## **Abiding**

Meaning: Ongoing; continues for a long time.

Example: Abiding love for old movies.

## **Able-bodied**

Meaning: Strong and healthy; physically fit.

Example: Our construction company requires only able-bodied workers.

## **Abolish**

Meaning: To cancel; put an end to; terminate; finish something.

Example: Prohibition was abolished in 1933.

## **Absentminded**

Meaning: One who constantly forgets things or fails to notice things.

Example: Sarah's absentminded husband forgot his car keys at the bar.

## **Abundant**

Meaning: Available in large quantities; more than enough.

Example: The lake near our house is abundant in fish.

## **Accentuate**

Meaning: To make more noticeable.

Example: Dan's new shirt accentuates his biceps.

## **Accrue**

Meaning: To accumulate; gradually increase over time.

Example: I placed my money in a saving account to accrue interest.

### **Acerbic**

Meaning: Harsh, sarcastic and critical.

Example: Someone left a very acerbic comment under my new video.

### **Adamant**

Meaning: Unwillingness to change one's mind, decision, or belief.

Example: Mike was adamant in his decision to quit his job.

### **Afflatus**

Meaning: Sudden burst of inspiration; strong creative impulse.

Example: In 1995, on a wave of afflatus, I wrote my first book.

### **Aggravate**

Meaning: Make something bad even worse.

Example: The new treatment plan only aggravated her condition

### **Aimless**

Meaning: Without clear purpose or intent.

Example: Jack's life became aimless after the death of his wife.

### **Akin**

Meaning: Similar in some way.

Example: He spoke in a language akin to Spanish; this game is akin to football.

**Aloof**

Meaning: Unfriendly; stays away from others; distant.

Example: Jessica kept aloof from her father's new wife.

**Ambrosial**

Meaning: Delicious; something very tasty or smelly.

Example: Her mother's birthday cake was ambrosial.

**Antagonize**

Meaning: Make someone dislike you or get mad at you.

Example: After the divorce, Rebecca tried to antagonize our kids against me.

**Ante up**

Meaning: To give money; pay what is due.

Example: My landlord told me to ante up or vacate the apartment by the beginning of the month.

**Antiquated**

Meaning: Too old; old-fashioned; no longer useful.

Example: Antiquated system; antiquated beliefs; antiquated methods; antiquated laws.

**As right as rain**

Meaning: To feel great or healthy again.

Example: After the final stage of therapy, he is as right as rain now.

### **Assertive**

Meaning: Very confident without being aggressive.

Example: If you want to get this job, you need to be more assertive.

### **A stone's throw**

Meaning: Very close.

Example: Her apartment is just a stone's throw from the city center.

### **Awe**

Meaning: A feeling of deep respect and approval combined with fear.

Example: Sam was in awe of his strong father; Dina gazed at the soldiers with awe.

### **Backlash**

Meaning: A strong and unfavorable reaction of a large number of people to political or social changes.

Example: Government faces backlash from voters; the backlash against default.

### **Bad blood**

Meaning: Feelings of enmity and hatred between people for events that occurred in the past.

Example: There has been bad blood between John and Sarah for years.

### **Baleful**

Meaning: Capable of doing something bad or hurting someone; evil; hateful.

Example: The bully gave me a baleful look.



**Barmy**

Meaning: Extremely stupid; slightly crazy.

Example: Barmy idea, barmy decision.

**Barren**

Meaning: Sterile; unable to produce anything.

Example: This land is barren, we cannot grow anything here.

**Batty**

Meaning: Crazy; mad; mentally unstable.

Example: Dean gets a bit batty when we talk about politics.

**Bawl**

Meaning: Scream or cry very loudly.

Example: "Stop hitting my husband!" she bawled.

**Bear up**

Meaning: Face a difficult situation with courage and bravery.

Example: Donna is bearing up well under the strain of losing her apartment.

**Beckon**

Meaning: Make a hand or head gesture to encourage someone to come closer.

Example: She beckoned to the waiter.

**Beggarly**

Meaning: Very poor; small in amount.

Example: Dan received a beggarly sum for his excellent work.

### **Besotted**

Meaning: Deeply in love with someone; thinking about someone all the time.

Example: Ronda is completely besotted with her new boyfriend.

### **Bewitching**

Meaning: Seductively attractive; delightful; fascinating; charming.

Example: Craig was bewitched by Fiona's beauty.

### **Billow**

Meaning: To be filled with air; huge moving mass of something.

Example: The sails billowed in the wind; billow of smoke.

### **Bite the bullet**

Meaning: Force yourself to do something extremely hard or unpleasant.

Example: I hate doing this part of my job, but I have to bite the bullet and get it done.

### **Boisterous**

Meaning: Noisy; loud; full of energy and a little out of control.

Example: A boisterous horse; boisterous children; boisterous crowd.

### **Bonkers**

Meaning: Silly; crazy; stupid.

Example: Ron must be bonkers to take such a risk.

**Bountiful**

Meaning: Large in amount; generous.

Example: Bountiful supply of food; bountiful land.

**Braggart**

Meaning: Someone who talks about their accomplishments with extreme pride.

Example: He was so annoying and braggart, always talking about what a successful football player he was 20 years ago.

**Brush up**

Meaning: Improve your knowledge of something.

Example: You need to brush up on your French before you go to Paris.

**Buffoonery**

Meaning: Stupid and silly behavior that makes you laugh.

Example: John's buffoonery was funny, but completely out of place.

**Burdensome**

Meaning: Difficult to carry out; hard to deal with.

Example: All my problems were too burdensome for her, so she broke up with me.

**Burly**

Meaning: Big; has strong muscles.

Example: Burly powerlifter; burly worker.

**Call it a day**

Meaning: To stop what you're doing.

Example: I'm tired! Let's call it a day and go home.

**Callous**

Meaning: Cruel; does not care about other people or their feelings.

Example: It might sound a bit callous, but I don't care if she's alive.

**Cap off**

Meaning: Successfully complete or finish something.

Example: He capped off business meeting with a signed contract.

**Chagrin**

Meaning: Disappointment; grief; distress; deep sorrow.

Example: Much to his father's chagrin, John did not become a doctor.

**Clique**

Meaning: A group of people (usually united by a common interest or purpose) who spend time together and don't allow others to join them.

Example: A small clique of chess players; clique at work; clique at school.

**Clogged**

Meaning: Become blocked, obstructed, or filled.

Example: The waterways are clogged with leaves in autumn.

**Cloistered**

Meaning: Secluded; separated from the outside world; one who stays away from the usual busy life.

Example: Most IT specialists lead a cloistered life; she cloistered herself away with her smartphone.

### **Clueless**

Meaning: Know nothing about a particular subject or in general.

Example: I'm completely clueless about programming.

### **Coarsen**

Meaning: To become rough or less polite.

Example: His hands were coarsened by years of work; last year in prison had coarsened him.

### **Coax**

Meaning: Gently persuade someone to do something.

Example: It took a lot of coaxing before my dad agreed to buy me a new computer.

### **Colossal**

Meaning: Extremely large; gigantic.

Example: Colossal effort; colossal amount of money; colossal sacrifice.

### **Companionate**

Meaning: Super friendly; harmoniously suited.

Example: Companionate marriage; companionate love.

### **Conceal**

Meaning: Cover or hide something; prevent disclosure.

Example: Conceal the truth; conceal identity.

**Conceited**

Meaning: Being too proud of yourself; narcissistic.

Example: I don't want to sound conceited, but I'm the smartest person in this room.

**Consecutive**

Meaning: Following one after another in a certain order.

Example: The numbers 10, 11, and 12 are consecutive.

**Copious**

Meaning: More than enough; plentiful.

Example: She drinks copious amounts of coffee.

**Coquettish**

Meaning: Flirty; playful; behaves in a way that seems very attractive.

Example: A coquettish outfit; coquettish smile; coquettish girl.

**Cordial**

Meaning: Friendly and warm.

Example: Cordial relations between the two countries.

**Crammed**

Meaning: Filled with people or things.

Example: Her closet is crammed with clothes.

**Craven**

Meaning: Showing a lack of courage.

Example: A craven traitor; craven deserter.

### **Crumbly**

Meaning: Something that breaks easily into many small parts or pieces.

Example: This cake has a very crumbly texture.

### **Dawdle**

Meaning: Be very slow and waste time.

Example: Stop dawdling! We will miss our plane.

### **Dazzle**

Meaning: To lose clear vision (temporarily) when looking at bright light.

Example: John was dazzled by the sunlight.

### **Debilitate**

Meaning: To make someone or something weaker.

Example: They were debilitated by hunger and disease.

### **Deceitful**

Meaning: Lying; dishonest; not telling the truth.

Example: Deceitful behavior; deceitful politician; deceitful child.

### **Deflate**

Meaning: To release the air or gas from; to make someone less confident or strong.

Example: Deflate the balloon; she was deflated by losing a job.

**Dehort**

Meaning: To persistently try to persuade or convince someone not to do something.

Example: He tried to dehort her not to buy that red car.

**Deplorable**

Meaning: Extremely sad, bad, or unacceptable.

Example: She lived in deplorable conditions.

**Detestable**

Meaning: Deserves to be hated; extremely unpleasant.

Example: Detestable coward; detestable fraud.

**Devious**

Meaning: Dishonest but skillful; will do everything to achieve the goal.

Example: Devious businessman; devious politician.

**Dimly**

Meaning: Without much light.

Example: Dimly room; dimly streets.

**Dismay**

Meaning: A strong feeling of fear, anxiety, or disappointment.

Example: "He stole my car and left me on the road!" she said in dismay.

**Dizzy**



Meaning: Feeling as if you are losing your balance and might fall.

Example: When I got to the top of the mountain, I felt a little dizzy.

### **Dreadful**

Meaning: Causing great suffering or fear; extremely unpleasant or bad.

Example: Dreadful experience; dreadful behavior; dreadful news.

### **Drenched**

Meaning: Completely wet.

Example: Drenched by rain; drenched with sweat.

### **Dwindle**

Meaning: To become smaller or less in number.

Example: Her savings dwindled to 100 bucks; dwindling resources; dwindling population.

### **Ecstatic**

Meaning: Extremely happy, enthusiastic, and full of excitement.

Example: John was ecstatic about his new car.

### **Eerie**

Meaning: Mysterious, frightening, very strange.

Example: It's a bit eerie to walk down a dark path at night.

### **Elated**

Meaning: Extremely happy, proud, or excited.

Example: Serena was elated with her new dress.

## **Embroid**

Meaning: To involve someone in an argument, trouble, or a difficult situation.

Example: My wife embroiled me in an argument with her parents.

## **Enticing**

Meaning: Attractive; causing a strong desire or interest; makes you want it.

Example: His offer was so enticing, but I had to refuse.

## **Erstwhile**

Meaning: Former; previous.

Example: Erstwhile lover; erstwhile friends; erstwhile employer.

## **Excruciating**

Meaning: Causing great physical or emotional pain.

Example: Excruciating memories; excruciating back pain.

## **Exhale**

Meaning: To breathe out.

Example: Take a deep breath, wait 7 seconds and exhale slowly.

## **Exuberant**

Meaning: Full of energy or excitement; lively.

Example: Exuberant performance; exuberant crowd.

## **Famished**

Meaning: Extremely hungry.

Example: When is breakfast? I am famished.

### **Farcical**

Meaning: Something so stupid, ridiculous, or silly that you can't take it seriously.

Example: It was a farcical trial; farcical behavior; farcical situation.

### **Fatigued**

Meaning: Become weaker; tired; exhausted.

Example: She's fatigued from the long ride.

### **Fawn over**

Meaning: Giving someone a lot of attention that isn't sincere; be extremely nice to someone.

Example: Most people hate waiters who fawn over them.

### **Feel under the weather**

Meaning: Feel a little unwell; slightly ill.

Example: I'm feeling a bit under the weather and won't be going to work today.

### **Feisty**

Meaning: Courageous; forceful; not afraid to argue with people.

Example: Feisty young activists; feisty fighter.

### **Ferret out**

Meaning: Searching for something (like information) very carefully and thoroughly.

Example: I want to ferret out the truth about her past.

### **Ferocious**

Meaning: Extremely violent, aggressive, and intimidating.

Example: Her dog was very ferocious.

### **Fervid**

Meaning: Extremely passionate about someone or something; highly enthusiastic.

Example: Fervid followers; fervid orator.

### **Flimsy**

Meaning: Super weak; easily broken; extremely thin.

Example: Flimsy door; flimsy construction; flimsy dress.

### **Fondly**

Meaning: Showing great love, care, or strong liking.

Example: He smiled fondly at his son.

### **Forlorn**

Meaning: Lonely, sad, and unhappy; abandoned.

Example: This house is forlorn and empty; she looked so forlorn standing there alone.

### **Frenetic**

Meaning: Fast and energetic; uncontrolled and disorganized.

Example: A frenetic attempt to win the competition at the last minute; frenetic activity; frenetic pace.

### **Fretful**

Meaning: Behavior that shows that you are unhappy or dissatisfied with something.

Example: He's always so fretful when he is tired or hungry.

### **Garish**

Meaning: Unpleasantly bright; colorful in an unattractive way.

Example: This dress is too garish for my taste; this store has too garish and luminous signs.

### **Garrulous**

Meaning: Talking a lot (mostly about unimportant things).

Example: I live with a very garrulous roommate.

### **Gauche**

Meaning: Shy; feels uncomfortable in the company of other people.

Example: Gauche teenager; gauche manner.

### **Gingerly**

Meaning: In a very careful manner.

Example: Anna gingerly plucked the rose; he opened the box gingerly.

### **Glittering**

Meaning: Impressive or successful; bright and shining.

Example: John has a glittering career in IT; glittering diamond ring.

## **Gleeful**

Meaning: Full of triumphant happiness or joy.

Example: She was so gleeful when her opponent was disqualified; he was very gleeful with his success.

## **Godsend**

Meaning: Something good that happened unexpectedly and helped you a lot.

Example: The rain was a godsend for dryland farmers.

## **Go easy on someone**

Meaning: To treat someone more gently, less harshly.

Example: Go easy on your little brother, he's just a kid.

## **Go easy on something**

Meaning: To use less of something.

Example: Go easy on the alcohol and fatty foods.

## **Gormless**

Meaning: Lacking intelligence; stupid.

Example: He looks really gormless.

## **Grasping**

Meaning: Very greedy; always trying to get more money.

Example: Grasping landlord; grasping banker.

## **Grating**

Meaning: Sounds extremely annoying.

Example: Grating voice; grating noise; grating cry.

### **Grind to a halt**

Meaning: To stop; come to an end.

Example: Without new investments, our startup will soon grind to a halt.

### **Grueling**

Meaning: Extremely tiring, exhausting, or demanding.

Example: A grueling work schedule; grueling hike; grueling race.

### **Harebrained**

Meaning: Unthinking and reckless; silly; unlikely to succeed; foolish.

Example: Harebrained plan; harebrained idea; harebrained scheme.

### **Hastily**

Meaning: Done in a hurry; very quickly.

Example: She hastily made her choice and now regrets it.

### **Haywire**

Meaning: Out of control; out of order; doesn't work correctly.

Example: The laptop's gone haywire; our economy has gone haywire.

### **Hazardous**

Meaning: Dangerous; unsafe; involving risk.

Example: Smoking is hazardous to your health.

**Heinous**

Meaning: Shockingly evil or bad.

Example: Heinous torture; heinous crime.

**Hiss**

Meaning: To make a sound like a long 's'.

Example: She hisses at me like a snake; Rachel hissed at me to shut up.

**Hit the books**

Meaning: Study hard.

Example: I will have to hit the books to prepare for this difficult exam.

**Hoggish**

Meaning: Egoistic; only thinking about yourself; dirty.

Example: Don't be so hoggish and give me half of our winnings.

**Huffy**

Meaning: Easily offended; angry over nothing.

Example: Erica gets huffy if you mention her ex-boyfriend's name.

**Immaculate**

Meaning: Extremely clean and tidy.

Example: His suit was immaculate; the car was in immaculate condition.

**Impede**

Meaning: Delay or prevent something or someone; to slow the movement or progress.



Example: Nothing can impede technological progress.

### **Imperil**

Meaning: Put at risk of being harmed or injured.

Example: Our company was imperiled by a series of bad decisions.

### **Incite**

Meaning: To encourage someone to do something illegal or violent.

Example: He incited his friend to rob a bank.

### **Indemnify**

Meaning: Compensate for damage or loss.

Example: Anna was obliged to indemnify her boss for the damage she caused to the firm.

### **Inquiringly**

Meaning: In a way that shows you need more information about something.

Example: Jack looked at his wife inquiringly, after seeing her with another man.

### **Insoluble**

Meaning: Impossible to solve.

Example: This task is insoluble.

### **Intently**

Meaning: With great attention.

Example: I listened intently throughout the lesson.

**Inter alia**

Meaning: Among other things.

Example: Being a good person means, inter alia, helping those in need.

**Internecine**

Meaning: A conflict within a group or country that is destructive or harmful to all sides of the conflict.

Example: Internecine war for grandfather's inheritance; internecine conflicts in the company.

**Intrusive**

Meaning: Causing annoyance; too easy to notice.

Example: Intrusive lights; intrusive adware; intrusive questions.

**Irascible**

Meaning: Easily angered.

Example: An irascible temper; irascible man.

**Irk**

Meaning: To annoy or disturb someone.

Example: I was irked by her childlike behavior.

**Irreproachable**

Meaning: Too good; beyond criticism; having no fault.

Example: Her son's behavior was irreproachable.

**Itinerant**

Meaning: Traveling or moving from place to place.

Example: An itinerant musician; itinerant journalist; itinerant circus.

### **Jazz up**

Meaning: To make more interesting; breathe a new life into.

Example: We need to jazz up the interior of your bedroom.

### **Jeopardize**

Meaning: To put in danger or risk.

Example: This decision will jeopardize his career; our mistake could jeopardize the negotiations.

### **Jittery**

Meaning: Nervous; can't relax.

Example: She felt very jittery before the final exam.

### **Keepsake**

Meaning: A small gift given to you by someone so that you will not forget them.

Example: She gave me her necklace as a keepsake before going away.

### **Lackluster**

Meaning: Lacking excitement, energy, or interest.

Example: Lackluster performance; lackluster response; lackluster interview.

### **Lament**

Meaning: To express your sadness or regret.

Example: Dan lamented over the loss of his wife.

### **Leave no stone unturned**

Meaning: To do everything you can to find something.

Example: Rita left no stone unturned in her search for her missing brother.

### **Leery of**

Meaning: Suspicious; wary; avoiding something or someone.

Example: She was leery of strangers; I'm leery of their proposal.

### **Level-headed**

Meaning: Calm and reasonable even in difficult situations.

Example: Level-headed leader; level-headed approach; level-headed investor; level-headed remark.

### **Lukewarm**

Meaning: Slightly warm; not showing much enthusiasm.

Example: Lukewarm water; lukewarm coffee; lukewarm review; lukewarm support; lukewarm response.

### **Madcap**

Meaning: Crazy; reckless; eccentric; foolish; not caring about the danger.

Example: Madcap lifestyle; madcap party; madcap ideas.

### **Malodorous**

Meaning: Smelling extremely unpleasant.

Example: Malodorous garbage bags.

### **Malevolent**

Meaning: Having or showing a great desire to harm others.

Example: Malevolent smile; malevolent thoughts; malevolent stare; malevolent intentions.

### **Malformed**

Meaning: Abnormally or badly formed.

Example: Malformed body; malformed heart; malformed data.

### **Malleable**

Meaning: Easily changes shape; easily influenced or controlled.

Example: Malleable iron; malleable kids; malleable followers.

### **Maudlin**

Meaning: Tearfully sentimental, mostly because of drinking a lot of alcohol.

Example: John gets very maudlin after a few beers.

### **Menacing**

Meaning: Can harm you; dangerous-seeming; threatening.

Example: Menacing message; menacing look; menacing behavior.

### **Mischievous**

Meaning: Likes to have fun by causing trouble.

Example: Mischievous kids; mischievous dogs or cats.

### **Mortifying**

Meaning: Extremely embarrassing; shameful.

Example: A mortifying performance at high school prom.

## **Muffle**

Meaning: To make a sound less loud or clear; to suppress something.

Example: Muffle the noise; muffle your anger.

## **Nebulous**

Meaning: Having no clear form; hard to see or understand; uncertain; vague.

Example: He gave me a very nebulous explanation; a nebulous shape; nebulous idea; nebulous concept.

## **Nefarious**

Meaning: Dishonest; criminal; immoral; evil.

Example: Nefarious activities; nefarious machinations; nefarious villain.

## **Neglect**

Meaning: To give not enough attention or care; fail to look after (something or someone).

Example: If you neglect this part, the whole project will be ruined; our house has been neglected for years; don't neglect your health.

## **Noxious**

Meaning: Extremely harmful or poisonous.

Example: Noxious gases; noxious fumes.

## **Offish**

Meaning: Unfriendly; distant in manner; uncommunicative.

Example: He was the most offish and unsociable person in our team.

## **Omission**

Meaning: Something that has not been included; left undone.

Example: The song was shortened by the omission of fourth verse.

## **Onerous**

Meaning: Something that is too difficult or unpleasant to do.

Example: Sara finds motherhood too onerous and therefore doesn't want to have children.

## **Opening gambit**

Meaning: The first move.

Example: An opening gambit in the conversation; this badass word is going to be my opening gambit.

## **Outlandish**

Meaning: Looking or sounding extremely strange or unfamiliar.

Example: Outlandish clothes; outlandish hairstyle; outlandish tales.

## **Overweening**

Meaning: Extremely self-confident or proud.

Example: Overweening celebrities; overweening ambitions; overweening behavior.

## **Painstaking**

Meaning: Involving a lot of effort or care; thoroughly.

Example: Assembling a mechanical watch is a very painstaking work; painstaking research; painstaking attention to detail.

**Palatable**

Meaning: Pleasant to taste.

Example: Palatable food; palatable wine.

**Palatial**

Meaning: Luxurious; deluxe; splendid; very impressive.

Example: A palatial mansion; palatial apartment.

**Pamper**

Meaning: To treat with extreme kindness or care; give someone everything they want.

Example: Grandparents often pamper the kids.

**Panic-stricken**

Meaning: Overwhelmed with panic.

Example: After the fire alarm went off, a panic-stricken crowd rushed to the exit.

**Pave the way**

Meaning: To make it easier for.

Example: This information will pave the way for a cure for this disease.

**Peculiar**

Meaning: Very unusual or strange.

Example: Our dog was peculiarly quiet; he has a very peculiar sense of humor.

**Peevish**



Meaning: Easily irritated or annoyed.

Example: Lack of sleep makes me very peevish; a peevish old man.

### **Perilous**

Meaning: Extremely dangerous or risky.

Example: Perilous ride, perilous journey, perilous expedition.

### **Perturbed**

Meaning: Concerned or worried.

Example: Dan is very perturbed about his wife's health.

### **Petulant**

Meaning: Capricious; complaining like a child; bad-tempered.

Example: Dan acted like a petulant child and slammed the door in my face.

### **Placid**

Meaning: Very calm and peaceful; rarely shows excitement or anger.

Example: Placid river; placid child; placid face.

### **Pony up**

Meaning: To pay for something.

Example: I can't afford to pony up for this laptop.

### **Priggish**

Meaning: Acting like a snob; self-righteous.

Example: Priggish monarchs; priggish loyalists.

**Puckish**

Meaning: Playful; likes to have fun and joke with people.

Example: Puckish sense of humor; puckish smile; puckish person.

**Putrid**

Meaning: Rotten; smelling very bad; extremely unpleasant.

Example: Putrid meat; putrid smell; the jacket is a putrid brown color.

**Puzzled**

Meaning: Very confused because you can't understand something.

Example: The math task just puzzled me; he looked very puzzled.

**Quaint**

Meaning: Attractively unusual; extraordinary; strange; old-fashioned.

Example: Quaint small village; quaint phrase; quaint idea.

**Quarrelsome**

Meaning: Often argues with others.

Example: A quarrelsome old man; quarrelsome schoolboy.

**Rambunctious**

Meaning: Full of energy and noisy.

Example: Rambunctious puppies; rambunctious kids.

**Rebuke**

Meaning: Talking rudely to someone because they did something wrong.

Example: Ron received a stern rebuke from his boss.

**Recalcitrant**

Meaning: Unwilling to obey orders; uncontrolled.

Example: Cats are very recalcitrant animals.

**Reminiscent**

Meaning: Making you remember something.

Example: That movie is reminiscent of my childhood; the decor was reminiscent of the Gothic style.

**Reproachful**

Meaning: Expressing disapproval or criticism.

Example: Noah gave me a reproachful look.

**Rule out**

Meaning: To stop considering something; exclude.

Example: My boss has ruled out the possibility of my career advancement.

**Rummage**

Meaning: Carelessly move objects around in search of something.

Example: He rummaged through the closet for a white shirt; she rummaged in her pocket for the money.

**Scoot over**

Meaning: Move to a different position.

Example: Could you scoot over a little bit? I would like to sit here.

**Scowl**

Meaning: To look at someone/something with irritation or anger.

Example: Nate looked at me with a scowl on his face.

### **Shivering**

Meaning: Trembling from cold or fear.

Example: Rita stood shivering in the cold air.

### **Shoddy**

Meaning: Badly made or done.

Example: Shoddy service; shoddy goods; shoddy work; shoddy performance.

### **Slacker**

Meaning: Lazy; tries to avoid working.

Example: He's such a slacker, can't even clean the house.

### **Snooty**

Meaning: Acting like you are better or more important than others.

Example: He's too snooty to hang out with his old friends; after winning the math Olympiad, she became so snooty.

### **Soggy**

Meaning: Wet and soft.

Example: The ground was very soggy from the rain.

### **Sojourn**

Meaning: A temporary stay.

Example: My sojourn in Paris.

**Solicitous**

Meaning: Showing great care or concern.

Example: Mary was so solicitous of her cats.

**Somber**

Meaning: Gloomy, serious, or sad.

Example: Somber faces; somber mood; somber occasion.

**Sporadically**

Meaning: Occasionally; not regular.

Example: Visit parents sporadically; he only works sporadically; I went to college only sporadically.

**Stipulate**

Meaning: Clarify your requirements; to say what is or is not allowed; state clearly how something should be done.

Example: Our rules stipulate that worker must be sober.

**Stuffy**

Meaning: Lacking fresh air; too boring or formal.

Example: In summer it gets too stuffy here; stuffy room; stuffy rules; stuffy formalities; stuffy atmosphere.

**Sullen**

Meaning: Gloomy; sad; unwilling to smile.

Example: Sullen crowd; sullen teenagers; sullen silence.

**Swagger**

Meaning: Walking or behaving too proudly or confidently.

Example: Don't swagger just because you won a bet.

**Tally up**

Meaning: To calculate the sum of something.

Example: Tally up the score; tally up the votes.

**Tangible**

Meaning: Perceptible by touch; easily seen or recognized.

Example: Tangible assets; tangible benefits; tangible evidence; tangible results.

**Tawdry**

Meaning: Cheap; showing a lack of taste; of bad quality; highly unpleasant.

Example: Tawdry jewelry; tawdry home decor; tawdry affair.

**Tempestuous**

Meaning: Full of strong or intense emotions; turbulent; very stormy.

Example: Tempestuous relationship; tempestuous love; tempestuous sea; tempestuous wind.

**Thumping**

Meaning: Impressively large; very important.

Example: A thumping majority; thumping victory; thumping loss.

**Torrid**

Meaning: Extremely hot; very passionate.

Example: Torrid summer; torrid love affair.

### **Treacherous**

Meaning: Likely to betray trust; traitorous; extremely dangerous.

Example: Because of her treacherous actions, we are no longer best friends; a treacherous path.

### **Tremendous**

Meaning: Great in size or amount.

Example: Tremendous number of people; tremendous difference; tremendous changes.

### **Turbid**

Meaning: Not clear; muddy; cloudy; opaque.

Example: Turbid water; turbid material.

### **Unbosom**

Meaning: To reveal one's secrets; to disclose one's feelings.

Example: Dan unbosomed his fear of dogs to me.

### **Under a cloud**

Meaning: Be under suspicion.

Example: The victim's neighbor is under a cloud; our mayor left the position under a cloud after the harassment scandal.

### **Unfathomable**

Meaning: Incapable of being fully understood or explained.

Example: For some unfathomable reason, she decided not to go to college.

## **Unpalatable**

Meaning: Highly unpleasant; difficult to accept.

Example: Unpalatable truth; unpalatable fact; unpalatable proposal.

## **Unpretentious**

Meaning: Sincere; simple in appearance; modest; not attempting to impress others.

Example: Unpretentious food; unpretentious house; unpretentious dress; unpretentious style.

## **Unriddle**

Meaning: To find an answer; to solve.

Example: I unriddled the main mystery of the movie.

## **Unruly**

Meaning: Extremely difficult to control or manage.

Example: Unruly kids; unruly behavior; unruly hair; unruly emotions.

## **Unsullied**

Meaning: Not harmed or damaged; clear.

Example: Unsullied reputation; unsullied person; unsullied and shining floor.

## **Untrodden**

Meaning: Not having been walked on.

Example: Untrodden road; untrodden path; untrodden snow.



**Uproarious**

Meaning: Very noisy or funny.

Example: Uproarious party; uproarious laughter.

**Vanquished**

Meaning: Defeated; beaten.

Example: I was vanquished in a chess battle.

**Variegated**

Meaning: Showing different colors; including a wide range of something.

Example: Variegated leaves; variegated dialects.

**Vastly**

Meaning: Very much; immensely.

Example: Vastly different; vastly more experienced; vastly more significant.

**Verve**

Meaning: Great enthusiasm or energy.

Example: Verve for life; she composed it with great verve.

**Vexing**

Meaning: Very annoying or disturbing.

Example: Vexing questions about why I still don't have a boyfriend.

**Vile**

Meaning: Highly unpleasant; immoral.

Example: Vile comments; vile smell; vile slums.

**Vivacious**

Meaning: Lively, happy, and attractive.

Example: She's so charming and vivacious; vivacious laugh; vivacious manners.

**Waspish**

Meaning: Easily expresses anger, harshness or irritation.

Example: A waspish tongue; waspish sense of humor; waspish comments.

**Wayward**

Meaning: Behave selfishly; difficult to control; unpredictable; not organized.

Example: A wayward teenager; wayward thoughts; wayward emotions.

**Wheedling**

Meaning: Using flattery to persuade someone to do something.

Example: Stop wheedling me, I won't sign this contract; our son tried to wheedle us into buying him new phone.

**Whimsical**

Meaning: Unusual but funny; strange in a good way; playful; not serious in a funny way.

Example: This movie about aliens is pretty whimsical; whimsical sense of humor; whimsical fashion; whimsical mind.

**Willfully**

Meaning: Intentionally; deliberately.

Example: She willfully ignores the rules; the principles of our company were willfully ignored.

### **Wispy**

Meaning: Very thin and light; not thick.

Example: Wispy hair; wispy paper; wispy moustache; wispy clouds.

### **Wizened**

Meaning: Very old with many wrinkles on the skin.

Example: A wizened old man.

### **Worldly-wise**

Meaning: Having a lot of life experience and therefore able to cope with various difficulties and situations.

Example: She is too worldly-wise for such a young age; being more worldly-wise than me, my father told me how to solve my problem.

### **Woozy**

Meaning: Slightly weak; can't think clearly; not very steady.

Example: I was still woozy from the wine.

### **Wretched**

Meaning: Miserable or unhappy; of low quality; in very bad condition.

Example: I felt so wretched after she broke up with me; wretched performance; wretchedly poor; wretched old clothes.

### **Yammer**

Meaning: To talk continuously in a foolish or annoying way.

Example: John never stops yammering about his boss's love affairs.

**Zany**

Meaning: Weird or eccentric in a funny way.

Example: Zany movies; zany tricks; zany games; zany stories; zany humor.
