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#### Foreword

In learning a language, people reach a point where they are comfortable enough to start using word games, puns, double entendres, and even idioms in joking. Such word games are often used in short puzzles called *riddles*. Riddles are a luxury in any language, as they are used solely to entertain and engage one's listeners. For this reason, they fall outside the flow of normal conversation. Instead, they stand as independent, humorous bits of banter. One interesting feature of riddles is that they appeal to all age groups, from the wise-and-experienced to the very young.

Riddles go back to ancient times. Originally, they were posed to generate introspection and to teach lessons. They were used as part of sacred rituals, prophecies, and even matters of life and death. One of the most ancient riddles that has come down to us is the riddle of the Sphinx. The Sphinx, a mythological creature, stood guard over the gates of the city of Thebes and asked the following riddle of all who passed: "What walks on four legs in the morning, two legs at noon, and three legs at night?" Those who could not answer the riddle were killed. One day, a man named Oedipus solved the riddle and destroyed the Sphinx. He correctly interpreted "the morning" as infancy, when we crawl on our hands and knees. "Noon" represents the period of life when we walk on two feet as adults. "Night" refers to our old age, when we must use canes to walk.

Over the years, the nature of riddles has changed. Today in America, riddles are used to mislead, trick, and amuse. They have become a staple of American humor. As a linguistic puzzle, a riddle can be a test of one's cleverness or a way to challenge one's wits. Solving the riddle is as much a part of the fun as asking the riddle.

In 101 American English Riddles, the solutions and the humor to many of the riddles come from the language itself.

English in particular has many words with more than one meaning. Consequently, these words constitute a vast storehouse of material from which a riddle may originate; for example: "How can a leopard change his spots?" Answer: "Move from place to place." The word spot can mean a "mark or stain," like the black spots on the coat of a leopard. It can also mean a "particular physical location."

101 American English Riddles include many types of language-based humor. The humor in some riddles lies in knowing the meaning of an idiomatic expression. Some riddles have words that sound alike, but have different spellings and, consequently, different meanings. Others are worded to focus your attention on a certain part of the question, all in an effort to confuse you. All of these riddles stimulate thought about language and are enjoyable learning tools for nonnative speakers of English.

However, not all riddles depend entirely on word play for their humor. In one of the most common types of riddle, the expected or logical solution turns out to be the wrong answer. For example, to the question "Why do surgeons wear masks during an operation?" one would expect an answer such as, "For sanitary purposes." However, the answer is, "So that if they make a mistake, no one will know who did it." The surprise ending of the riddle makes it funny.

101 American English Riddles has nine sections. Each section contains riddles that all rely on one type of language game or logic for their humor. The title of each section hints at the nature of the riddles to follow. Each riddle is accompanied by an illustration that exaggerates the humor of the riddle by focusing on its literal meaning or that hints at its solution.

Those riddles that contain particularly advanced language or grammar are followed by an explanatory note or dialogue that presents the language item in normal usage, exposing the student to natural American language samples. Many of the examples also contain contemporary expressions and idioms that will help to further develop the nonnative speaker's understanding of American English.

101 American English Riddles is a fun way to enjoy English and to learn it at the same time. Because of the quirky

humor and illustrations, native speakers of English can also laugh at the riddles, though many will already be familiar.

Take your time with these riddles. Look at the clues that point toward the solution, and see if you can arrive at the answer on your own. Here's one to start with:

In the beginning, I seem mysterious, but in the end I'm nothing serious. What am I?

## You Can't Have One Without the Other

These riddles contain compound words.
These are words that combine two or more words into a single unit. To solve the riddles, you have to distinguish the meanings of the compound words from the meanings of their separate parts.

#### 1 What is a doughnut?



#### Someone who is crazy about money.

A doughnut is a fried cake shaped like a ring. In slang, dough also means "money," and nut can mean "a crazy or eccentric person." If you are a nut for something, it means that you are extremely enthusiastic about it.

A: Richard, you're looking well. How about getting some coffee with me?

B: Coffee and doughnute sounds great! So, what have you been up to lately? I haven't seen you for awhile.

A: Actually, I've been working around the clock in my new business.

B: Oh, you're after the big bucks, huh? I never thought you'd be so dedicated to money! You're becoming a real "dough nut"!

A: Yeah, and a health nut, too. I don't eat doughnuts anymore—they have too much fat!

### What kind of pool can't you swim in?



#### A car pool.

A pool is a small body of water. It can also refer to a common supply of something, such as money, that can be used by a number of people. For example, when people drive together in the same can to save gas and money, it's called a car pool.

John and Brittany, along with several of their school friends, were invited for a swim at the Garcias' pool. The Garcias' house was far away and the kids wanted to drive together to save gas. They went in two car pools and spent the whole afternoon swimming.

### How do you make an eggroll?



Push it.

An effroil is a Chinese food made of dough wrapped around vegotables, egg, herbs, and spices. Of course, an eff is also a food itself. To roll is to move something by turning it round and round.

To see the butterfly.



### 6 What room can you bounce around in?




A ballroom.

### What helps you keep your teeth together?




#### Toothpaste.

### 8 How do you make a lemon drop?




#### Hold it and then let it go.

### 10 What is a drill team?




#### A group of dentists who work together.

Drill teams often perform in parades. In this context, drill means "to practice over and over." A drill is also the tool a dentist uses to make holes in teeth.

**Air brakes** are the brakes on large vehicles. They use air pressure for their power.



A: Look up ahead! There's a fork in the river. Which direction should we take?


B: Stay to the right. That's the side that leads down to the mouth of the river. We'll be there in about two more hours.


## What has two hands and a face, but no arms or legs?

#### Your temperature.



# What doesn't ask questions, but needs to be answered?




#### The telephone.


### What comes down, but never goes up?

### 19 What has ears, but can't hear?




Corn.

#### A comb.





**Cool** has two meanings. It can mean "somewhat cold." In everyday speech, **cool** can also mean "wonderful, exciting, great."


A: Wow! What a great song!


A: I've got a splitting headache! My temples have been hurting all day.

### A cake of soap.


A cake is a baked sweet made from flour, eggs, and other ingredients. A bar of soap can also be referred to as a cake of soap.

To charge means "to rush at someone or something to attack it." To charge something also means to pay for an item by using a credit card.


A: I heard you went on a safari. How did it go?

### How many feet are there in a yard?




### It depends on how many people are standing in it.

It wasn't raining.


How come is a very informal way of asking "why?"

When many Americans read this riddle, they might first think of a famous saying, "Slow and steady wins the race," which is often true. However, the answer to the riddle is always true.


A: Coach, what do you think I should do if I want to win the race this Saturday?

### What has no beginning and no end?




A circle.

### Why did the chicken cross the road?



#### To get to the other side.

This is probably the most famous American riddle of all time. It's particularly popular with five-year-olds who've just discovered riddles.

B: I don't know. Maybe a wolf or some other animal is chasing them.

A: There aren't any wolves around here. The answer may be simpler than that. Maybe they just want to get to the other side of the road!

### Why do lions eat raw meat?




#### Because they can't cook.

Raw means "not cooked." Many Americans do not like meat or fish that is not cooked all the way through, and many are vegetarians because they don't like the idea of eating meat.

Jump off the bottom rung.


A fifty-foot ladder would be more than 15 meters high, but the first **rung**, or step, is only about one foot off the ground.

# What kind of bushes do rabbits in California sit under when it rains?




Wet ones.

## What time is it when the clock strikes thirteen?



#### Time to get a new clock.

Americans almost never use the 24-hour clock, except in the military. Americans sometimes seem obsessed with exercise and losing weight. There are many ways to lose weight. One is exercise, but another is to limit what you eat.




A: Did you see the paper this morning? The Smiths' house completely burned down yesterday.







A **dump** is the place where garbage is taken after it is collected from the houses. When people are **down in the dumps**, it means that they are sad and depressed.


A: Where's your smile, Fred? You look so down in the dumps!

When he is short of money.


Six feet = 1.83 meters. The expression to be short of means "to not have enough of something."

## 88 Why did the teenager put sugar under her pillow?




#### She wanted to have sweet dreams.
