





Some of the most common mistakes in writing are using sentence fragments, run-on sentences, and comma splices.

A sentence fragment is the result of

- · a sentence missing either a subject or a verb.
- a sentence not expressing a complete idea.
- a dependent clause being used on its own without an independent clause.

Look at these sentence fragments and how they can be corrected.

Is a major problem.

✓ (missing a subject)

Water pollution is a major problem. ✓

Environmentalists work the effects of pollution. **✗** (doesn't express a complete idea) Environmentalists work **to decrease** the effects of pollution. **✓**

Because it affects the whole world.

✓ (missing an independent clause)

Pollution is a global problem because it affects the whole world. ✓

A **run-on sentence** has two or more independent clauses that are connected without a comma or a conjunction. Look at this sentence and how it can be corrected.

A **comma splice** has two or more independent clauses that are connected with a comma, but without a conjunction. Look at this sentence and how it can be corrected.

CONSUMER BEHAVIOR

A. Skill Presentation

A cause–effect essay explains the reasons why an event or situation happens (cause), or it gives the results of an event or situation (effect). There are certain connectors you can use to link your ideas in a cause–effect essay and make your writing coherent, or clear and smooth.

Some connectors that help show reasons or causes are *one reason is, another reason is, one cause is,* and *the most important cause is.* These words and phrases show connections between ideas in different sentences. Other connectors that show reasons are *because, because of, since,* and *due to.* These words can help link ideas within a sentence.

Read this paragraph from a cause–effect essay that gives reasons why people enjoy bargaining. Look at the **connectors** the writer has used to show cause.

Throughout the world, many people enjoy bargaining. **One reason is** that people feel successful when they pay a lower price. They feel a sense of accomplishment **since** they are able to achieve the goal of paying less than the ticketed price. **Another reason** many people enjoy bargaining is **because** they feel that they are saving money.

Connectors that help show results or effects in a cause–effect essay include as a result, for this reason, consequently, and therefore. Other connectors that show results include: so and so that.

The kind of writing that is typically done in school is called **academic writing**. It is different from the writing done outside of school in at least two ways. It is generally more formal and more impersonal.

One way to make writing more academic is to avoid contractions and abbreviations. For example, write *it is* and *do not* rather than *it's* and *don't*. Write out months and city names rather than using abbreviations.

Another simple way to make writing more academic is to avoid using informal expressions like *awesome*, *cash*, or *guys*. Instead, use more formal terms like *impressive*, *money*, or *individuals*.

Finally, avoid the pronoun you. Academic writing is impersonal, so the writing should not address the reader directly. For example, instead of writing you can contribute, use a general noun like people or a more specific noun like investors. Then use the pronoun they to refer back to these nouns.

Look at these examples.

INFORMAL: You can contribute cash to socially responsible businesses in NY You'll help protect these businesses by providing funding.

ACADEMIC: Investors can contribute money to socially responsible businesses in New York. They will help protect these businesses by providing funding.

Plagiarism is when you take another writer's words and present them as your own. Plagiarism is not acceptable, and students who plagiarize can face serious consequences. One effective technique to help avoid plagiarism is **paraphrasing**.

Paraphrasing allows you to incorporate another writer's ideas in your own writing. Here are some tips to help you paraphrase.

- Substitute synonyms for key words and phrases.
- Change the order of the words in a piece of writing you are paraphrasing.
- Do not include new information and do not leave out information.

ORIGINAL: Human body heat is an **inexpensive** and **renewable** energy source.

PARAPHRASE: One cheap and replaceable energy source is heat from the human body.

The original words *inexpensive* and *renewable* have been replaced by the synonyms *cheap* and *replaceable*. Note that the word order is also different in the paraphrase; however, the overall meaning of the original sentence has not changed. There is no new information, and no information is missing.

When you paraphrase, remember to include a citation, or details about where you found the ideas. Be sure to use the citation style approved by your teacher.



A good paragraph has a clear topic sentence, relevant supporting sentences, and a strong concluding sentence.

The **topic sentence** is usually the first sentence in the paragraph. It is about one idea (the main idea), but it is fairly broad so it can be expanded on in the rest of the paragraph. It helps the reader understand what the paragraph will be about, but it does not usually include specific examples or details.

Supporting sentences follow the topic sentence and support the main idea. They relate only to the topic of the paragraph. They can also give examples and explanations and may provide facts and details about the topic of the paragraph.

A **concluding sentence** ends a paragraph. It restates the main idea of the paragraph and gives the reader something to think about.

For example, read this paragraph about family size.

¹The size of an average family varies across countries. ²For example, in the United States, the average family size is 3.19. ³That means that there are, on average, about three people per family in the United States. ⁴It is possible that differences in family sizes from one country to another influence people's personalities.

The topic sentence (1) in the paragraph above is about family size across countries. The first supporting sentence (2) offers an example of the topic sentence, and the second supporting sentence (3) explains the example. The concluding sentence (4) restates the idea that family size varies depending on the country. In addition, it gives the reader something to think about by mentioning a possible effect of differing family sizes.



Parallel structure means using similar patterns when you write. It helps your sentences flow well, and it makes your writing clearer. Sentences that do not have parallel structure can sound awkward and may be incorrect.

Use parallel structure in lists of words (like nouns, verbs, or adjectives), in lists of phrases, and in lists of clauses. Use parallel structure in comparisons, as well.

Women tend to give similar compliments whether they are **American**, **Canadian**, or **British**. People give compliments **on appearance**, **on possessions**, **on ability**, or **on personality**. A person may tell someone **that her hair looks nice**, **that she drives a nice car**, or **that she is kind**. (same verb tenses in clauses)

Men do not **compliment each other** as often as **women compliment each other**. (same structure + same verb tenses)

When you write, check your sentences carefully to be sure they have parallel structure. Look for conjunctions like *and*, *or*, and *nor*. They can indicate a list, which needs to have parallel structure. Also look for comparison words like *as* or *than*. Make sure the structure of the things being compared is parallel.

When you write an academic essay, it is important to use appropriate sources. Appropriate sources are factual and accurate. Appropriate information will make your writing stronger.

Appropriate sources include reference books like dictionaries and encyclopedias, newspapers, academic journals, and books by experts in the field you are writing about. In addition, some magazine articles and articles on websites may also be appropriate.

Before you use any sources, always:

- check the date. Use sources that have been published as recently as possible.
- check the author. The author should be an expert in the field you are writing about (especially for Internet articles).
- check the writing for facts. Look for statistics, documented research, and quotations from other experts. Avoid writing that includes opinions unsupported with facts.
- · check the writing style. Avoid sources that contain a lot of grammar or spelling mistakes.

Student 1

Most families can make watching television work with their values. Not all TV shows fit with everyone's values. For example, some shows are extremely violent. Maria Brooks, movie reviewer in *What You Want to Know* magazine, says that many parents get upset when their children watch violent shows on TV. In her opinion, children will behave better if they avoid watching shows with unsuitable content. 

He recommends avoiding shows about topics that contradict the family's values. Dr. Larson, a psychologist at Peseco State University, suggests in a recent article in the journal *Family Now* that parents should watch TV with their children. They can then discuss the shows and answer their children's questions. Her research shows that a family discussion about TV shows helps children develop their moral sense.

Coherent writing is well organized and has ideas that fit together clearly and smoothly. Connectors can help make a piece of writing more coherent. In a comparison essay, when the writer compares two or more things, connectors can show how they are alike or how they are different.

Some connectors that show how things are alike are *one similarity, another similarity, similarly,* and *likewise*. These words and phrases show similarities between ideas in different sentences. Other useful connectors to show similarities include *similar to, the same as, like, both,* and *also.* These words help link ideas within a sentence.



Repeating key ideas in a paragraph helps make the sentences flow together smoothly, but repeating the same key words will make your writing repetitive. There are a number of ways to avoid this.

One technique is to replace key words with synonyms or to use pronouns to refer to them. Look at this paragraph about group interviews. **Key words** are repeated too often.

When conducting group interviews, the **interviewers** at Harrison Global Web Design have a clear **objective**. The **interviewers** give a group of candidates a **task**, but the **task** is not completely clear. In addition, there is a time limit. The **objective** is to see how well the candidates work together under pressure.

Now look at the revised paragraph with synonyms and pronouns replacing some of the key words.

When conducting group interviews, the **interviewers** at Harrison Global Web Design have a clear **objective**. **They** give a group of candidates a **task**, but **it** is not completely clear. Academic writing should be concise – expressing only what needs to be said without using unnecessary words. Therefore, it is important to avoid **wordiness** and **redundancy**. Wordiness is the inclusion of unnecessary words. Redundancy is saying the same thing more than once. Unnecessary and redundant words should be removed.

Look at this example:

Mr. Tanaka **searched for and** found some **extremely** interesting information about personality tests on the **online** website. **X**

In this sentence, the phrase *searched for* is unnecessary. It is only important to know that Mr. Tanaka *found* this information. The word *extremely* is an intensifier – it doesn't add important information. The word *online* is redundant – all websites are online. Look at the revised sentence where these words have been deleted. It is now much more concise and has a clear, academic tone.

Mr. Tanaka found some interesting information about personality tests on the website. ✓

To avoid wordiness and redundancy in groups of sentences, sentences can sometimes be combined and revised to remove unnecessary information.

It is important to acknowledge **opposing opinions** – opinions that are different from your own – because it shows that you have researched the topic thoroughly and considered other points of view. It is also important to include a **refutation** – a response to the opposing opinion. It brings readers back to and strengthens your original opinion.

The writer finishes by including a refutation that refers back to the opposing opinion. The refutation acknowledges that hypochondria does occasionally take up a doctor's time, but it strengthens the opinion by arguing that hypochondria is a real disease.

In academic writing, it is important to avoid choppy sentences and stringy sentences.

Choppy sentences are short, simple sentences. In certain situations they can be effective, for example, when you want to grab your reader's attention and make a strong statement. However, a paragraph with too many choppy sentences can often be difficult to read. The sentences do not flow together well because nothing makes one sentence relate to the next. To improve choppy sentences, you can use **connectors**, such as *and*, *but*, *so*, *because*, and *however* to make compound or complex sentences. Look at this paragraph and how the writer improved it.

Stringy sentences have too many clauses joined by connectors. They are often difficult to read because readers have to hold so much information in their minds at one time. 

An **overgeneralization** is a statement that is too broad or too general or a conclusion based on only a few examples. Overgeneralizations are imprecise, and often they are inaccurate. They frequently contain words such as *all* and *everybody*.

People believe that listening to music causes children to behave aggressively.

The statement is not accurate because it gives the reader the impression that *all* people believe that *all* music causes *all* children to behave aggressively. Now look at the words one writer added to correct the overgeneralization and make the sentence more precise.

Many people believe that listening to music **with violent lyrics** causes **some** children to behave aggressively.

Words such as *many*, *some*, and *often* can help correct overgeneralization. Supporting your ideas with plenty of details and examples and including facts from outside sources will also help you avoid overgeneralizations in your writing.



The best way to convince readers to agree with your ideas is to be as objective and impersonal as possible. In order to ensure this, you should avoid emotionally charged language.

One way to avoid charged language is to use neutral words. For example, instead of *wrong*, *stupid*, or *the best*, use words like *questionable*, *misquided*, or *important*.

His ideas seemed stupid at times. ✗
His ideas seemed misguided at times. ✓

Another way to avoid emotionally charged language is to provide clear examples to support your ideas and opinions. Look at these sentences. The writer has used neutral language and given an **example** to support his **opinion**.

^OHis ideas seemed misguided at times. For example, ^Ehe felt people were not working hard unless they were doing more than one thing at the same time. ^CAlthough multitasking may be one indication that people are working busily, it is often an inefficient way to accomplish tasks.

A third way to avoid emotionally charged language is to show that you agree with part of the opposing opinion. This lets your reader know that you have carefully considered other points of view before arriving at your own conclusion. For example, it is clear from the last sentence that the writer has considered an aspect of the opposing argument to be true but disagrees with the argument as a whole.



A. Skill Presentation

The goal of many types of essays is to make a **strong argument** and convince the reader to agree with your point of view. There are many ways to make a strong argument.

First, write a strong thesis statement that clearly expresses the main point of the essay and conveys your opinion about the issue. Make sure you have chosen an issue that people could have different opinions about. In addition, the thesis statement should not be too general; otherwise, it will be difficult to provide appropriate support.

Colleges and universities should block students' access to social networking sites because they waste students' valuable study time, and they are a distraction during class.

Another technique for making a strong argument is to include facts that are closely related to the essay topic and clearly support your thesis statement. Quotations will help make your argument stronger when they provide evidence that supports your opinions. Remember to tell the reader where the quotation comes from by including a reporting phrase, such as *According to*, followed by the exact words from the original text inside of quotation marks. Alternatively, use your own words to paraphrase ideas from the original source. Again, you must include a citation, but quotation marks are not needed. These techniques will help avoid plagiarism.

abbreviation: a shortened form of a word or phrase

academic writing: a kind of writing that is done in school; it usually includes more formal language than other kinds of writing (e.g., personal communication) and is impersonal (See Skill 3.)

adjective: a word such as *hungry*, *sweet*, or *good* that describes a noun

appropriate source: a source that contains factual and accurate informatio n; for example, a reference book, a newspaper, an academic journal, or a book written by an expert (See Skill 7.)

argument: the expression of an opinion supported by facts and examples; the purpose of an argument is to persuade the reader that the opinion is correct (See Skill 14.)

cause-effect essay: an essay that explains the reasons why an event or situation happens, or that gives the results of an event or situation (See Skill 2.)

charged language: strong language that elicits an emotional response; it may include words such as *hate*, wrong, stupid, or the best (See Skill 19.)

choppy sentence: a short, simple sentence (See Skill 16.)

citation: detailed information about an outside source of information used in a piece of writing; citations are necessary for quotations and paraphrases (See Skill 4.)

clause: a group of words that includes a subject and a verb

coherence: the clear organization of sentences in a piece of writing; putting sentences in logical order and using transition words and phrases are ways to create coherence (See Skill 2.)

comma: a punctuation mark (,) used, for example, to separate certain clauses in a sentence or to separate three or more items in a list

comma splice: two or more independent clauses connected only by a comma; it does not include a conjunction; this structure is considered incorrect and should be avoided (See Skill 1.)

comparison essay: an essay that compares two or more things; it shows how they are alike and/or how they are different (See Skill 8.)

complex sentence: a sentence with an independent clause and a dependent clause joined by a subordinating conjunction such as *after*, *because*, *if*, or *when*

compound sentence: a sentence with two independent clauses joined by a comma and a coordinating conjunction such as *and*, *or*, *but*, or *so*

concise: expressing only what needs to be said without using unnecessary words (See Skill 12.)

concluding sentence: a sentence that can restate the main idea in a paragraph, offer a suggestion, or make a prediction about the topic; it is often the last sentence in a paragraph (See Skill 5.)

conjunction: a word such as *and*, *or*, *but*, or *because* that connects single words, phrases, or clauses

connector: a word or phrase such as *for instance, both, because of,* or *consequently* that links ideas in a piece of writing and makes it more coherent; it can show similarities or differences or introduce new information; conjunctions are one type of connector (See Skill 2.)

contraction: a shortened form of a word or combination of words; it contains an apostrophe

dependent clause: a group of words that has a subject and a verb but does not express a complete idea; it cannot be used alone as a complete sentence

descriptive adjective: a word that helps create a detailed mental picture of a topic; it describes how something looks, feels, smells, tastes, or sounds

detail: a specific fact or piece of information

direct quotation: another writer's exact words (See Skill 10.)

double quotation marks: punctuation marks (") used before and after a direct quotation to show that the words are someone else's (See Skill 10.)

essay: a piece of writing with several paragraphs about one topic

example: something that illustrates a rule

fact: something that is true and can be proven (See Skill 14.)

formal writing: a style of writing used when it is not appropriate to show familiarity, such as in business or school; it may include full forms instead of abbreviations, or specific nouns instead of the pronoun *you*; it usually does not include informal expressions (See Skill 3.)

full form: the form of a word or group of words in which each letter appears; for example, *is not* is the full form of the contraction *isn't*

inappropriate source: a source that contains information that is not factual or not academic; for example, a newspaper that focuses on entertainment, a magazine that focuses on trends and celebrities, or a non-academic website like a personal blog (See Skill 7.)

independent clause: a group of words that includes a subject and a verb and expresses a complete idea; it can be used alone as a complete sentence

informal writing: a style of writing used with friends and family that is often based on personal experiences; personal e-mails or personal blogs are examples of informal writing (See Skill 3.)

main idea: what a piece of writing is about

neutral language: language that is impersonal or objective (See Skill 19.)

noun: a word for a person, place, thing, or idea

- **object:** a noun that answers the question *What?* or *Who?* about the verb in a sentence; it comes after the verb in a statement
- **objective:** not influenced by personal beliefs or feelings **opinion:** someone's feeling or belief about a topic; it cannot be proven (See Skill 14.)
- **opposing opinion:** an opinion that is different from a writer's own opinion (See Skill 15.)
- **order of importance:** a way of organizing ideas according to their importance; for example, ordering ideas from most to least important or from least to most important
- overgeneralization: a statement that is too broad or too general or a conclusion based on only a few examples; for example, it is an overgeneralization to say something specific about an entire group of people based on information about only one of the group members (See Skill 18.)
- paragraph: a group of sentences about one topic; the sentences have a special format
- parallel structure: the use of similar word patterns in lists of words, phrases, or clauses; for example, listing present tense verbs with other present tense verbs or listing prepositional phrases with other prepositional phrases (See Skill 6.)
- paraphrase: to put another writer's idea or ideas in your own words (See Skill 4.)

phrase: a group of words

- **plagiarism:** the use of another person's ideas or information without providing an appropriate citation. At colleges and universities in North America, plagiarism is a very serious offense; it is considered stealing. (See Skill 4.)
- **preposition:** a word such as *in*, *on*, or *at* that helps show location or time
- **prepositional phrase:** a preposition followed by a noun; for example, *at noon*, *in Boston*, or *on the table*
- **pronoun:** a word that is used in place of a noun
- **punctuation:** special marks that are used to show the divisions between phrases and sentences
- **quotation:** another writer's exact words (See Skill 10.) **quotation marks:** punctuation (") used before and after a quotation to show that the words are someone else's
- **redundancy:** saying the same thing more than once, or repeating the same information (See Skill 12.)

- **refutation:** a response to a counterargument; it brings readers back to the writer's original opinion and strengthens that opinion (See Skill 15.)
- **repetition of words:** the frequent use of important words in a piece of writing (See Skill 11.)
- **reporting phrase:** a phrase such *as according to, said, explained,* or *asks* that usually introduces a direct quotation; it often includes information about the source, such as the name of the author (See Skill 10.)
- **revise:** to fix the overall problems with the structure of a piece of writing
- **run-on sentence:** two or more independent clauses connected without a comma or a conjunction (See Skill 1.)
- **sentence fragment:** a group of words that does not express a complete idea; a sentence fragment may be missing a subject or a verb, or it may be a dependent clause by itself (See Skill 1.)
- sentence structure: the way words are arranged in a sentence
- **sentence variety:** the use of sentences with different structures in a piece of writing (See Skill 9.)
- simple sentence: a sentence with only one independent clause; it expresses only one complete idea
- single quotation mark: a punctuation mark (') used around a quotation within another direct quotation (See Skill 10.)
- **source:** someone or something from which a writer gets information
- stringy sentence: a sentence that has too many clauses joined by connectors; it is often difficult to read (See Skill 16.)
- **subject:** the person, place, thing, or idea that does the action in a sentence
- **summary:** a brief statement that gives the main points of a piece of writing; it keeps the overall meaning of the original text but uses different words and includes only the most important points (See Skill 17.)
- supporting sentence: a sentence that supports the main idea in the topic sentence; it can also give examples and explanations and may provide facts and details about the topic of the paragraph (See Skill 5.)
- **synonym:** a word or phrase that has the same meaning, or nearly the same meaning, as another word or phrase (See Skill 4.)
- **thesis statement:** a sentence that states the main idea of an essay; it should not be too broad and should express an issue that has two sides; it should make the writer's opinion clear (See Skill 20.)
- **time clause:** a phrase that shows the order of events and begins with a time word such as *before*, *after*, *when*, *while*, or *as soon as*
- **tone:** the general feeling expressed by a piece of writing; it can be formal or informal

topic: who or what a piece of writing is about

topic sentence: a sentence that expresses the main idea of a paragraph; it is often the first sentence in a paragraph, is about one idea, and does not usually include specific examples or details (See Skill 5.)

transition phrases: phrases such as *for example, as a result*, or *in conclusion* that link ideas between sentences and between paragraphs; they can also introduce new information and help organize ideas in a piece of writing (See Skill 16.)

transition words: words such as *first*, *therefore*, or *finally* that link ideas between sentences and between paragraphs; they can also introduce new information and help organize ideas in a piece of writing (See Skill 16.)

verb: a word that describes an action or a state; it tells what the subject in a sentence is doing or being

wordiness: the inclusion of unnecessary words in writing; it can make writing less clear and more difficult to read (See Skill 12.)

What are the most common words in academic English? Which words appear most frequently in readings in different academic subject areas? Dr. Averil Coxhead, who is currently a Senior Lecturer at Victoria University of Wellington in New Zealand, did research to try to answer this question. The result was the Academic Word List (AWL), a list of 570 words or word families that appear in academic readings in many different academic fields. These words are extremely useful for students to know. In *Skills for Effective Writing*, you will encounter a number of these words in context.
