## The Color Red

Skill: Recognizing the color red
Directions: Point to the apple. Explain to your child that the apple is red. Have your child point to all of the red objects on the page.

Point to the red objects.


## Strawberries Are Red!

Skill: Identifying the color red
Directions: Give your child several crayons of different colors. Ask your child to choose the red crayon. Encourage your child to color the strawberries red.

Choose the red crayon. Color the strawberries.


## The Color Orange

Skill: Recognizing the color orange
Directions: Point to the pumpkin. Explain to your child that the pumpkin is orange. Have your child circle all of the orange objects on the page.

Circle the orange objects.


## Orange, Orange

Skill: Identifying the color orange
Directions: Give your child several crayons of different colors. Ask your child to choose the orange crayon. Explain to your child that orange is the name of a color and the name of a fruit. Encourage your child to draw a picture of an orange in the frame below.

Choose the orange crayon. Draw an orange.


## The Color Yellow

Skill: Recognizing the color yellow
Directions: Point to the sun. Explain to your child that the sun is yellow. Have your child draw a line from each yellow object on the page to the sun.

Draw a line to the sun.


## Sun Collage

Skill: Identifying the color yellow
Directions: Give your child several crayons of different colors. Ask your child to choose the yellow crayon. Encourage your child to color the sun yellow. Then, have your child rip a sheet of yellow paper into tiny pieces. Help your child paste the pieces to the sun.

Choose the yellow crayon. Color the sun. Rip the paper. Paste the pieces.


## The Color Green

Skill: Recognizing the color green
Directions: Point to the frog. Explain to your child that the frog is green. Have your child draw an $\mathbf{X}$ on the green objects on the page.

## Turtles Are Green

Skill: Identifying the color green
Directions: Give your child several crayons of different colors. Ask your child to choose the green crayon. Encourage your child to color the turtles' shells green.

Choose the green crayon. Color the turtles.


## The Color Blue

Skill: Recognizing the color blue
Directions: Point to the butterfly. Explain to your child that the butterfly is blue. Have your child draw a line under each blue object on the page.

Draw a line under each blue object.


## Blue Eggs

Skill: Identifying the color blue
Directions: Give your child several crayons of different colors. Ask your child to choose the blue crayon. Encourage your child to draw blue eggs in the bird's nest below.

Choose the blue crayon. Draw blue eggs.

## Color Review: Red, Orange, Yellow, Green, Blue

Skill: Recognizing the colors red, orange, yellow, green, and blue
Directions: Say, "I spy" and the name of a color aloud to your child. Ask your child to point to the object of that color. Continue saying the colors aloud until your child has pointed to each object correctly.

## Color Review: Radiant Rainbow

Skill: Identifying colors red, orange, yellow, green, and blue
Directions: Give your child crayons of different colors. Have your child color the rainbow the correct colors.

Color the rainbow.


## The Color Purple

Skill: Recognizing the color purple
Directions: Point to the grapes. Explain to your child that the grapes are purple. Have your child point to all of the purple objects on the page.

Point to the purple objects.


## Paint the Petals

Skill: Identifying the color purple
Directions: You will need finger paint or water-based paint for this activity. Ask your child to choose the purple paint container from the group. Have your child use his or her thumb to make thumbprint petals on the flowers below. (You can have your child practice on a sheet of scrap paper first.) Let the paint dry completely.

Choose the purple paint. Use your thumb to make flower petals.


## The Color Pink

Skill: Recognizing the color pink
Directions: Point to the flamingo. Explain to your child that the flamingo is pink. Have your child circle all of the pink objects on the page.

Circle the pink objects.


## Pink Piggy Bank

Skill: Identifying the color pink
Directions: Give your child several crayons of different colors. Ask your child to choose the pink crayon. Encourage your child to color the piggy bank pink. Then, help your child paste pennies to the piggy bank. Let the glue dry completely. (Safety Tip: Never leave your child alone with small objects.)

Choose the pink crayon. Color the piggy bank. Paste the pennies.


## The Color Gray

Skill: Recognizing the color gray
Directions: Point to the elephant. Explain to your child that the elephant is gray. Have your child draw a line from each gray object on the page to the elephant.

Draw a line to the elephant.


## Gray Rain Clouds

Skill: Identifying the color gray
Directions: Give your child several crayons of different colors. Ask your child to choose the gray crayon. Have your child color the clouds gray. Encourage your child to draw raindrops beneath the clouds.

Choose the gray crayon. Color the rain clouds. Draw raindrops.


## The Color Brown

Skill: Recognizing the color brown
Directions: Point to the dog. Explain to your child that the dog is brown. Have your child draw an $\mathbf{X}$ on the brown objects on the page.

Draw an $\mathbf{X}$ on the brown objects.


## Brown Bear, Brown Bear

Skill: Identifying the color brown
Directions: Give your child several crayons of different colors. Ask your child to choose the brown crayon. Have your child color the bear. Then, have your child rip a brown paper bag into tiny pieces. Help your child paste the pieces of paper to the bear to make fur.

Choose the brown crayon. Color the bear. Rip the paper. Paste the pieces.


## The Color Black

Skill: Recognizing the color black
Directions: Point to the spider. Explain to your child that the spider is black. Have your child draw a line under each black object on the page.

Draw a line under each black object.


## Missing Stripes

Skill: Identifying the color black
Directions: Give your child several crayons of different colors. Ask your child to choose the black crayon. Have your child draw black stripes on the zebra.

Choose the black crayon. Draw stripes on the zebra.


## The Color Whitie

Skill: Recognizing the color whifie
Directions: Point to the rabbit. Explain to your child that the rabbit is waifie. Have your child point to all of the white objects on the page.

Point to the whife objects.


## Sparkly Snowflake

Skill: Identifying the color white
Directions: Help your child trace over the snowflake with glue. Have your child sprinkle sugar or salt over the glue. Let the glue dry completely.

Trace the snowflake with glue. Sprinkle sugar on the glue.


# Color Review: Purple, Pink, Gray, Brown, Black, Whaife 

Skill: Recognizing colors purple, pink, gray, brown, black, and whife
Directions: Say the name of a color aloud to your child. Ask your child to circle the object of that color with a matching-colored crayon. Continue saying the colors aloud until your child has circled each object correctly.

Circle the objects.


## Color Activity: Yummy Jellybeans

Skill: Identifying colors purple, pink, gray, brown, black, and whife
Directions: Give your child crayons of different colors. Have your child color the jellybeans the correct colors.

Color the jellybeans.


## Color Activity: Crayon Color Match

Skills: Recognizing and matching colors
Directions: Point to each crayon. Have your child say the name of the crayon color aloud. Ask your child to draw a line from each crayon to the object of the same color.

## Color Activity: Paste the Pictures

Skill: Identifying colors
Directions: Look through several old magazines with your child. Say the name of a color aloud. Have your child look for an object of that color. Help your child rip out the picture and paste it below.

Skill: Identifying colors
Directions: Give your child crayons of different colors. Have your child color the clown the correct colors.

Directions: Explain to your child that the cookie is a circle. Encourage your child to trace the outline of the cookie with his or her finger. Then, have your child trace the outline of the cookie with a crayon.

Skill: Recognizing a square
Directions: Point to the square. Explain to your child that this is a square. Have your child circle all of the squares on the page.

## Skill: Drawing a square

Directions: Explain to your child that the present is a square. Encourage your child to trace the outline of the present with his or her finger. Then, have your child trace the outline of the present with a crayon. Ask your child to draw a bow on top of the present.

## Triangle

Skill: Recognizing a triangle
Directions: Point to the triangle. Explain to your child that this is a triangle. Have your child draw a line from each triangle-shaped object on the page to the triangle.

## Skill: Tracing a triangle

Directions: Explain to your child that the piece of cheese is a triangle. Encourage your child to trace the outline of the cheese with his or her finger. Then, help your child trace the outline of the cheese with glue. Give your child three pieces of yarn. Have your child place the yarn on top of the glue to form a triangle. Let the glue dry completely.

Trace the cheese with your finger. Trace the cheese with glue. Place the pieces of yarn.


## Rectangle

Skill: Recognizing a rectangle
Directions: Point to the rectangle. Explain to your child that this is a rectangle. Have your child draw an $\mathbf{X}$ on each rectangle on the page.

## Skill: Drawing a rectangle

Directions: Explain to your child that the picture frame is a rectangle. Encourage your child to trace the outline of the frame with his or her finger. Then, have your child trace the outline of the frame with a crayon. Ask your child to draw a picture inside of the frame.

## Shape Review:

## Circle, Square, Triangle, Rectangle

Skill: Recognizing circles, squares, triangles, and rectangles
Directions: Say the name of a shape aloud to your child. Ask your child to point to the shape. Continue saying the shapes aloud until your child has pointed to each shape correctly.

Point to the shapes.


## Shape Review: Match the Shapes

Skill: Recognizing and matching circles, squares, triangles, and rectangles
Directions: Point to each shape. Have your child say the name of the shape aloud. Ask your child to draw a line from each shape to the object of the same shape.

Draw a line to match the shapes.


## Oval

Skill: Recognizing an oval
Directions: Point to the oval. Explain to your child that this is an oval. Have your child draw a line under each oval on the page.

Draw a line under each oval.

## Skill: Drawing an oval

Directions: Explain to your child that the racetrack is an oval. Encourage your child to trace the outline of the racetrack with his or her finger. Then, have your child trace the outline of the racetrack with a crayon.

## Rhombus

Skill: Recognizing a rhombus
Directions: Point to the rhombus. Explain to your child that this is a rhombus. Tell your child it is also called a "diamond." Ask your child to place a button or coin on all of the rhombuses on the page. (Safety Tip: Never leave your child alone with small objects.)

Place a button on the rhombuses.

## Skill: Drawing a rhombus

Directions: Explain to your child that the baseball field is a rhombus. Encourage your child to trace the outline of the baseball field with his or her finger. Then, have your child trace the outline of the baseball field with a crayon.

## Star

Skill: Recognizing a star
Directions: Point to the star. Explain to your child that this is a star. Have your child circle all of the stars on the page.

## Skill: Tracing a star

Directions: Encourage your child to trace the outline of the star with his or her finger. Then, help your child trace the outline of the star with glue. Have your child sprinkle glitter over the glue. Let the glue dry completely.

## Heart

Skill: Recognizing a heart
Directions: Point to the heart. Explain to your child that this is a heart. Have your child draw an $\mathbf{X}$ on each heart on the page.

## Skill: Tracing a heart

Directions: Encourage your child to trace the outline of the heart with his or her finger. Then, help your child cover the heart with glue. Ask your child to paste cotton balls to the glue. Let the glue dry completely.

# Shape Review: Oval, Rhombus, Star, Heart 

Skill: Recognizing ovals, rhombuses, stars, and hearts
Directions: Say the name of a shape aloud to your child. Ask your child to place a button or coin on the shape. Continue saying the shapes aloud until your child has marked each shape correctly. (Safety Tip: Never leave your child alone with small objects.)

Place a button on the shapes.


## Shape Review: Match the Shapes

## Skill: Recognizing and matching ovals, rhombuses, stars, and hearts

Directions: Point to each shape. Have your child say the name of the shape aloud. Ask your child to draw a line from each shape to the object of the same shape.

Draw a line to match the shapes.


## Shape Activity: Cut and Paste

Skill: Identifying shapes
Directions: Give your child several sheets of scrap paper. Draw a shape on a sheet of paper. Have your child cut out the shape and paste it below. Have your child practice cutting out each of the shapes he or she has learned.

Cut out the shape. Paste the shape to the paper.


## Shape Activity: Complete the Shapes

Skill: Drawing shapes
Directions: Point to each box. Ask your child to guess which shape is in the box. Help your child draw the other half of the shape to complete it.

Draw the other half of the shape.

Skill: Recognizing colors and shapes
Directions: Look at the Color Key with your child. Explain to your child that he or she should color all of the circles black, the triangles green, the squares purple, and so on.

Skills: Drawing and coloring shapes
Directions: Say the name of a shape aloud to your child. Have your child draw that shape in the space below. Say the name of a color aloud to your child. Ask your child to color the shape this color.

## Colorful Caterpillar

Skill: Identifying and drawing shapes
Directions: Point to a shape on the caterpillar's body. Ask your child to identify the shape.
Encourage your child to trace the shape. Then, have your child color the caterpillar.
Say the name of the shape. Trace the shape. Color the caterpillar.

## Up, Up, and Away!

Skill: Identifying shapes and colors
Directions: Point to each balloon. Ask your child to identify the shape of the balloon. Then, have your child color the balloon the correct color.

Say the name of the shape. Color the balloon.


## Colors and Shapes Extension Activities

Use the following hands-on activities to enhance your child's fine motor development and to further teach your child colors and shapes. Keep in mind that the process, not the finished product, is what is important. Work beside your child and model the various color and shape activities for him or her.

## Squishy, Gooey Shapes

Place a sheet of plastic or a garbage bag on a flat surface. Cover the surface with shaving cream, pudding, finger paint, or even mud! Allow your child to use his or her finger to practice drawing shapes. Give your child the name of a shape and ask him or her to draw it. You can also use sand, salt, or sugar for this activity.

## Cookie Cutter Shapes

Give your child several cookie cutters of different shapes. Ask your child to identify the shape of each cookie cutter. Have your child trace around the cookie cutters on sheets of paper. Encourage your child to color the shapes.

## Bend-a-Shape

Give your child pieces of yarn of varying lengths. Have your child work at a flat surface. Encourage him or her to bend and move the yarn to make different shapes. You can also give your child cooled, cooked spaghetti noodles.

## Tactile Flash Cards

Cut out different shapes from sandpaper, felt, or other textured paper. Glue the shapes to small sheets of paper to create tactile flash cards. Give your child one card at a time and have him or her feel the shape and then say it aloud.

## Shape Scavenger Hunt

Go on a scavenger hunt with your child. Give your child the name of a shape. Ask your child to look around the house for an object that matches that shape. Continue until your child has found examples of each shape.

## Shape Pictures

Have your child work at a flat surface. Give your child multiple paper cutouts of different shapes. Encourage your child to move the shapes around to create different patterns and pictures. Demonstrate a pattern and ask your child to copy it.

## Colorful Candy

Give your child a bag of colorful candy pieces, such as jellybeans or gummy bears. Encourage your child to sort the candy into piles by color. You can also ask your child to arrange the candy into colorful patterns.

## Color Mini-Books

Make a color mini-book with your child. Encourage your child to make a book page for each color. Help your child write the color word at the top of the page. Then, have your child draw and color a picture of something that color. Once the book is complete, ask your child to "read" his or her color book to you.

## Thumbprint Rainbow

Give your child a large sheet of paper and finger paint or water-based paint of different colors. Encourage your child to use his or her thumb to make thumbprints on the paper. Help your child arrange the colored thumbprints to make a rainbow pattern.

## Color Finding Game

Play a color finding game with your child when traveling. Give your child the name of a color. Ask your child to try and identify what object of that color you are thinking of. Take turns playing the game with your child.

## Color Collage

Give your child a large sheet of blank paper and several old magazines. Ask your child to look through the magazines for objects of different colors. Have your child rip out the pictures and paste them to the paper. Encourage your child to overlap the pictures, so that the entire paper is covered with color.


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
