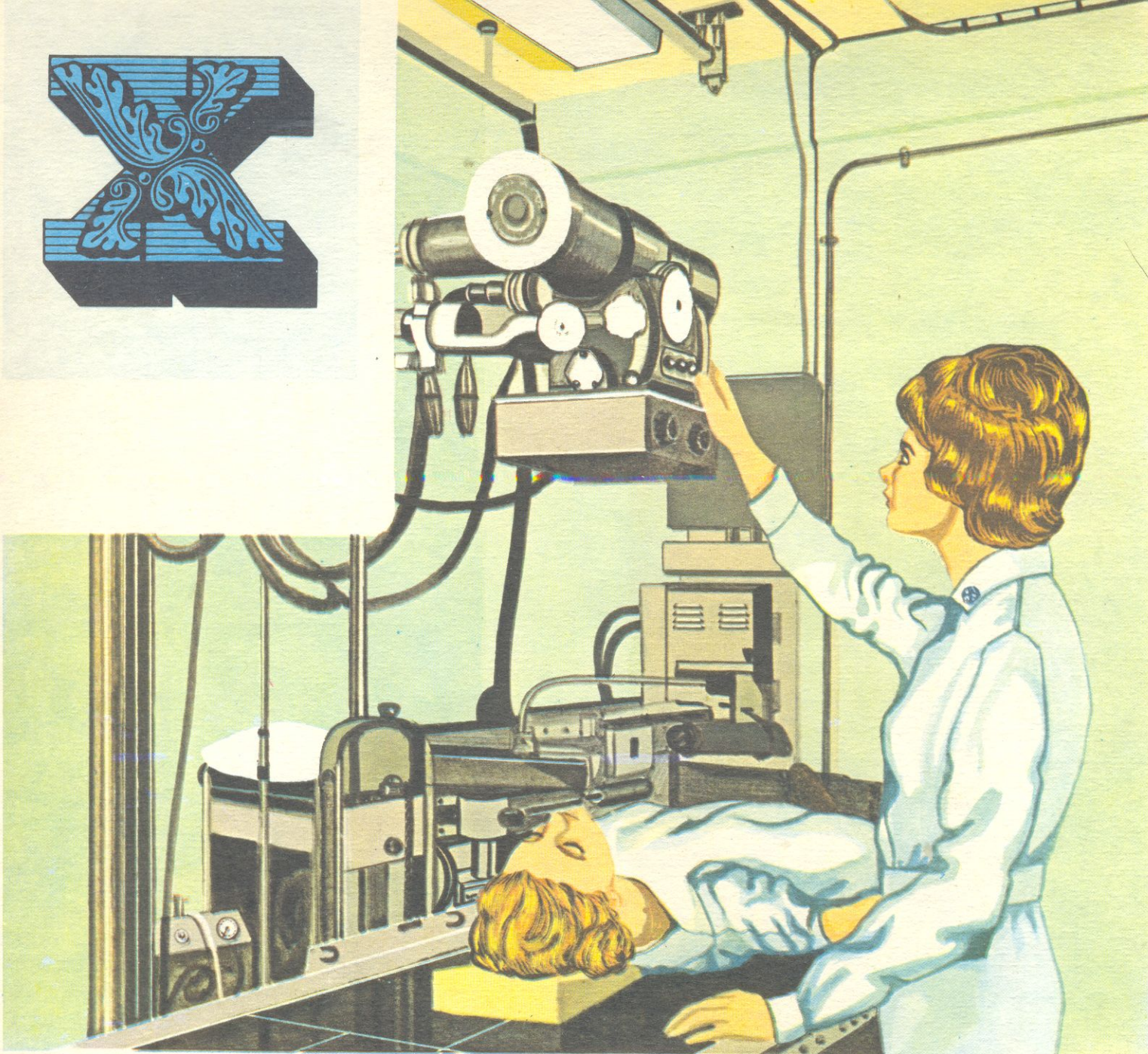
WELLINGTONS Wellington boots are made from rubber or plastic and are worn to protect feet from water.



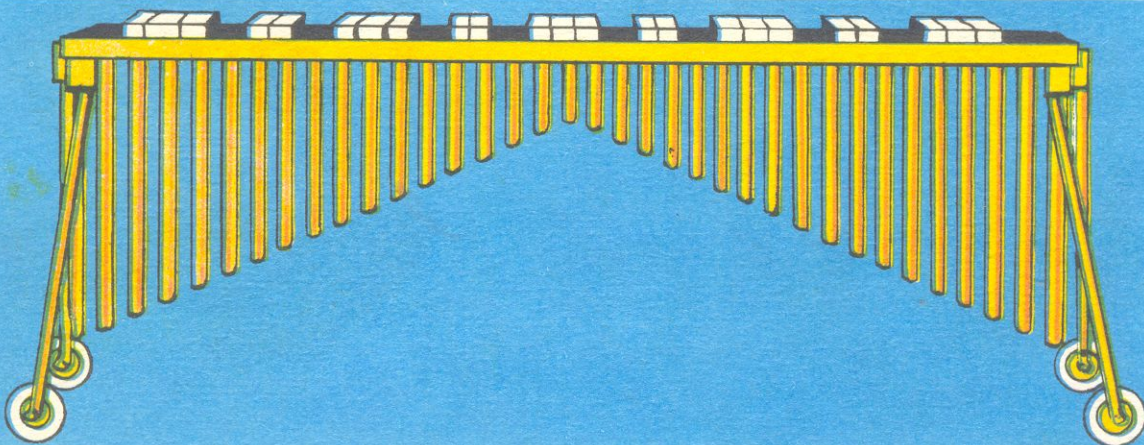
WHEAT The seed of wheat is very nutritious and can be eaten when refined.



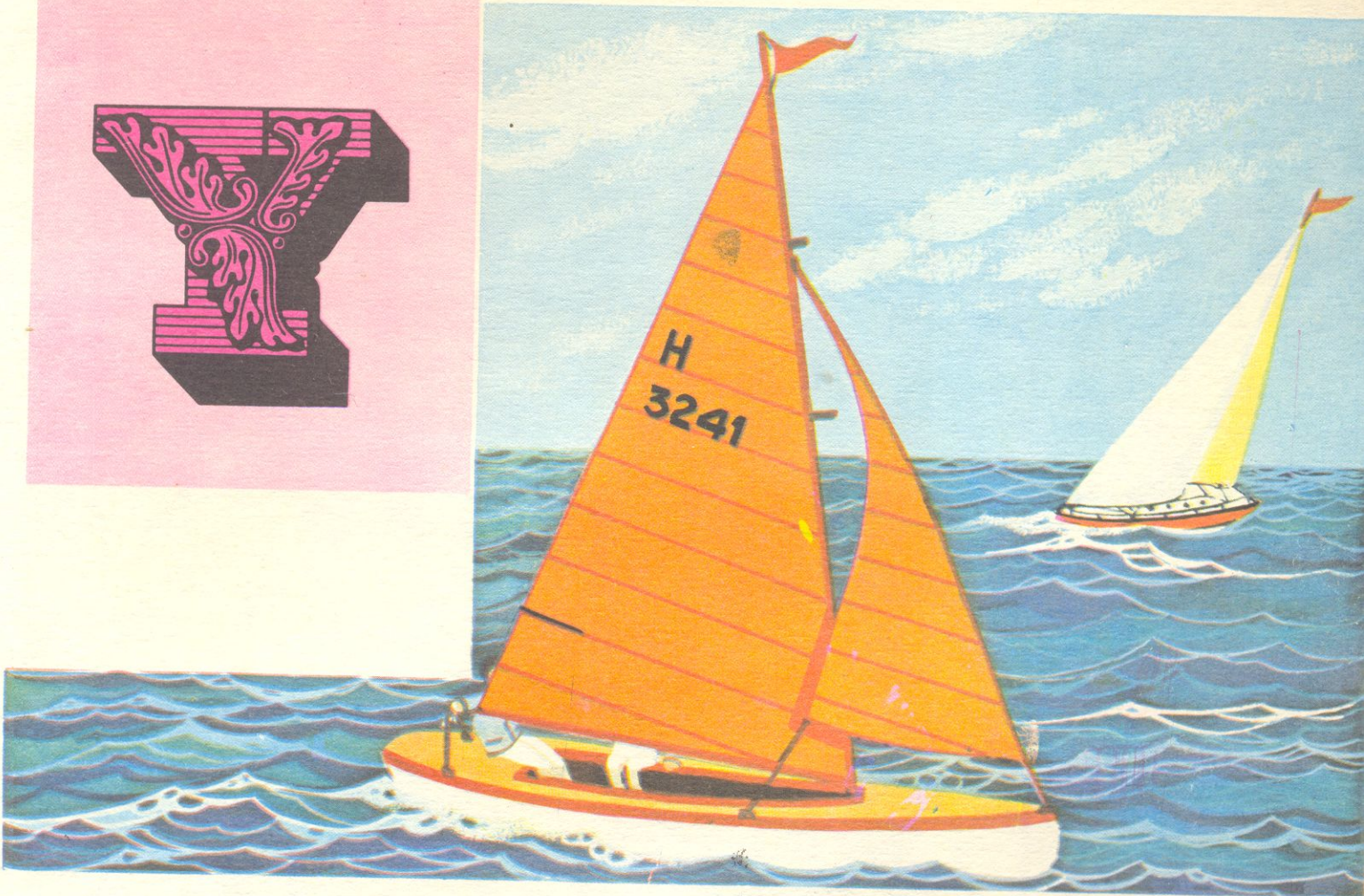
WATERING CAN Can you see the water spraying out of the spout? This is so that plants can be watered gently and evenly.



X-RAY By the use of X-rays which can photograph the inside of human bodies, doctors are able to see what is wrong with people.



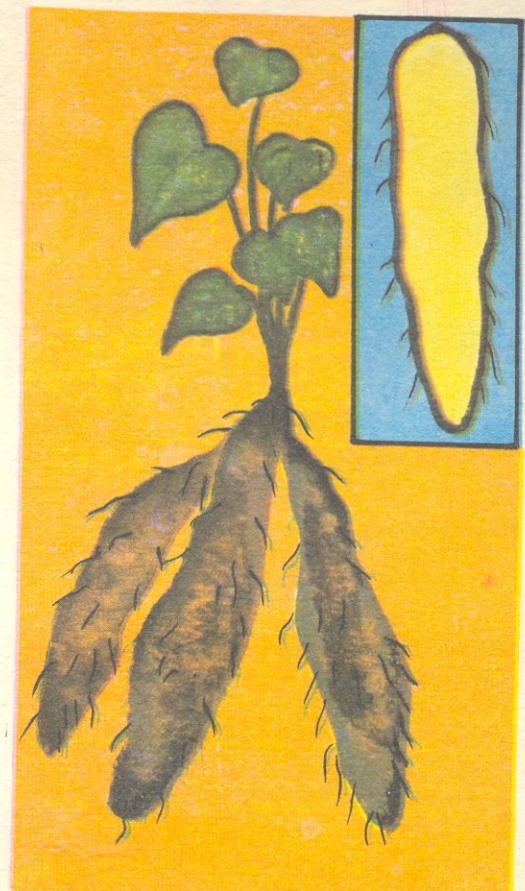
XYLOPHONE This is a musical instrument made up of wooden bars which are struck by 'hammers' to produce a musical sound.



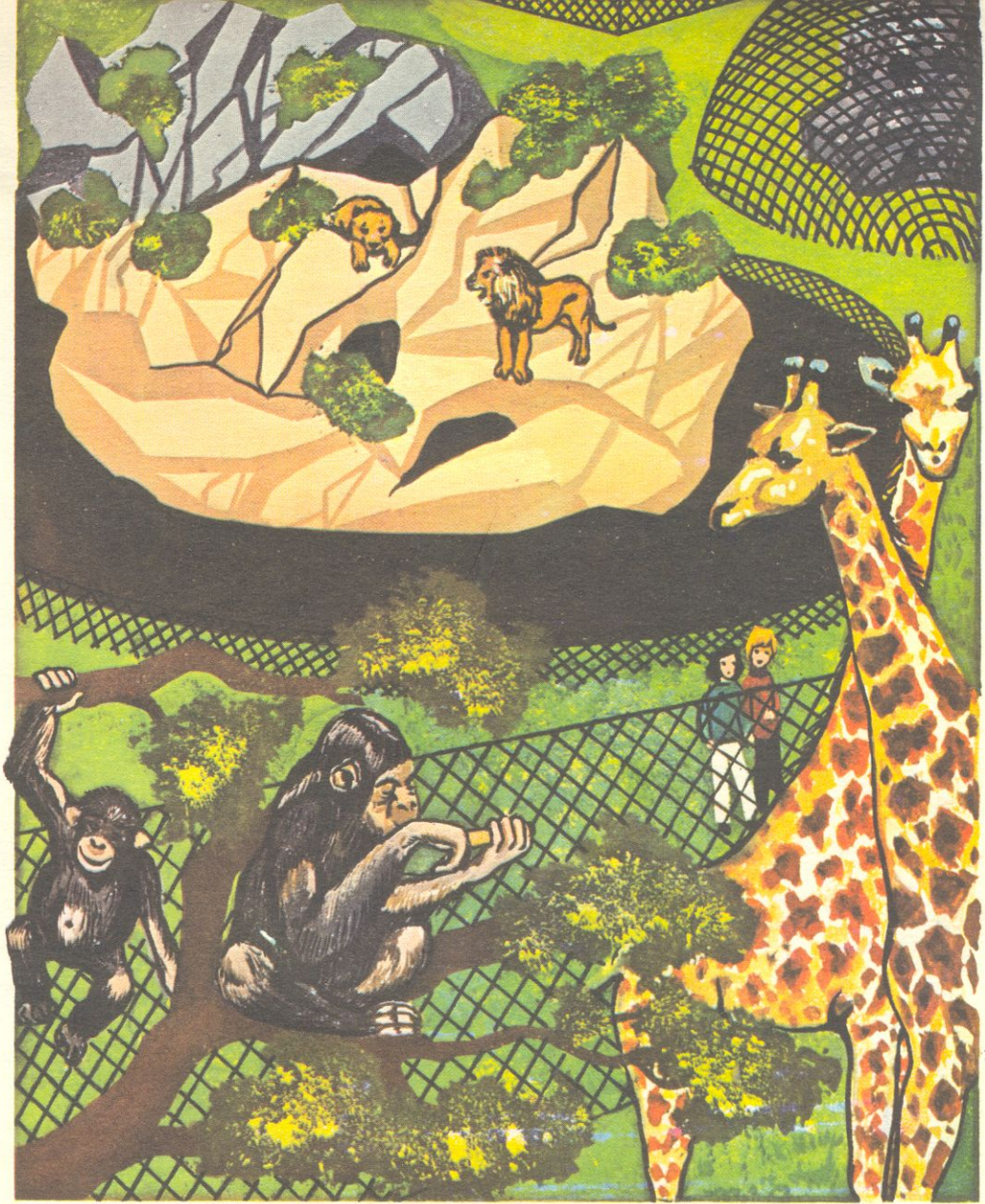
YACHT This is a light sailing vessel used for racing.

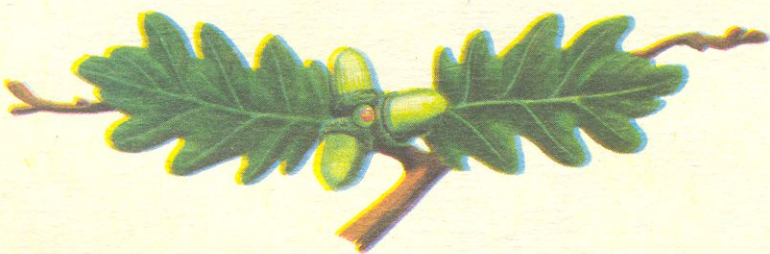


ZEBRA This animal resembles a horse except of course that it has black and white stripes.
