




He saw Pooh and Rabbit and Eeyore and Piglet and Roo. They were on the bridge.


"What are you doing?" asked Tigger.

"Yes," said Pooh.






Tigger bounced into the wood to get some sticks.

Eeyore won the next game, and the next game, and the game after that.






Tigger was now very cross.



He stamped his foot. "Let's play again," he said.




So they played again. And Eeyore won that game, too.





Tigger was now very, very cross. He threw down his sticks.




"Tiggers don't like Pooh Sticks!" he said.
