



#### Talk together

Ask the child to

- Point to each letter pattern in the box on the back cover and say the sound that it makes in words. Tell the child that each of these letter patterns can make the same sound.
- Look out for these letter patterns in the story and try and remember the sounds they make.

### Reading the story

Remember, children learn best when reading is relaxed and enjoyable, so give lots of praise.

- Encourage the child to try to read any words they do not recognise by saying the sounds of each letter pattern separately (e.g. J a ck), then running the sounds together quickly. If they find it difficult to say the sounds, say the word for them first, then see if they can hear the sounds in the word.
- Explain that it is important when running the sounds in a word together to check to see if it sounds like a real word as some words are less regular (e.g. coming). Read these words to the child if they do not recognise them. Point out the letters that make the usual sound in each word (e.g. the c in coming). This will help your child to remember these words.



Mum: Look at that cute little ribbon.




## Jack: It's not a ribbon. It's a river!

Dad: Look at those cute little stamps!




Jack: They are not stamps. They are big

Dad: No, you can't.




Jack: Now, this is the zoo.


Midge: Look at that cute little kitten!

Dad: I don't know. Let's ask Jack.




Mum: Where is Jack?

Jack: Let me out!


Mum: It's coming from your pocket,

#### Ask the child

Why do the giants think some things are cute and little?

#### Check phonics (letter-pattern sounds)

#### Ask the child to

- Read what Jack says on page 4. Find two words which contain the letter pattern ea (please, tread).
- Say what sound the letter pattern ea makes in each word.
- Read what Jack says on pages 5 and 7. Find two words which contain the letter pattern ow (follow, town).
- Say what sound the letter pattern makes in each word. Stress that the same letter pattern can make different sounds in words.
- Look on pages 4, 5 and 6. Find some words which contain a j sound (Jack, Midge, giants, village).
- Point to the letter pattern that makes the j sound in the words.
